Rome, July 31.

MARQUIS Trotti, Commander of the Castle of Sinigaglia, having been appointed Governor of the Princes Royal of Saxony, has resigned his former Post, which the Pope has conferred upon Count Marfili. By the last Accounts from Viterbo we hear, that Cardinal Valenti finds great Benefit by those Waters. On the 19th Instant the Pope held a Consistory, in which he preferred M. Caraffa, Bishop of Trivento, to the Bishoprick of Mileto, and nominated M. Potacchi to succeed M. Caraffa in that of Trivento. There was likewise a Promotion of several Archbishopricks in Germany, Spain, Portugal, and for the Spanish and Portuguese East and West Indies. On the 25th died Cardinal Mellini, Minister of the Empress Queen of Hungary, by whose Decease there are six Caps vacant in the College of Cardinals.

Madrid, Aug. 2. Their Catholick Majesties continue in perfect Health at their Palace of Buen Retiro, where they were complimented on the 25th past by the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, on Occasion of its being the Name Day of her most Faithful Majesty the Reigning Queen of Portugal, as well as the Birth Day of the Infante Don Louis, who entered then on the 30th Year of his Age.

Madrid, Aug. 10. The Court received last Night an Express from Cadiz, with Advice, That on the 6th Instant arrived in that Bay from the Vera Cruz and the Havanna, his Catholick Majesty's Ships America, Asia, and Furerte, with the Frigates Jupiter and Mercurio, and an Advice Boat. Their Cargoes consist in 8,460,659 Dollars in Gold and Silver, 8259 Arroves of Cochineal, 8631 Arroves of Indigo, 3120 Arroves of Sugar, 12,869 Arroves of Snuff, 6596 of Tobacco; and other valuable Effects.

Turin, Aug. 4. The Duke of Savoy had an Attack of a Fever the End of last Week, which continued about five Days; but this Day his Royal Highness appeared again in Publick perfectly recovered. There was a slight Earthquake felt here on Saturday the 31st of July, some Minutes before Eleven in the Morning, but the Shock was so inconsiderable that it did no Harm. It was stronger in the Western Part of Piemont towards the Mountains of Dauphiny.

Florence, Aug. 7. On the 24th past Ali Effendi, Envoy from the Bey of Tripoly to the Emperor, as Great Duke of Tuscany, arrived here from Leghorn with a Retinue of twenty Persons. He lodges in one of the Emperor's Houses, and is entertained at his Expence. Three of the Emperor's Coaches wait upon him, and the Master of the Ceremonies and another Gentleman are appointed to attend him constantly during his Stay here. On the 26th he made his first Visit to Count Richecourt, which was performed with great Formality, previous Intimation having been given to many of the Nobility to attend that Ceremony. Reciprocal Visits have passed likewise between the Envoy and the other Members of the Regency, and the Foreign Ministers, (to whom he notified his Arrival in Form) and on the 3d Instant he proceeded on his Journey to Vienna.

Dresden, Aug. 15. Last Week several Pieces of Cannon were sent from hence, up the Elbe, to Pirna and Koenigstein. They are likewise sending to the above Places, a great Quantity of Gunpowder, and all Sorts of Ammunition. All the Officers that were absent from their Duty, are returned to their respective Posts. The Regiments that are quartered in distant Places from this City are ordered to march towards the Camp that is forming between Pirna and Koenigstein.

Brussels, Aug. 17. The Empress Queen has appointed Count Robiano, Chancellor of Brabant, vacant by the Death of M. Schockaert.
