'Tis also required, that the said Certificates be sent by the General Post, directed To the Right Honourable Earl of Darlington, and Lord Viscount Dupplin, Pay Masters General of His Majesty's Land Forces, at the Horse Guards, London. And that Counterparts or Duplicates of the said Certificates be reserved by the said Out-Pensioners respectively, in order to be exhibited to such Persons as shall be authorized to pay them their Pensions in Advance, to the Intent that they may be satisfied, that such Out-Pensioners are the very Persons entitled to receive the same.

And it is hereby further notified, that no one will be entered on the Pay Book of the said Hospital, or be thought entitled to the said Pension, that shall neglect making their Appearance, or sending Certificates as before directed.

YORK and HAMBLETON RACES, 1756

ONE Hundred Guineas in Specie, given by His Majesty, will be run for at Black-Hambleton in Yorkshire, on Saturday the 21st of August next, by Mares, being no more than five Years old the Grads before they run, as must be certified under the Hands of the Breeder, at the Time of entering; carrying ten Stone Weight, one Heat.

On Monday the 23d of August, One Hundred Guineas in Specie, given by His Majesty, will be run for on Knavesmire, near the City of York, by any Horse, &c. being no more than six Years old the Grads before they run, as must be certified under the Hands of the Breeder, at the Time of entering; carrying twelve Stone Weight, three Heats. To be shewn and entered at Mr. Harrison's, near the said Course, on Saturday the 21st of August, between the Hours of Two and Six o'Clock of the same Day. And if any Difference arise either in Entering or Running, the same to be determined by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Carlisle, or whom he shall appoint, according to his Majesty's Rules and Orders, then and there to be produced.

THE following Cases are published at the Request of a worthy Clergyman by whom the Medicine was administered.
