That your Majesty's important Life may be long preserved: That God Almighty may pour down His Blessings upon your Royal Family: That infinite Wisdom may direct your Counsels: And that your Arms, by Sea and Land, may be crowned with Success; is the earnest Prayer of your Majesty's most faithful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod
