# Admiralty-Office, September 28, 1756. Extract of a Letter from Commodore Holmes. Grafton off Louisburg, dated Aug. 25, 1756.

N the 26th of July, I was cruizing in His Majefty's Ship Grafton, with the Nottingham, Hornet and Ja-maica Sloop, off Louisburg, about 3 Leagues S. by E. At Eight A. M. the Man at the Top maft head difcovered 4 Sail to the N. E. which was directly to Windward. We gave Chace, and made our first Board to the Southward, they steering directly for us till within 2 Leagues. We tack'd in Hopes to have cut them from their Port, and they haul'd in for it. Half past One P. M. they came to an Anchor in their Harbour, and a little after we brought to, about a League from it, and hoisted our Colours, the Lighthouse bearing North where we lay. At 4 made Sail to the Eastward. Soon as it was dark difpatched the Hornet for Halifax, for Captain Spry to fend out fome of the Ships under his Command to come and join me, and then flood on as before till 3 o'Clock, when we tack'd and ftood in for the Land. At 7 in the Morning of the 27th, the Man from the Maft-head call'd he faw 6 Sail under the Land : About 8 o'Clock I could fee 4 Ships in Chace of us, and I could with my Glass make them to be Men of War, and fee the French Commodore's White Pendant yery plain ; on which I flood from them to the S. E. about a Point from the Wind which drew them from their Harbour, and thought it the best of our Sailing; for I judged them above our Match, or they would not have come out of Port again in fo few Hours. I believe they had only put their Sick and Lumber on Shore, and took Troops off, for they were very full of Men. Half paft 1 P. M. the Headmost of the French Squadron, a Frigate of about 36 Guns, fired on the Jamaica Sloop, which the return'd, and rowed at the fame Time up to the Nottingham, and at our firing at the Frigate, the haul'd her Wind, and the Jamaica bore away to the S. W. which the French Commandant observing, made a Signal for the two Frigates to chace the Sloop, which they immediately obeyed. About 2 the Nottingham fired her Stern Chace at the French Commandant, which he returned with his Bow, and foon after I fired mine. Finding our Shot reached each other, haul'd up my Courfes, bunted my Main-fail, and bore down on the French Commodore, being about a quarter of a Mile from him. It fell calm, and we began to engage, he being on our Starboard Side, the other large French Ship a Stern of him, and the Nottingham on our Larboard Bow, the 2

fomething more. Tho' the French Command dant held us fo cheap at first, by fending his Frigates away, he was fo fenfible of his Miftake, that foon as there was Wind he made the Frigates Signals to rejoin him, and fearing they did not come fast enough to his Affistance, bore down to them and was followed. At 7 they were all close together; at Dusk the Action ceased, they flanding to the Southward, and we to the S. S. E. Our Men lay at their Quarters all Night, expecting to renew the Action in the Morning. At Day light the French Ships bore N. W. by W. diffance 4 or 5 Miles, going away with little Wind at E. S. E. right before it for Louisbourg. We wore and stood to the West= ward, but they never offer'd to look at us. The Wind freihning, they failing much better than our Ships, and the Weather growing hazey, loft Sight of them about Noon : Their chief Fire was at our Mafts, which they wounded, and cut our Stays and Rigging pretty much. I had one lower Deck Gun difmounted, and one upper; fix Men killed, and twenty odd wounded; which is all the Damage the Grafton received.

### Extract of a Letter from Capt. Hood to Commodore Holmes. Jamaica at Sea, August 25.

A Greeable to your Orders, I have look'd into Louisburg, where were only 2 Topfail Veffels, and, as I thought it of fome Confequence to know where the Men of War were gond to, that engaged you on the 27th paft, I fent the Lieutenant in the Pinnace to go and lay under the Land to the Eastward of the Light Houle, with Directions to feize the first Vessel he could. In the mean Time I ftood off and on, and at Day-light was close in; took up the Pinnace and a Shallop the had taken with four Men, whom I have examined feparately, and found to tell the fame Story. One of the Top-fail Veffels in the Harbour is the large Store-ship, that unloaded at Millidue, quite unrigged, and the other a Snow from Rochford. The Men of War failed for France 15 Days fince, and were join'd at Sea by a Frigate called the Concord from St. Ann. Their Names and Force are as follows; the Heroe, a new Ship of 74. Guns, the Illustrious of 64, the Perfect of 36, and Serene of 30. Upon my asking how the French came not to engage the English on the 26th, they fay, they went in to put fome Money on Shore, and get M in, and that they prefied a great Number that Night. I then asked them, whether it was not expected, by the People on Shore, that the English would be taken; they replied, every one made fure of it. They likewile tell me, that their Commandant had 26 Men killed on the Spot; that Frigates a Mile from us, and the Jamaica 50 died of their Wounds in 3 or 4 Days, and that

that above 100 more were wounded; that her lower Mafts were fo fhattered, as fcarcely to be made ferviceable to carry her home, her Sides full of Shot-holes, and had 29 Shot between Wind and Water, many of them thro' and thro' : The other large Ship but -little damaged; and the Frigates came off in the fame Manner.

Sunday laft his Royal Turin, Sept. 8. Highness the Duke of Savoy faw the Foreign Ministers in his Bed-Chamber for the first Time fince his Indifpolition. Yefterday the City was illuminated as usual, being the Anniversary of the Battle fought at Turin. Florence, Sept. 11. In Confequence of the

expr. fs Orders from the Emperor, on the 7th Inftant, the Senator Antinori, with Engineers and proper Affiftants, fet out from hence to meet the Deputies of the Republick of Lucca on the Confines, to fettle every Thing with re-gard to the Waters of the Lake of Bientina, which Affair has been fo long in Difpute be-tween these two States. The same Day M. de Canigliac, Auditor di Ruota for the French Nation at Rome, arrived here from that City in his Way to Parma, where he propules to pals fome Weeks.

Bruffels, Sept. 21. The French Troops en-camped at Dunkirk and Calais, feparated on the 15th Inftant; and all those which composed the other Camps, formed along the Coafts of the Ocean, were likewife to feparate the fame Day. General Luchefi departed from hence on Sunday last. General Marschal, Governor of Luxembourg, has likewife received Orders to repair

immediately to the Army in Bohemia. Bruffels, Sept. 24. Two Batallions of each of the 10 Auftrian Regiments in the Low Countries, with all the Companies of Grenadiers, are preparing to take the Field upon the The Companies which confifted first Notice. of 120. Men, are now augmenting to 150, by Draughts out of the other Batallions, except those of Grenadiers, which are to remain upon the old Footing of 100 Men each. The Regiment of Cuiraffiers and that of Dragoons, each of 1000 Men, which are in this Country, are alfo to take the Field; and the whole will form a Body of 16000 Men, with a proportionable Train of Artillery. But the Intentions of the Court of Vienna are not known, But the Intentions with regard to their Deffination, nor the Time of their affembling, neither are the General Officers appointed who are to command them, It is however given out that they are to be joined by the 24000 Men, which the French Court is obliged, by the Treaty of the 1st of May, to fend to the Affiftance of the Empress Queen, and which, they fay, are actually affembling in the Neighbourhood of Metz. The Duke of Aremberg is to fet out this Day for the Auftrian Army in Bohemia.
