#### May it pleafe your Majesty,

WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Protestant Differing Ministers of the North of Ireland, now met in our Annual Astembly, in the present critical Juncture of publick Astairs, take this first Opportunity of concurring with other Bodies of your Majesty's faithful Subjects, in expressing our most fincere Sentiments of Loyalty and Asfection to the best of Kings; who hath on all Occasions shewn himself the tender Father of his People, and the faithful Guardian of their Civil and Religious Rights and Liberties.

Deeply fentible of the manifold and unfpeakable Bleffings, which have accrued to thefe Nations in general, from the Acceffion of the Illuftrious Houfe of Hanover to the Britifh Throne; and filled with the most lively Sentiments of Gratitude in particular, for that Liberty and Quiet, and other Marks of your Royal Favour, which we have enjoyed under your Majefty's most benign Administration; We beg Leave, in our own Name, and in Behalf of all our Brethren in this Kiegdom, to give your Majefty the ftrongeft and most folemm Affurances of our incorruptible Fidelity to your Majefty's Perfen and Government, and inviolable Attachment to the Proteftant Succeffion in your Royal Houfe, as being, under God, the great Bulwark and Support of Civil and Religious Liberty.

## Admiralty-Office, July 27.

His Majefly's Ship the Antelope, which failed from England the 16th of June laft, with Sir Edward Hawke, Lord Tyrawley, and Rear-Admiral Saunders, arrived at Gibraltar on the 3d of this Month, and Sir Edward Hawke took upon him the Command of His Majefly's Squadron there; and on the 9th, the Antelope failed from thence for England, having Admiral Byng, Lieutenant General Fowke, and other Officers on Board, and arrived Yefterday at Spithead, where, Admiral Byng was put under Arreft. Sir Edward intended to fail with the Squadron, from Gibraltar, the Day after the Antelope left that Place.

## New York, June 17.

On the 7th Inflant arrived here, after a long Paffage of eight Weeks, Colonel Webb; as did alfo, on the 16th, Major General Abercrombie, with all the Transports, except one with two Companies of the Highland Regiment on board, which having been separated from the others about ten Days before, is not yet arrived.

Petersbourg, June 26. Her Imperial Ma-jefty continues for the prefent her Refidence at Czarkazelo. Three of our Men of War, lately equipped at Cronstadt, are put to Sea to join three others equipped at Revel, in order to cruize together in the Baltick Sea.

Genoa, June 28. On Monday last we proceeded to the Election of a new Doge, when the Senator John-James Grimaldi was unanimoufly chosen; after which he received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Mi-nifters on that Occasion. We have received nisters on that Occasion. Advice from Modena, that his Serene Highness the Duke of Modena intends to fet out from

thence next Friday on his Return to Milan. Rome, July 3. On the 27th paft the Pope came here from Caffel Gandolfo; and the next Day the Constable Colonna presented him with the Hackney, and fome Pieces of Silver, being the yearly Tribute of the King of the Two Sicilies. To-morrow a private Confiftory is to be held in the Pope's Presence, when the Differences that have arifen between this Court and the Republick of Venice will be taken into Confideration.

Vienna, July 10. The Emperor, who has been for fome Days past at Hollitsch, returned to Schonbrun last Wednesday. And Yesterday Morning their Imperial Majefties, accompanied by the eldeft Archdukes and Archdutcheffes, came from Schonbrun to review the Regiment of Cuiraffiers of the Archduke Peter Leopold. After the Review was over, their Imperial Majesties set out again for Schonbrun, having expressed the greatest Satisfaction at the Appearance and Behaviour of the Officers and Soldiers of that Regiment.

Embden, July 10. The Directors of our Afiatick Company have given publick Notice, that the Merchandize lately brought from China in their Ships the King of Pruffia and Caftle of Embden, will begin to be fold on the 23d of next Month.

Brussels, July 23. All the Letters from France confirm the Account of the Fire that happened lately at Rochefort, by which im-mense Quantities of Naval Stores have been destroyed. The Loss is computed at upwards of two Millions of Livres. M. de la Galissoniere's Fleet is expected back at Toulon, except two Men of War and two Frigates, which are to remain in Port Mahon Harbour. The Duke of Richelieu is likewife daily expected at Paris; and the Comte de Lannion is to command the Troops remaining in the Island of Minorca.
