Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Berks, most humbly beg Leave to approach your Royal Person, to express our Thankfulness for the wife and necessiary Measures taken by your Majesty, in Defence of your Dominions, and the Rights of your Imperial Crown, against the ambitious Views of the Court of France.

The unprovok'd and most unjustifiable Incroachments of an inveterate and ever perfidious Enemy upon your Majefty's Dominions in America, in a Time of perfect Peace, the Attempts already made upon the Island of Minorca, and the infolent Menaces of an Invation of these Kingdoms, must have fired the Hearts of all true Britons with the higheft Indignation and Refentment of fuch unwarrantable Effects of unbridled Arrogance and Prefumption. And, relying upon the Justice of our Caufe, for the Divine Bleffing upon your Majesty's Councils and Arms, we trust, that these and all Attempts to disturb your Majesty's Government, will ever be glorioufly defeated a and that the peaceable Injoyment of our Holy Religion, Liberties and Properties, will, in Spite of all the Machinations of our bittereft Enemies, be perpetuated to us and our Pofterity, under a long Succeffion of Protestant Princes of your Illustrious House, inheriting your Majesty's Wildom and Virtues to the lateft Ages.
