THE following Address of the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Port of Dover in the County of Kent, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable Lord George Sackville, and Hugh Valence Jones, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Port of Dover in the County of Kent.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Port of Dover; humbly beg Leave, at this Time, when your Dominions are attacked; and your Kingdoms threatened with an Invasion by a faithless and perfidious Enemy, to renew our Professions of inviolable Fidelity and Affection to your Royal Person and Government.

The Happiness we enjoy through your Majesty's constant paternal Care for the Welfare and Prosperity of your People, as well as the wife and vigorous Measures taken by your Majesty for their Defence against the present unjust and impious Attempts of their Enemies, demand our most grateful Acknowledgments:

Permit us therefore, most gracious Sovereign, to assure you, that though we are by our Situation more immediately exposed to the Attacks of your Majesty's Enemies, we shall, on all Occasions, be ready, with the greatest Zeal and Cheerfulness, to expose our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of your Royal Person and Government, and the Protestant Succession in your illustrious House, on which the Happiness of these Kingdoms depends.

Rome, May 1. A few Days ago the Pope's Frigate St. Paul, after having cruized for some Weeks on the Ecclesiastical Coasts, jointly with some Neapolitan Xebecs, against the Barbary Corsairs, returned to Civita Vecchia. The Elector of Cologne has honoured M. Andreozzi his Agent here with the Title of Marquis. Last Week Marquis Steinville, the French Ambassador, made his Visits of Ceremony to the College of Cardinals. Prince Tassis is returned to this City to resume the Direction as Postmaster General of the Imperial Posts in Italy. On the 27th past Count Rivera, the King of Sardinia's Minister, had an Audience of the Pope to ex-

ecute a Commission from his Court. The same Day Cardinal Portocarrero had a long private Conversation with the Pope, in Consequence of the Dispatches he had received by the weekly Courier from Madrid. On the 28th, by an Express from Ravenna, the Secretary of State received Notice of the Decease, on the 25th past, of Cardinal Enriquez, the Pope's Legate there. On the 29th arrived here from Spain M. Erreras, the new Auditor di Ruota for the Spanish Nation in this City.

Stockholm, May 4. The King, who has been indisposed for some Days past, is now greatly recovered. On Sunday last the Court was alarmed by a Fire which broke out in one of the Apartments belonging to the Palace, but it was happily extinguished without doing any considerable Damage.

Venice, May 7. The Magistrates of Health have published an Edict, imposing a Quarantine of Twenty-one Days upon all Ships that come to this Port, on Account of the Plague that is broke out at Algiers.

Florence, May 8. Last Week the Magistrates of Health here, on Notice that an Epidemical Fever had discovered itself amongst the Inhabitants of Corsica, and had been carried to Genoa, sent Orders to the Magistrates of Health at Leghorne, Porto Ferrario, &c. not to admit any Vessels from that Island, or Genoa, and caused Pickets of Horse to patrol along the Tuscan Coasts to prevent any People from Landing. On the 26th past M. Borromei, the new Pope's Nuncio, arrived here from Rome. The same Evening he was visited by Count Richcourt, and the next Morning by the other Members of the Regency, to whom on the 28th he returned the Visits. The Chiefs of the Clergy, and many of the Nobility, were also to pay their Compliments to him; and the same Day, the 28th, he put up the Emperor's and the Pope's Arms, as usual, over his Door.

Turin, May 8. His Sardinian Majesty performed the Ceremony of putting the red Cap on the Cardinal Archbishop's Head on Monday last, in the Chapel of the Holy Handkerchief.

Hambourg, May 11. We are informed by our last Letters from Holstein, that the King of Denmark is expected at Gottorp on the 22d of this Month, where he is to stay till the 26th, in order to review the Body of Troops that are assembling in the Neighbourhood of Rendsbourg: After which his Majesty proposes taking a Tour to Altena, and from thence to return to Copenhagen by the Way of Gluckstadt.

Dresden, May 16. It is assured by the Trading People here that the Leipzig Fair has been very bad this Year, and that the Brandenburg Merchants did not bring thither any Wares or Commodities of their own Country. Some Merchants of this Town having asked

Leave to send their Vessels again to Magdeburgh, and represented that several People, who live upon this Trade only, must starve if this Inhibition should continue, the Privy Council, at their repeated Instances, has granted that Permission, and in Consequence thereof some Vessels went down the Elbe Yesterday in the Afternoon. Their Polish Majesties and the Princes Xaverius and Charles continue to pass their Time between Leipzig and Hubertsburgh.

Hague, May 18. To-day the States of Holland and Westfrizeland resumed their Deliberations. The Deputies from the Province of Zealand, who came here to execute a Commission from the States of that Province, will set out To-morrow on their Return Home. On Thursday next the Regiment of Dutch Foot Guards is to be reviewed by her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and the young Prince Stadtholder, and will be followed successively by the other Regiments that compose this Garrison.

Brussels, May 21. Since last Post we have received no further Accounts of the Operations of the French in the Island of Minorca. It is only said, and all the Letters from France agree in the same, that the Frenches could not be opened against St. Philip's Castle before the 15th or 16th of this Month. We are informed that Marechal de Belle Isle has been appointed one of the French King's Cabinet Council, in the Room of Marechal de Noailles, and took his Seat there accordingly on Sunday last. It is added, that in a few Days he was to set out to see the Dispositions that have been made along the Coasts of the Ocean, after which he was to return to Versailles to make his Report. By a Letter from Boulogne we learn, that the Regiments of Bulkeley, Dillon, Lally and Ogilvy, in Garrison at that Place and at St. Omer, are to march about the Beginning of next Month to join Clare's and Berwick's, now in Brittany. It seems by the same Letter, that the talked of Augmentation of 15 Men per Company, with additional Sergeants and Corporals, has not been carried into Execution, and that the Brigade continues to suffer very much by Desertion. There are now two Mails due from England, our last Letters from thence being of the 10th Instant.
