Tranquility of this Country.

The Success which has nitherto attended your Majesty's superiour Wissom, Courage and Steadiness, in frustrating all the Attempts of the Enemies to your Glory, and to the Prosperity of your People, and the known Zeal, Vigilance and Æquanimity of his Grace the Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, animate us with a well grounded Confidence, that those Virtues will protect us against the late insolent Project of an Invasion.
