### A PROCLAMATION,

Appointing the Distribution of Prizes taken, and the Bounty for Taking or Destroying Ships of War or Privateers of the Enemy, from the Time of His Majesty's Declaration of War against France.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Jafe-Seffion of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the Encouragement of Sea-"men, and the more speedy and effectual Mann-"ing His Majesty's Navy;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That the Flag Officers, Commanders and other Officers, Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers, on Board every Ship and Veffel of War, in Our Pay, shall have the sole Interest and Property of and in all and every Ship, Veffel, Goods, and Merchandizes, which they shall take from and after the Seventeenth Day of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand feven hundred and fifty fix, during the Con-tinuance of this War against France (being first adjudged lawful Prize in any of Our Courts of Admiralty in Great-Btitain, or in Our Plan-tations in America, or elsewhere) to be divided in fuch Proportions, and after fuch Manner, as We, Our Heirs and Succeffors, shall think fit. to order and direct by Proclamation or Proclamations, to be iffued for those Purposes. And

Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, on Board Our Ships of War, as also of Privateers, to attack, take, and deftroy, any Ships of Force belonging to the Enemy, it is thereby also enacted, That there shall be paid by the Trea-furer of Our Navy, upon Bills to be made forth by the Commissioners of the Navy, to be paid according to the Courfe thereof, without Fee or Reward, unto the Officers, Seamen, Matines, Soldiers, or others, that shall have been actually on Board any of Our Ship or Ships of War, or Privateer or Privateers, in any Action where any Ship or Ships of War, or Privateers, shall have been taken from the Enemy, funk, burnt, or otherwife deftroyed, fince Our Declaration of War against France, dated the faid Seventeenth Day of May, One thousand feven hundred and fifty fix, Five Pounds for every Man which was living on Board any Ship or-Ships fo taken, funk, burnt, or otherwife destroyed, at the Beginning of the Engagement between them; the Numbers of fuch Men to be proved by the Oaths of Three or more of the Chief Officers or Men which were belonging to the faid Ship of Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, or belonging to any of them, at the Time of her or their being taken as Prize, funk, burnt, or otherwife deftroyed, before the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of the Port, within any of Our Dominions, whereunto any Prize, or Officers, or Men, of fuch Ships as were funk, burnt, or otherwife deftroyed, shall be brought, or before the British Con-ful, or Vice Conful, refiding at any Neutral Port to which such Prize, or Officers, or Men, fhall be brought; which Oaths the faid Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate of any fuch Port, or Conful, or Vice Conful, are thereby respectively impowered and required to administer, and shall forthwith grant a Certificate thereof, without Fee or Reward, directed to the Commiffioners of the Navy; upon producing which Certificate to the Commissioners of Our Navy, together with an authentick Copy of the Condemnation of fuch Ship fo taken, or if fuch Ship be funk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, on producing only a Certificate from the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, or Conful, or Vice Conful, as aforefaid, the faid Commissioners of Our Navy, or fuch Perfon or Perfons as they fhall appoint for that Purpole, Ihall, according to the Coutle

Course of the Navy, within Fifteen Days, make out Bills for the Amount of fuch Bounty, directed to the Treasurer of the Navy, payable to, and to be divided amongst the Officers, Seamen, Marines and Soldiers, on Board Our Ships of War, in Manner, Form, and Proportion, as by Our Proclamation, to be iffued for that Purpole; fhall be directed and appointed; and amongst the Owners, Officers, and Seamen, of any private Veffel or Ship of War, in fuch Manner and Proportion, as by any Agreement in Writing they shall have entered into for that Purpofe, shall be directed : But it is nevertheless provided by the faid Act, that in all Cafes where fuch Oath and Certificate cannot be administered and granted, at the first Port whereunto any Prize, or Officers, or Men of fuch Ships as shall be taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwise deftroyed, shall be brought, such Oath or Oaths relating to any Prize or Prizes that shall be taken, or to any Ships of Our Enemies, that thall be funk, burnt, or otherwife deftroy-ed as aforefaid, fhall and may be administer-ed and taken by and before the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate of any Port within any of Our Dominions, or by or before the British Conful, or Vice Conful, refiding at any Neutral Port whereunto any Prize or Prizes, or Officers, or Men, of any Ships belonging to Our Enemies as shall be taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwise destroyed, shall at any Time afterwards be brought (Proof being first made, by Affidavit before fuch Person or Persons of the Inability of making fuch Oath or Oaths, and obtaining fuch Certificate at the faid first Port) and the Mayor, or other Chief Magistrate, Conful, or Vice Conful, shall thereupon grant fuch Certificate and Certificates as are therein before directed ; which Certificate and Certificates shall be good and effectual, to all Intents and Pur-pofes, as if the fame were granted by the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate, Conful, or Vice Conful, of the Port to which fuch Prize or Prizes, Officers, or Men, as aforefaid, shall be first brought ; any Thing in the faid Act contained to the contrary thereof in any wife notwithstanding. We taking the Premission into Confideration, do, putsuant to the faid Act of Parliament (with the Advice of Our Privy Council,) by this Our Proclamation, order, direct, and appoint, That the Neat Produce of all Prizes taken by Our Ships of War, and Bounty Money for the taking, finking, burning, or otherwife deftroying the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, be divided into Eight equal Parts, and be diffributed in Manner following ; that is to fay, To the Captain or Captains of any of Our Ships of War, who shall be actually on Board at the taking of any Prize, or at the taking, finking, burning, or deftroying any of the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, Three Eighth Parts ; but in Cafe any fuch Prize shall be taken, or Ship of War, or Privateer, of the Enemy be taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, by any of Our Ship or Ships of War, under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers being actually on Board, or direct-

Eighth Part to be paid to fuch Flag or Flag Officers, in fuch Proportions, and fubject to fuch Regulations, as are herein after for that Purpole mentioned : To the Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Mafter, on Board any fuch Ships, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them : To the Lieute-nants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Enfigns, and Quarter Mafters of Land Forces, Boatswain, Gunner, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mate, Chirurgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on Board any fuch Ship, One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongh them: To the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, Captain's Clerk, Master Sail Maker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatfwain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Coxfwain, Quarter Mafters, Quarter Mafter's Mates, Chirurgcon's Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, and Serjeants of Marines, or Land Forces, on Board any fuch Ships, One Eighth Part, to be equally di-vided amongst them: To the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Perfons doing Duty, or affifting on Board any fuch Ships, Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them : And in cafe any Sea Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any Ship of War, for whom any Shares of Prizes, or of the Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of the Capture of any Prize, or at the Capture, Burning, Sinking, or Deftroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, the Share of fuch Sea Captain, inferior Comiffion or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunfmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and other Perfons doing Duty, or affifting on Board any fuch Ships, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer or Officers on Board any of Our Ships of War, at the Time of taking any fuch Prizes, or at the taking, finking, burning, or deftroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, fhall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be intitled only to the Share or Shares of the faid Prizes, and of the Bounty Money for the Enemies Ships of War, or Privateers, taken, funk, burnt, or destroyed, which, according to the above-mentioned Diftribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And We do hereby firicity enjoin all and every Commander and Commanders of any Ships of War taking any Prize, or taking, finking, burning, or de-ftroying, any of the Enemies Ships of War, or or Officers being actually on Board, or direct-ing and affifting in the Capture, to have One caufe to be transmitted, to the Commissioners of the faid Three Eighth Parts; the faid One of Our Navy, a true Lift of the Names of all

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the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, or | others, who were actually on Board Our Ships of War under his or their Command at the taking fuch Prize, or at the taking, finking, burning, or deftroying, any fuch Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy; which Lift fhall contain the Quality of the Service of each Perfon on Board, and be fubscribed by the Cap-tain or Commanding Officer, and Three or more of the Chief Officers on Board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commiffioners of Our Navy, or any Three or more of them, to examine, or caufe to be examined, fuch Lifts by the Mufter Books of fuch Ships of War, and Lifts annexed thereto, to fee that fuch Lifts doth agree with the faid Muffer Book and annexed Lifts, as to the Names, Qualities, or Ratings of the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, belonging to fuch Ship of War; and, upon Request, forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Truth of any List transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and appointed by the Captors, purfuant to the faid Act, to take Care or dispose of such Prize, or of fuch Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed; and alfo, upon Application to them, to give, or caule to be given, unto the Agents who fhall, at any Time or Times, be appointed as aforefaid by the Captors, all fuch Lifts from the Muster Book of any fuch Ships of War, and annexed Lifts, as the faid Agents shall find requisite for their Direction in paying the Produce of fuch Prizes, or the Bounty, in cafe any Bounty shall be due for taking the fame, and to be otherwife aiding and affilting to the faid Agents as fhall be neceffary. And as touching the faid One Eighth Part herein beforementioned to be granted to the Flag or Flag Officers, who shall be actually on Board at the taking of any Prize, or at the taking, finking, burning, or deftroying, any Ships of War, or Privateers, of the Enemy, or shall be directing and affifting therein, We have thought fit, and do, by these Presents, publish, order and declare, That the Prefents, publish, order and declare, following Regulations be observed ; First, That a Flag Officer commanding in Chief, where there is but One Flag Officer upon Service, fhall have to his own Use the faid One Eighth Part of the Prizes taken, and Bounty Money for the Enemies Ships taken, sunk, burnt, or otherwife deftroyed by Ships under his Command : Secondly, That a Flag Officer, fent to com-mand at Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Right to any Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, by Ships employed there before he arrives at the Place to which he is fent, and actually takes upon him the Command : Thirdly, That when an inferior Flag Officer or private Ships are fent out to reinforce a superior Flag Officer at Jamaica, or elsewhere, the faid superior Flag Officer shall have no Right to any Share in the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, by them, be-fore they arrive within the Limits of his Command, and actually receive fome Orders from him : Fourthly, That a Chief Flag Officer re.

turning home from Jamaica, or elfewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, by the Ships left behind to act under another Command : Fifthly, That i' a Flag Officer is fent to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken, or Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, by Ships that failed from that Port by Order from the Admiraly : Sixthly, That when more Flag Officers than One ferve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken, and Bounty Money for the taking; finking, burning, or deftroying, Ships of War, or Privateers of the Enemy, by any Ships of the Fleet, or Squadron, shall be divided in the following Proportions; videlicet, If there be but Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall have Two Third Parts of the faid One Eighth Part, and the other shall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One Half, and the other Half shall be divided equally among the other Flag Officers : Seventhly, That Commodores, with Captains under them, shall be effeemed as Flag Officers, with respect to their Right to an Eighth Part of Prizes taken, and Bounty Money for Ships taken, funk, burnt, or deftroyed, whether commanding in Chief, or ferving under Command.

### GOD Save the KING.

Genod, Jane 2. We are informed by the Mafter of a Pink arrived here from Barcelona, that on the 27th of laft Month he fell in with feveral Algerine Corfairs off Cape Creo in the Catalonian Sea, who the next Day made a Defcent upon the Coaft, which fo alarmed the Peafants, that they immediately armed themfelves, and drove those Pyrates back to their Veffels, having killed and wounded feveral of them.

Frankfort, June 24. On Monday Morning laft, the Duke of Deux Ponts arrived here, and in the Afternoon continued his Journey for Arolfen, in order to vifit the Princefs of Waldeck his Sifter. We are informed by our laft Advices from Strafbourg, that three Regiments of Foot, and two of Dragoons, which were in Garrifon in Alface, are marched from thence into Provence.

Amflerdam, June 30. They write from Cadiz of the 9th Inftant, that Commodore Baron Wassener, in the Princels Caroline, with two other of our Men of War, and a large Convoy of Merchantmen, arrived fase in that Bay on the 6th.

Hague, July i. The Deputies of the feveral Colleges of the Admiralty of this Country, who

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who are affembled here, apply themfelves with great Diligence to the Affairs of the Marine. Their High Mightineffes the States of this Province being to open their ordinary Affembly on the 7th of next Month, the Points, upon which they are to deliberate, are already fent to the respective Towns.

Brussels, July 6. For this Week past, the Letters from France have not contained any further Particulars of the Siege of St. Philip's Caftle. Our last Advices are still of the 14th of June. It is only faid, that Things do not go on very fuccessfully for the Beliegers ; who complain that their Batteries have not the defired Effect, and cannot deftroy the Works of the Caftle, which are all cut in the Rock. Their Miners also are faid to meet with unfurmountable Obstacles; and they begin to own that the Bloody Flux has got among their Troops, and carries off a great many Men ; which, together with the vigorous Defence of the Garrison, makes the Reduction of the Place very uncer-We are informed by Letters from Duntain. We are informed by Letters from Dun-kirk, that the French begin to talk very much there of an Embarkation, and that Marechal de Belle Ifle, with the Prince of Soubife, and feveral other General Officers, were expected there as Yesterday.
