

his Majefty to treat with him, was returned, and had given his Majefty an account, that they were received by the faid Dorofensko with all the respect ima-rginable ; that after having read his Majesties Letters, he expressed himself fully farisfied with the contents of them, and declared, that he had that confidence in his Majeflice Royal word, that without making any Capitallation, he would abfolutely put himfelf into his Majefties hands, and in token of his fubmiffion, took the Sable from his fide and girded it about one of the Commiffiomers, and his Cap from off his own head, and put it upon the Commillioners. The King has granted hims and isall the Coffacks of his party, a general pardon of all paft offences, enjoyment of all their rights and priviledges, and an effurance of his favor and kindnefs to them, and hath commanded Dorofensko to come to him, upon promile of a kind and favorable reception, and an entire forgetfulnels of all that is paft. This fubmiffion of Denofensko is of greater concernment than all the other Conquests his Majefty has made in the Ukrain, for without this they were not fecure ; and the Turks having loft so confiderable an affistance, will not be able to attempt (as we hope) any great matters against this Crown the next Spring;

Milan, Jun. 16. Our Governor the Prince de Ligne intending, amongst other Troops, to fend into Sicily 500 Foot of the German Regiment commanded. by Count Antonio Trotti; his Excellency has fent the Lieutenant Colonel of the fame Regiment into Germany to raife recruits; in order to the compleating its former aumber of 2000 men. The Sieur Don Emanuel de Portugel is likewise going into Germany to raise a Regiment of Foot to be fent into Sicily. We have ad-Vice by the way of Final, that the Chevalier de Valbelle was the ninth inflant with the flips under his command near the life of Corfica, which if true, fufficiently convinces the miftake of those who pretend to have news of his arrival at Meffina; however it may be, that some Veffels laden with Corn from Rockel under the conduct of Monsieur de Granée, have got into Messina, and that that hath given the occasion of this Error but time will fully inform us.

Vienna, Fan. 20. In our last we told vou, that the Count of Oxensterne Ambassadot of sucden, had taken his leave of his Imperial Majelly, which we fince understand to be a millake, his Excellency having indeed had Andience of the Emperor; but the occasion of it "was, to endeavour to satisfie his Imperial Majefly with the prefent proceeding of the King his Mafter : But we are told, that the refolution hath been already policively taken, to affift the Elector of Brandenburgh against that Srown ; and accordingly the Regiments of Beden, spa-

Starembergh, to raife a Regiment of Foot for the far-vice of the Kingdom of Naples. The Suediff Ambalfador hath in the mean time difpatched a Coupier from hence, to give the King his Mafter an account of the refolutions of this Court, in relation to the prefent Conjuncture.

Berlin, Jan. 21. We expect his Blectoral Highness of Brandenburgh will fuddenly arrive in this Country with 6000 Horfe, leaving his Infantry to winter in Frantonia. We have already 4000 men in Garifon here, and we expect yet 500; our Suburbs are pulling down, and all other necessary provision making for our defence: General Wrangel continues to have his Head quarters # Prenflam, his Troops being spread very wide in their quarters

Hamburgh, Fan 25. Our advices confirm the taking of Landtsbergh on the River Wehrs by the Suedes, and their delign of feizing Francfurdt on the Oder; and now that Crown makes no longer a fecret of the refolation it hath taken to make War against the Elector of Brandenburgh; for having (as is faid) acted contrary to the Treaty not long fince concluded between the King of smeden and him, and for the prefervation of the Peace of Wellphalia. It is reported here, that the King of Denmark will join his Forces with these of the States General and the other Allies, against the Sue des; but our Letters from Copenhagen say, that the Ministers of that Court do not own the leaft intention of breaking with the Crown of Sueden, but on the contrary declare, that his Majefty of Denmark defires nothing more, than to continue in good amity with it. We are told, that the Suedes have already ftopt certain Dutch fhips in the Seand.

Strasburgh, Fan. 25: The Troops of the Circles which remain here for the guard of our Bridge, are di-fit ibuted into quarters in the Bailages of Bifcheim and Lichtenaw, belonging to the Count de Hanaw , with order, that upon the firing of fo many Cannon from the Fort, they immediately repair thither for the defence of lt and the Bridge, which it is chought the French will enu deavor to deffroy. Monfigur de Turenne having put 2000 men into Colmar, 1500 into Schlestadt, and proportionably into the other places of Alfitia, is himfelf returned for Paris, and the reft of his Troops gone to take Winter-quarters in Ibrrain, except thofe which under the conduct of Monfieur de Monclaes befiege Dachficis; yesterday they begun to batter the place, and the Governot of ht is refolved to make a vigorous defence, the Garifon confifting in 7 or 800 men.
