

Brussels, June 15. It is now a whole Week since the Letters from France have contained any Particulars of the Siege of St. Philip's Castle. The Regiment of Royal Baviere, which was upon its March into Lorraine, and already arrived at St. Omer, has received counter Orders, and is gone to Calais. It is now said, that the Camp to be formed between Dunkirk and Calais, is not to assemble till the 2d of July. An Express is arrived here with the News, that the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine was elected Yesterday Coadjutrix of the Abbey of Thorne.
