Malta, August 10.

THE Grand Master, who a few Days ago was extremely ill, is now perfectly recovered. On Wednesday last two Algerine Corsairs were brought into this Port. They were taken by some of our Gallies, after a smart Engagement, in which several were killed and wounded on both Sides.

Petersbourg, Aug. 18. The Distemper amongst the Horses, which broke out lately in several Places on the Road from hence to Novogroc, having entirely ceased, the Detachments of Troops ordered there to prevent its spreading, are returned to their respective Quarters. Their Imperial Highnesses the Great Prince and Great Princess, who have been for some Time past at Oranienbaum, returned hither last Thursday.

Naples, Aug. 18. Four of our Chebecks, that returned into Port a few Days ago to take in fresh Water and Provisions, put to Sea again Yesterday to continue their Cruize on the Coast of Calabria.

Leghorn, Aug. 23. Three Dutch Men of War, commanded by Rear Admiral Wassenaer, came into our Road a few Days ago to take in some Refreshments, and Yesterday Morning they failed again, in order to secure their Levant Trade from falling into the Hands of the Algerine Corsairs.

Rome, Aug. 28. The Duke of Modena has nominated the Advocate Bellandi to be his Minister at this Court, in the room of the Abbe Paluzzi, deceased. The Pope's Gallies having been refitted at Civita Vecchia, are sailed on a Cruize against the Barbary Corsairs. On the 21st Instant, being the Anniversary of the Pope's Coronation, the same was celebrated with the usual Solemnity. Cardinal Valenti died at Viterbo on the 29th.

Turin, Sept. 1. His Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy continues mending, but has not yet appeared in publick.

Florence, September 4. On the 23d past, Cardinal Ferroni arrived here from Rome, and the next Day he was complimented by the Members of the Regency, the Foreign Ministers, and the Florentine Nobility, and proposes to pass some Weeks in Tuscany. On the 25th, Count Richecourt returned hither from the Pisa Baths, and will set out for Vienna about the Middle of this Month.

Dresden, Sept. 6. We hear from Halle, that a considerable Body of Prussian Troops are arrived in that Neighbourhood with a large Train of Artillery.

Amsterdam, Sept. 8. They write from Malaga, that one of our Men of War, named the Dolphin, commanded by Captain Zoutman, arrived the 13th of last Month in that Road, with several Merchantmen under her Convoy.

Hague, Sept. 9. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, with the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess Caroline his Sister, arrived here Yesterday in perfect Health from Dieren; and this Morning they received the Compliments of the Members of the Regency, the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, on that Occasion.

Brussels, Sept. 14. Prince Charles of Lorraine's Departure for Vienna is said at present to be very uncertain. His Royal Highness sat out the Day before Yesterday for Mariemont, one of his hunting Seats in the Province of Haynault, where he purposes to continue about three Weeks. According to our Advices from the Frontiers of France, several of the Regiments that have been encamped this Summer on the Coasts of the Ocean, are soon expected back into those Parts. We are credibly informed, that the Marquis de Bonnac is recalled from the Hague, and is to be replaced there by M. d'Affry, with the Character of Minister Plenipotentiary.
