A PROCLAMATION.

Jocelyn, C. Kildare.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath Signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands Prorogued to Tuesday the Twentieth Day of this Instant July, be further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-fourth Day of August next; We do therefore Publish and Declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further Prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-fourth Day of August next; Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Rome, June 26. Information having been received at Court, that some Barbary Corsairs are cruising on our Coasts, Orders are dispatched to the Commander of the Pope's Gallies, to sail immediately in Quest of them. The King of Portugal has sent to the Pope his Nomination to the eight vacant Bishopricks in that Kingdom, which will be published in the next Consistory. On the 18th Instant, the Constable Colonna notified in Form to the Pope, that he is appointed his Neapolitan Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary for presenting the white Hackney at the ensuing Feast of St. Peter.

Copenhagen, June 29. The King has conferred on Lieutenant General Numfen, Commandant of this City, the Rank of Field Marshal, and on Major General Dehn, that of Lieutenant General of the Forces of this Kingdom.

Vienna, July 3. On Wednesday last the Emperor set out with a numerous Retinue for Hollitsch, and is expected back at Schonbrun the Beginning of next Week. Count Rosenbourg, Minister from this Court to that of Spain, has received his last Instructions, and is preparing to set out for Madrid. A few Days ago several Pieces of heavy Artillery; and a great Quantity of Ammunition, were taken out of our Arsenal and sent away for Olmütz. They talk of a Camp's being to be formed this Summer in Bohemia, and another in Moravia; however it is certain, that several Regiments have received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march.

Florence, July 6. On the 24th past, being the Festival of St. John, Count Richecourt, by Commission from the Emperor to represent his Person on that Occasion, received, with the usual publick Formalities, the Homage from the respective Cities, Towns, and Feudatories of Tuscany, being attended by the chief Nobility, and all the different Magistrates.

Hambourg, July 9. We are informed by our last Letters from Pomerania, that the several Prussian Regiments, quartered in that Dutchy, have Orders to hold themselves ready to march upon the first Notice; and that every Thing is getting ready for their Encampment.

Brussels, July 16. We are credibly informed, that the chief Occasion of Marechal de Belle Isle's and M. de Paulmy's Journey to Dunkirk, was to make the proper Dispositions for re-establishing the Fortifications of that Place, which the French Court is resolved to render even more respectable than before its Demolition.
