Suffer us now, most Gracious Sovereign, to offer you our most grateful Thanks for your fatherly Care and Royal Bounty extended to our Neighbourhood. Its happy Effects begin to appear, and we rejoice in the Prospect of seeing Industry, Manufactures, and lawful Obedience, take Place where they were never properly established.

May your Navies and Armies be still victorious; may your Royal Issue succeed to the Crown of your Dominions to latest Ages; and may your Majesty live long, and rejoice in the Happiness of your People: These are our earnest Prayers.

Copenhagen, May 17. The King, who sets out To-morrow for Holstein, has appointed the following Persons to accompany him in that Journey, viz. the Count de Molcke, Great Marshal of the Court, the Chamberlain vander Luhe, M. de Broekenhuis, Master of the Horse, Mess. de Bahr, Reulwiz, and Krogh, Gentlemen of the Chamber, M. d'Esmark, Secretary of the Cabinet, Count Berkentin, the Barons Dehn and Bernstorff, and M. Thott, Privy Counsellors, Count d'Ahlefeld, Secretary at War, and M. d'Osten, Privy Counsellor of Conference. His Majesty proposes taking his Route by Corsoer, Odensee, Coldingen, and Haderleben, and intends reaching the Castle of Gottorp by the 24th. The Queen Mother, accompanied by the Princess of Culmbach, sets out towards the End of next Week for the Castle of Hirschholm, where she intends to pass the Summer. The King has disposed of the Government of Fredericia, in the Province of Jutland, in Favour of Lieutenant General Reitzenstein, Commander in Chief of the Train of Artillery.

Vienna, May 19. On Thursday last, being the Anniversary of the Birth of the Empress Queen, who then entered into the 40th Year of her Age, their Imperial Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion at Schonbrun; after which they dined in Publick with the Archdukes and Archduchesses.

Hague, June 1. The Assembly of the States of Holland and Westfrizeland is adjourned for some Days. Field Marshal Prince Louis of Brunswick Wolfembuttel has taken the usual Oaths, to the Council of State, in Quality of Colonel of the Regiment

Regiment of Dutch Foot Guards. This Night the Corps of the late General vander Duyn will be carried from hence to Ryfwick, to be interred with those of his Ancestors.

Brussels, June 4. We are informed that the Regiment of Royal Baviere, and some of the Swiss Regiments that have been in Winter Quarters upon the Frontiers of the Austrian Netherlands, are ordered to march into Lorrain and Alface, to be more at Hand for Recruiting. Yesterday, about One in the Morning, we were alarmed with a Shock of an Earthquake, which however has not done any Damage.
