

the Foot were most killed, but greatest part of the Ca-valry escaped, the Polish Horse being so wearied with continual fervice, that they could not purfue them, fo that now his Majefty hath fubdued all that part of the Wherain which lies Westward of the Nieper, excepting the City of Czebryn, the Relidence of Dorofensko, who is upon the point of making his peace with his Majefly, ewo Deputies having to that purpose been fent by the King to treat with him, whom he received with great kinduefs and respect, fo that we expect our next Letters will give us an account of the conclusion of the Treaty now on foot between his Majefty and him. His Majefty (according to our last advices ) was quartered with his Atmy near Breflaw, fcituate on the River Bog, intending fo foon as the ways were paffable, which mult be by a hard Froft, to march into Walachia and Moldavia, and defiroy those Provinces, that the Turk's may not the next Campagne draw any fubliftence from thence. The Mofsaufies do not only continue to decline joining their Forces with those of the Poles, but likewise refuse the reftoring Kiovia, which they are obliged to, by a Treaty made between the Czar and King Calimire of Poland. for that the Poles are extremely diffatisfied with them.

Palermo, Fan: 9. By a Feluca arrived here this day, we have advice of the arrival of the Chevalier de Val-Belle with eight French men of War, and eight Veffels laden with Corn and Provisions at Meffina, without the leaft diffurbance from the Spanifh Fleet, which confiited in 31 men of War, and 25 Gallies ; they lay on the fide of Calabria, and were forced to permit the French free-19 to enter, through the difagreement that was (as is faid ) amongft che chief Commanders. The Meffinefes are to well recruited with this fupply, that it is thought they will be fufficiently able to defend themfelves, when before they were brought fo low through want of Provisions, and other Necessaries, that they feemed not to think of any thing, but how to reconcile themfelves to the Spaniards. Our new Viceroy, the Duke de Ferrandina, labours all he can to put himfelf in a pollure to attack them with a good Army this nexe Spring.

Hamburgh, Fan. 11 We do not yet hear that the Suedes have committed any Hoffility in the Territory of the Elector of Brandenburgh. At Berlin they omie no endeavors to pur that. City into a pollure of defence, and for its better fecurity it hath been refolyed to de froy the Suburbs. We are told that the suedes are drawing an Army of 15 or 16000 men together on the Frontiers of Schon's, to fecure themfelves on that lide; and that the King of Suc den is expected at Gottenburgh, and from thence will passowards Lands-croon.

Ditto, Jan. 15. Our lass Letters from Pomeren advifens, that the Suedes have taken Landsbe gb in the

Regiments with hims leaving the reft of his Forces to winter in Franconia. They are already at work for the pulling down and deftroying the Suburbs of that City.

Vienna, Jan. 17: The Baron de Soye, the Baron de Keyfersteyn, and Colonel Poyger, have at last received their Commissions for the railing of three Regiments, confifting each in 1900 men, for the fervice of the Crown of spain, Upon the news of the Sudder being entred into the Territories of the Elector of Brandenburgh, feveral extraordinary Councils have been held and we are told that the Emperor has refolded Vigoroully to affift his Electoral Hignness ; and yefferday the Count of Oxen/terne, Ambaffador from the Crown of Sueden, took his leave of the Emperor in order to his return from hente. The Ambaffador of Molfooty is likewise upon his departure; charged with feveral rich Presents, as well for the Czar, as for himself; he will fuddenly be followed by an Amballador his Imperiat Majefty intends to fend to the Czar, to conclude a itric Alliance between them.

Ratisbon, Jan. 17. The 14 inftant, the States of the Empire being assembled in the usual manner, came to a refolution upon the Memorial prefented to them by the Minister of Brandenburgh, viz. That his Electoral Highnels shall have the Guaranty of the Empire as well for his Countries out of the Empire, as those in it, against any Prince or State that shall invade them.

Strasburgh, Fin. 18. The 14 inflant, according to the refolution that had been taken at a general Council of War the day before, the Confederates decimped from Willtade, the Elector of Brandenburgh taking his way towards Francenia, where he will leave part of his Army to winter, and will return with 5000 men into his own Territories; the Lunenburgh Troops will have their quarters in Suabias and the Imperial and Lorrain in Brifgovia; 6000 men remain in and near this City for the guard of our Bridge. Monstieur de Turenne is at present quartered at Gemar between Schlestadt and Colmar, having commanded feveral Troops under the conduct of Monfieur de Monclaes, ip go and attack Dachfiein, the onely place at present polleffed by the Confederates in Allatia, the 16 inflant several pieces of Cannon was brought before it from Brifa, but as yet they have nor that we hear of, been made ule of; in the mean time the Villages and Countrey people in Alfaria are extremely well treated by the French, who pay to the full for all they have, and do not commit the least diforder. In the action between the French and the Allies on the fifthinftant, amongst others, the Count de Caprhra Was killed, and Major General Dunemalt mortally wounded.
