*Edinburgh, May 22, 1756.*

*Turin, May 19.* M. Durini set out from hence this Morning for France, carrying with him the three Caps for the new Cardinals in France.

*Dresden, May 23.* The Royal Family is not yet returned from Leipzig. His Majesty the King of Poland being indisposed with the Gout, the Conferences at Halle, which have been interrupted by the Leipzig Fair, are to be resumed, and the Saxon Commissaries have again hired their Apartments in that Town for two Months.

*Hague, May 27.* The Princess Governante has declared her Intention of setting out Tomorrow for Utrecht, with the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline his Sister. That Night her Royal Highness proposed to rest at the House of Baron Ablaing de Giefenbourg, and to proceed the next Day to Die-ren, where she intends to pass five or six Weeks; after

after which the whole Court will return to the House in the Wood for the Remainder of the Summer. Yesterday Morning died here, after a few Days Illness, in the 61st Year of his Age, the Baron vander Duyn, General of Foot in the Service of this Republick, Governor of Breda, and Colonel of the Regiment of Dutch Foot Guards; the Command of which Regiment is already disposed of by her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, in Favour of Field Marshal Prince Louis of Brunswick Wolfenbittel.

This Day Don Mello y Castro, Envoy Extraordinary from his most Faithful Majesty the King of Portugal, had his first Private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable Henry Fox, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*Whitehall, June 5.*

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable James Lord Tyrawly, Lieutenant General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, in the Kingdom of Spain, and of the Castle, Forts, and other Military Works and Fortifications thereunto belonging.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, containing a Grant unto Robert Johnston, of the Place and Dignity of Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in Tuam, in the said Kingdom, in the room of Isaac Gervais, Clerk, late Dean thereof.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Honourable William Bateman, Esq; a Commissioner, in Quality of a principal Officer of His Majesty's Navy.
