Ditto, Fan. 21. The Duke of Lorrain, the Mar-Support Baden Dourlach General of the Empire , who commands the 6000 men that are left for the guard of our Bridge, and Prince Herman of Baden General of the Emperor's Artillery, are now here, intending to pais the Winter in this place. Part of the Brandenburgh Troops march home, the reft, with those of Lunenburg, are gone towards Suabia, and the Imperialifts and Lorrainers are marched towards the Forest of Swartzen-The French Troops not being able to fubfist in wait. thefe parts, descend towards the lower, Alfatia, and we are told that Monlieur de Turenne has already fent greateft part of his Cavalry towards the Saar. The Marquis de Montauban, who was taken the 29 past in the action near Malhaufen, is a Priloner here upon his Parole, to-geher with the Marquis de Sable; but the Count de Buslemont having paid his Ranfom, is returned home. Cologne, Fan. 20. The 16 inftant, Monfieur Fifcher the Emperors Ambalfador parted from bence on his way to Muniter, in order to the final conclution of the Treaty with that Bilhop, which hath for some months been depending about the Levies he is to make for the fervice of the Emperor and his Allies. We are inform-ed that the Prince of Orange having written to the Im-perial Generals at Ban, to defire they would join fome Regiments of Horle to the Troops that are drawing togethor, with defign to give the Suedes a divertion; they have returned his Highness for answer, that they will confil ywith his defire therein, and that they had already iffued orders for the march of the Regiments of Monreceiver and of Spork, which are quartered in Westpha-Qà

Ditto, Fan. 25. Our Magistrates have at length contentest ro pay the half of the monthly Contribution demanded by the Imperialits, who are not contented therewith. Monsieur Fario continues with his Troops near Rhinbergh, having positive orders not to flir, tills the monies deminded by the States be paid. Our Magistrates have forbid the bringing in of French Wines. The Governor of Macstricks demands the line Contribution of the City of Aix la Chapelle, as it pays the Imperialities, which is not able to free it felf from. Brutlelt.

Bruffelis Jan. 22. On Friday night last by the Ordinary from Spain, the Count de Monterey received her Majesties leave to resign the Government, of these Provinces to the Duke de Villa Hermofa General of the Cavalry, who at the fame time received his Commission from (pain, with the lame Powers and Authorities that had been given to the Count de Monterey. Ihe next morning, notice thereof was given to the great Officers, Council of State, and Supreme Courts of Justice, who immediately attended the Duke with their Complements on this Subject, and in the evening the Count de Monterey was publickly to xist him, and to congratu-late with him. The Duke however gives not as yet any publick Audiences, and will not rake upon him the Governmant till the Count's departure, which will be in few days, his Excellency having fent a Courier to France, to defire Pafsports for his paffage through that Kingdom, The last night by an Extraordinary Courier from Mad id, we had advice of the Prince of Vaude-mont's being made a Grandee of Spain of the first rank, and that it is thought he will obtain the command of General of the Horfe in these Countries, now vacant by the advancement of the Duke de Villa Hermofa. Lieutenany General Agurto parted hence the 19 instant, to head fome Troops which are drawn together about Cambray, but what defign they have in hand we know not, unless it be to make lome incursions into the Enemies Countrey.

Ditto, Jan. 29. On Saturday last arrived here Don Emanuel de Lyra from Holland, and the next day Don Pedro de Ronquillos, who is going for England, to re-fide there on the part of the Crown of Spain. On Saturday night laft was a great Alfembly at Court of all the Ladies in Town, upon notice that their Excellencies would then take their folemn leave of them, which they accordingly did.' On Thursday next her Excellency will begin her journey from hence through France, and will be followed by his Excellency the Monday following, ha-Ving received the necessary Passports from his most Chriftian Majefly. - Our new Governor has already given orders for the preparing of a great many Commissions as well for the railing of feveral new Troops, as the recruiting the old, to which end, he expects a very confiderable fum of money to be remitted from Spain. From Holland they write, that the Prince of Orange is drawing a Body of 15 or 16000 men together, to give the Surdes a diversion towards Bromens And that the States are refolved to have 2. Fleets at Sea this next Summer, one in the Baltick Seas and the other in the Ocean.

Hague, Jan. 24. The States having refolved in affift, the Blector, of Brandenburgh, and confequently to make War against the Suedes, we are told that a Manifelto will be fuddenly published, containing the Reafons that oblige them to it ; in the mean time the Forces defigned to give that Crown a diversion, begin to march towards Bremen, some Imperial Troops being to join them, the Count de Waldeck is to command them in chief, who has orders to return immediately hither. And here is a report in Town as if fome of our thips had been flopt by the Suedes in the Sound, but without any certainty. The Prince of Orange parted from hence on his journey for Gelderland, but will divert himfell for fome days in Hunting near Utrecht. The Deputies of the Admiralties have frequent Conferences about the next years Equipage, the States defigning to have a Fleet in the Baltique, as well as in the Ocean. The States of Holland have for their part approved the late Treaty Marine concluded between His Majefty of Great Britain and this state, and refolved that the fame be forthwith ratified.

Whitheall, Jan. 23. This day the honourable Sir Francis North His Majeftics Attorney General, being, in confideration, of his Faithful Services, defigned by His Majefty to fucceed' Sir Jobn Vaughan late Lord Chief Juffice of the Court of Common Pleas, appeared in the High Court of Chancery, and was fivorn Serjeant; after he had performed all the Pormalities belowging to that Degree, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal came into the Court of Common Pleas, and declar'd the King's pleafure to him in an Eloquent Speech, Sir Francis North fanding in the middle of the Barof the faid Court, made his Ackwowledgments of the King's great Favour, and returned his, Humble thanks to His Majeffy, and was immediately conouted from thence between the two ancienteft Serjeants, into the faid Court, where the Lord Keeper delivered unto him his Patent of the faid Office; and after he had taken the Oaths of "Allegiance and Supremacy, and the Oath of Chief Juffice of that Court the Lord Keeper put on his Square Cap, and he took his Seat of Chief Juffice, and after wards entertained the Lord Keeper, and divers of the Nobility, and all the Judges and Serjeants at Dinner, at Serjeants Int in Courtey-lare.
