A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty Eighth Day of this Instant September; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said Twenty Eighth Day of September, to Thursday the Eighteenth Day of November next; And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Eighteenth Day of November next, be held, and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Eighteenth Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at *Kensington*, the Twenty Fourth Day of *September*, 1756, in the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

*Colin, August 27.* The Army that is now assembling in the Neighbourhood of this Place, will, when compleat, be as formidable as any the Austrians have had for a long Time past. It is to consist of 19 Regiments of Foot, each of 4 Battalions, and 2 Companies of Grenadiers, 16 Regiments of Dragoons and Cuirassiers, and 4 Regiments of Hussars, besides 20,000 Croats and Esclavonians. And the Camp, that is forming at Ollischau, is to consist of 5 Regiments of Foot, 1 of Dragoons, 3 of Cuirassiers, and 2 of Hussars. This Army is to be commanded in Chief by Field Marshal Count Brown, who is to have 1 General of Foot, viz. Prince Piccolomini, 7 Lieutenant Field Marshals, and 16 Major Generals, to act under him.

*Vienna, Sept. 5.* Last Wednesday Morning the Regiment of Foot of Bethleam, that arrived here the Night before, was reviewed by the Archdukes Charles and Peter Leopold, after which they continued their March to join the Army that is assembling in Bohemia. The same Day a considerable Body of Croats passed by this City on their March to join the said Army.

*Stockholm Sept. 5.* Their Majesties and the whole Court are still at Ulrichsdahl. 'Tis said the States of this Kingdom will separate towards the Beginning of next Month. We hear from Gothenbourg, that the Squadron of Swedish Men of War, fitted out some Time since to protect our Navigation and Commerce, is still in that Port, having, by our last Accounts from thence, upwards of 1600 Men on board, who are ill of different Disorders.

*Madrid, Sept. 6.* The Court has lately received Advice, by two Expresses from Cadiz, That on the 19th past arrived in that Bay, the three Register Ships, *Rayo-Viscaino*, *La Tetis*, and *El Principe*, from Vera Cruz and the Havana; and on the 21st, the *Jorge*, from Buenos Ayres: The Cargoes of the three first consisting of Plate and Fruit, to the Value of 555,994 hard Dollars, and that of the *Jorge*, of 1,138,031 Dollars in Silver, refined and wrought Gold; 26,487 Hides, 5,947 Pounds of Vicunna Wooll, and other Effects.

*Hague, Sept. 16.* They write from Maestricht, that they had there, a few Days ago, a most violent Storm of Wind and Rain, which caused most of the neighbouring Rivers to overflow their Banks, the Waters of which came down with such Rapidity, as not only to carry off a great Number of Cattle, but likewise to destroy several Bridges, and greatly damaged many Houses and other Buildings in the adjacent Villages.
