## Madrid, August 30.

HIS Court has received an Account of a compleat Victory obtained the 11th of February, by the combined Troops of Spain and Portugal, over the Army of Rebels of the Seven Miffions of Paraguay. There is no exact Account of the Action as yet arrived; but what we hear in general is, That a Body of 2000 Rebels having advanced towards the King's Army, they were fummoned to furrender, and, upon their Refufal, were attack'd upon a Mountain, where they were beginning to entrench themfelves. The Action lasted an Hour and Half, and the Rebels left, on the Field of Battle, 1311 dead, 153 Prisoners, 8 Cannon, se-veral Colours and Standards, 800 Mares, 600 Mules, and a great Quantity of Cattle. Our Lofs was only 5 Men killed, and 15 wounded. From fo good a Beginning, we flatter ourfelves, that when the laft Transports, fent from hence, shall be arrived, an End may be put to the Rebellion.

His Polish Majefty, Dresden, Sept. 12. and the Princes Xaverius and Charles, were on Tuesday the 7th Instant at Struppen, within the Compass of the Saxon Camp between Pirna and Koenigstein, but the Prussian Hussars have now cut off all Communication between this City and them. On Wednefday the 8th the Pruffians pitched their Camp near this City, and his Pruffian Majefty himfelf took his Quarters at Wilfdrup. The next Day, the Line that had march'd thro' Upper Lufatia croffed the Elbe upon Pontoons at Loschwitz, and enter'd into the Camp near Wilfdrup. The fame Day in the Morning five Battalions, viz. one of Prince Ferdinand, one of Wangenheim, one of Munchau, one of Petersheim, and one of Witt, took Possession of this Capital. That Night his Pruffian Majefty lay at Countess Moczinska's Garden. On the 10th, at Five o'Cock in the Morning, the greatest Part of the Pruffian Army march'd in Order towards the Saxon Camp, and the Head Quarters are now

at Seidlitz, not much above half a German Mile diftant from Pirna, whilft the whole Camp is faid to extend itfelf, on the Right Hand, almost to the Frontiers of Bohemia. That Day one Regiment of Cuiraffiers, and three of Dragoons, march'd thro' this City into the Camp near Wilfdrup, where a Body of Troops of 16000 Men is ftill left. The Cavalry is ex-ceedingly well mounted. The Pruffian Garrifon here has fet Sentries at every Poft where the Saxons formerly kept Guard, and observe as exact and first a Discipline as possible.

Bruffels, Sept. 17. All the Officers in the Auftrian Netherlands have received Orders to join their Regiments directly, and hold them-felves in Readiness to march on the first Notice; and it is faid, that the French are foon to affemble an Army on the Frontiers of this Country, for the Affiftance of the Emprefs-But we do not yet hear of any Motion Queen, among the French Troops. General Luchefi, who, a Twelve-Month ago, upon the Death of Count Lannoy, was nominated to fucceed him in the Government of Bruffels, did not receive his Commission for that Post till Sunday last. He purposes to set out in two Days for the Austrian Army in Bohemia, and is to be followed next Week by the Duke of Aremberg.
