A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

Appointing the Distribution of Prizes taken, and the Bounty for Taking or Destroying Ships of War or Privateers of the Enemy, from the Time of His Majesty's Declaration of War against France.

G E O R G E R.

WH E R E A S by an Act of Parliament made in the ~~last~~ Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen, and the more speedy and effectual Manning His Majesty's Navy;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That the Flag Officers, Commanders and other Officers, Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers, on Board every Ship and Vessel of War, in Our Pay, shall have the sole Interest and Property of and in all and every Ship, Vessel, Goods, and Merchandizes, which they shall take from and after the Seventeenth Day of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and fifty six, during the Continuance of this War against France (being first adjudged lawful Prize in any of Our Courts of Admiralty in Great-Britain, or in Our Plantations in America, or elsewhere) to be divided in such Proportions, and after such Manner, as We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall think fit to order and direct by Proclamation or Proclamations, to be issued for those Purposes. And

present

as a further Encouragement to the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, on Board Our Ships of War, as also of Privateers, to attack, take, and destroy, any Ships of Force belonging to the Enemy, it is thereby also enacted, That there shall be paid by the Treasurer of Our Navy, upon Bills to be made forth by the Commissioners of the Navy, to be paid according to the Course thereof, without Fee or Reward, unto the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, or others, that shall have been actually on Board any of Our Ship or Ships of War, or Privateer or Privateers, in any Action where any Ship or Ships of War, or Privateers, shall have been taken from the Enemy, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, since Our Declaration of War against France, dated the said Seventeenth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and fifty six, Five Pounds for every Man which was living on Board any Ship or Ships so taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, at the Beginning of the Engagement between them; the Numbers of such Men to be proved by the Oaths of Three or more of the Chief Officers or Men which were belonging to the said Ship or Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, or belonging to any of them, at the Time of her or their being taken as Prize, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, before the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of the Port, within any of Our Dominions, whereunto any Prize, or Officers, or Men, of such Ships as were sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, shall be brought, or before the British Consul, or Vice Consul, residing at any Neutral Port to which such Prize, or Officers, or Men, shall be brought; which Oaths the said Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of any such Port, or Consul, or Vice Consul, are thereby respectively empowered and required to administer, and shall forthwith grant a Certificate thereof, without Fee or Reward, directed to the Commissioners of the Navy; upon producing which Certificate to the Commissioners of Our Navy, together with an authentick Copy of the Condemnation of such Ship so taken, or if such Ship be sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, on producing only a Certificate from the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, or Consul, or Vice Consul, as aforesaid, the said Commissioners of Our Navy, or such Person or Persons as they shall appoint for that Purpose, shall, according to the Course

Course of the Navy, within Fifteen Days, make out Bills for the Amount of such Bounty, directed to the Treasurer of the Navy, payable to, and to be divided amongst the Officers, Seamen, Marines and Soldiers, on Board Our Ships of War; in Manner, Form, and Proportion, as by Our Proclamation, to be issued for that Purpose; shall be directed and appointed; and amongst the Owners, Officers, and Seamen, of any private Vessel or Ship of War, in such Manner and Proportion, as by any Agreement in Writing they shall have entered into for that Purpose, shall be directed: But it is nevertheless provided by the said Act, that in all Cases where such Oath and Certificate cannot be administered and granted, at the first Port whereunto any Prize, or Officers, or Men of such Ships as shall be taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, shall be brought, such Oath or Oaths relating to any Prize or Prizes that shall be taken, or to any Ships of Our Enemies, that shall be sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed as aforesaid, shall and may be administered and taken by and before the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate of any Port within any of Our Dominions, or by or before the British Consul, or Vice Consul, residing at any Neutral Port whereunto any Prize or Prizes, or Officers, or Men, of any Ships belonging to Our Enemies as shall be taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, shall at any Time afterwards be brought (Proof being first made, by Affidavit before such Person or Persons of the Inability of making such Oath or Oaths, and obtaining such Certificate at the said first Port) and the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, Consul, or Vice Consul, shall thereupon grant such Certificate and Certificates as are therein before directed; which Certificate and Certificates shall be good and effectual, to all Intents and Purposes, as if the same were granted by the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate, Consul, or Vice Consul, of the Port to which such Prize or Prizes, Officers, or Men, as aforesaid, shall be first brought; any Thing in the said Act contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding. We taking the Premises into Consideration, do, pursuant to the said Act of Parliament (with the Advice of Our Privy Council,) by this Our Proclamation, order, direct, and appoint, That the Neat Produce of all Prizes taken by Our Ships of War, and Bounty Money for the taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, be divided into Eight equal Parts, and be distributed in Manner following; that is to say, To the Captain or Captains of any of Our Ships of War, who shall be actually on Board at the taking of any Prize, or at the taking, sinking, burning, or destroying any of the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, Three Eighth Parts; but in Case any such Prize shall be taken, or Ship of War, or Privateer, of the Enemy be taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, by any of Our Ship or Ships of War, under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers being actually on Board, or directing and assisting in the Capture, to have One of the said Three Eighth Parts; the said One

Eighth Part to be paid to such Flag or Flag Officers, in such Proportions, and subject to such Regulations, as are herein after for that Purpose mentioned: To the Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Master, on Board any such Ships, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them: To the Lieutenants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Ensigns, and Quarter Masters of Land Forces, Boatswain, Gunner, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Chirurgion, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any such Ship, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them: To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, Captain's Clerk, Master Sail Maker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Coxswain, Quarter Masters, Quarter Master's Mates, Chirurgion's Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, and Serjeants of Marines, or Land Forces, on Board any such Ships, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them: To the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty, or assisting on Board any such Ships, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them: And in case any Sea Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any Ship of War, for whom any Shares of Prizes, or of the Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of the Capture of any Prize, or at the Capture, Burning, or Destroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, the Share of such Sea Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and other Persons doing Duty, or assisting on Board any such Ships, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers on Board any of Our Ships of War, at the Time of taking any such Prizes, or at the taking, sinking, burning, or destroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be intitled only to the Share or Shares of the said Prizes, and of the Bounty Money for the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, which, according to the above-mentioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And We do hereby strictly enjoin all and every Commander and Commanders of any Ships of War taking any Prize, or taking, sinking, burning, or destroying, any of the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, as soon as may be, to transmit, or cause to be transmitted, to the Commissioners of Our Navy, a true List of the Names of all

the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, or others, who were actually on Board Our Ships of War under his or their Command at the taking such Prize, or at the taking, sinking, burning, or destroying, any such Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy; which List shall contain the Quality of the Service of each Person on Board, and be subscribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and Three or more of the Chief Officers on Board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commissioners of Our Navy, or any Three or more of them, to examine, or cause to be examined, such Lists by the Muster Books of such Ships of War, and Lists annexed thereto, to see that such Lists doth agree with the said Muster Book and annexed Lists, as to the Names, Qualities, or Ratings of the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, belonging to such Ship of War; and, upon Request, forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Truth of any List transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and appointed by the Captors, pursuant to the said Act, to take Care or dispose of such Prize, or of such Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed; and also, upon Application to them, to give, or cause to be given, unto the Agents who shall, at any Time or Times, be appointed as aforesaid by the Captors, all such Lists from the Muster Book of any such Ships of War, and annexed Lists, as the said Agents shall find requisite for their Direction in paying the Produce of such Prizes, or the Bounty, in case any Bounty shall be due for taking the same, and to be otherwise aiding and assisting to the said Agents as shall be necessary. And as touching the said One Eighth Part herein before-mentioned to be granted to the Flag or Flag Officers, who shall be actually on Board at the taking of any Prize, or at the taking, sinking, burning, or destroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, or shall be directing and assisting therein, We have thought fit, and do, by these Presents, publish, order and declare, That the following Regulations be observed; First, That a Flag Officer commanding in Chief, where there is but One Flag Officer upon Service, shall have to his own Use the said One Eighth Part of the Prizes taken, and Bounty Money for the Enemies Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed by Ships under his Command: Secondly, That a Flag Officer, sent to command at Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Right to any Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, by Ships employed there before he arrives at the Place to which he is sent, and actually takes upon him the Command: Thirdly, That when an inferior Flag Officer or private Ships are sent out to reinforce a superior Flag Officer at Jamaica, or elsewhere, the said superior Flag Officer shall have no Right to any Share in the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, by them, before they arrive within the Limits of his Command, and actually receive some Orders from him: Fourthly, That a Chief Flag Officer re-

turning home from Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, by the Ships left behind to act under another Command: Fifthly, That if a Flag Officer is sent to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, by Ships that failed from that Port by Order from the Admiralty: Sixthly, That when more Flag Officers than One serve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken, and Bounty Money for the taking, sinking, burning, or destroying, Ships of War, or Privateers of the Enemy, by any Ships of the Fleet, or Squadron, shall be divided in the following Proportions; videlicet, If there be but Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall have Two Third Parts of the said One Eighth Part, and the other shall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One Half, and the other Half shall be divided equally among the other Flag Officers: Seventhly, That Commodores, with Captains under them, shall be esteemed as Flag Officers, with respect to their Right to an Eighth Part of Prizes taken, and Bounty Money for Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or destroyed, whether commanding in Chief, or serving under Command.

GOD Save the KING.

Genoa, June 12. We are informed by the Master of a Pink arrived here from Barcelona, that on the 27th of last Month he fell in with several Algerine Corsairs off Cape Creo in the Catalonian Sea, who the next Day made a Descent upon the Coast, which so alarmed the Peasants, that they immediately armed themselves, and drove those Pyrates back to their Vessels, having killed and wounded several of them.

Dresden, June 23. The King has had a severe Fit of the Gout, but he is now much better. His Majesty, whilst he was at Karga, upon the Frontiers of Poland, signed the Universalia for convoking a General Diet of the States of that Kingdom.

Frankfort, June 24. On Monday Morning last, the Duke of Deux Ponts arrived here, and in the Afternoon continued his Journey for Arolsen, in order to visit the Princess of Waldeck his Sister. We are informed by our last Advices from Strasbourg, that three Regiments of Foot, and two of Dragoons, which were in Garrison in Alsace, are marched from thence into Provence.

Amsterdam, June 30. They write from Cadiz of the 9th Instant, that Commodore Baron Wassenaer, in the Princess Caroline, with two other of our Men of War, and a large Convoy of Merchantmen, arrived safe in that Bay on the 6th.

Hague, July 1. The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of this Country, who

who are assembled here, apply themselves with great Diligence to the Affairs of the Marine. Their High Mightinesses the States of this Province being to open their ordinary Assembly on the 7th of next Month, the Points, upon which they are to deliberate, are already sent to the respective Towns.

Brussels, July 6. For this Week past, the Letters from France have not contained any further Particulars of the Siege of St. Philip's Castle. Our last Advices are still of the 14th of June. It is only said, that Things do not go on very successfully for the Besiegers; who complain that their Batteries have not the desired Effect, and cannot destroy the Works of the Castle, which are all cut in the Rock. Their Miners also are said to meet with unsurmountable Obstacles; and they begin to own that the Bloody Flux has got among their Troops, and carries off a great many Men; which, together with the vigorous Defence of the Garrison, makes the Reduction of the Place very uncertain. We are informed by Letters from Dunkirk, that the French begin to talk very much there of an Embarkation, and that Marechal de Belle Isle, with the Prince of Soubise, and several other General Officers, were expected there as Yesterday. M. d'Affry arrived here Yesterday in the Evening from the Hague, in his Way to Paris.

Cases
