Naples, June 15.

LAST Week the King invested, in the Name of his Catholick Majesty, the Constable Colonna with the Collar and other Ensigns of the Order of the Golden Fleece. A Body of 100 Recruits are arrived here from Albania, to compleat the Regiment of Royal Macedonia. We have not heard of any Barbary Corsairs appearing on the Coasts of Calabria since our Chebecks have been on a Cruise upon those Coasts.

Rome, June 20. The Cardinals Mellini and Colonna are very much indisposed. A few Days ago we received an Account from Messina, that the Archbishop of that City died there the Beginning of this Month. The Prince and Princess of Villafranca are arrived here from Naples, and intend shortly to set out for Montpellier.

Vienna, June 26. On Thursday Morning last their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by the Archduke Joseph, and the Archdutchesses Mary-Anne and Mary-Christian, arrived here from Schonbrun. They went immediately to the Metropolitan Church, and assisted at High Mass, at which Cardinal Trauson, Archbishop of this City, officiated pontificaly. After Divine Service their Imperial Majesties set out on their Return to Schonbrun, and were saluted from the Ramparts by two Battallions of the Regiment of Field Marshal Count Leopold de Daun, then on Duty. The same Day a great Body of Recruits, with Arms and Accoutrements for the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Prettlack, quartered in Hungary, sailed down the Danube for that Kingdom.

Turin, June 30. Saturday last being the Anniversary of the Birth of his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy, there was a brilliant Appearance at Court. At Noon his Sardinian Majesty and his Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and Nobility; and at Night there was a grand Drawing-Room at Court to compliment her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy on this Occasion.

Berlin, July 3. Major General Count War-tenleben has solicited and obtained the King's Leave to resign his Military Employments, and

his Majesty has thereupon conferred on him the Title of Lieutenant-Generak. The Princess Amelia, Abbess of Quedlinbourg, arrived here last Thursday from her late Journey to Schwedt.

Hague, July 8. Yesterday her Royal Highness the Princess Governante arrived here in perfect Health from Dieren. Her Royal Highness was accompanied by her Son the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline his Sister. The same Day the States of Holland and Westfrizeland opened their ordinary Assembly, and have continued to Day their Deliberations.

Brussels, July 13. According to an exact List of the Camps which the French are forming in Flanders, Picardy, Normandy and Brittany, the Troops that are to compose them amount to 100 Battalions, and 40 Squadrons. They continue to work with great Assiduity in all their Arsenals, and have lately sent away from Maubeuge 14 Pieces of Battering Cannon, and 16 Mortars, with Powder and other Military Stores, which have taken the Road to Normandy. We are informed from Dunkirk, that Marshal de Belle Isle and M. de Paulmy de Argenson arrived there a few Days ago.

Cases

Cases published at the Request of a worthy Clergyman who administer'd the Medicines, continued.
