Lisbon, August 24.

THE Fleet from Fernambuco, consisting of 15 Ships, arrived in the Texel last Friday. A few Days ago two of our Men of War put to Sea on a Cruise against the Barbary Corsairs.

Vienna, Sept. 15. This Morning seven Companies of the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Archduke Peter Leopold, marched from hence for Bohemia, and are to be replaced by the same Number of Companies from the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Portugal.

Liege, Sept. 21. We are informed by Letters from Givet, that the French are not only buying up great Quantities of Provisions and Forage, but that they are also collecting together a great Number of Boats for transporting a large Train of Artillery.

Cologne, Sept. 22. Last Monday General Count Luchesi passed through this City for Bohemia, in order to join the Imperial Army. 'Tis said that a large Body of French Troops will soon arrive in this Country, and that they are to pass the Rhine on a Bridge of Boats to be prepared for that Purpose in the Neighbourhood of Neuwied.

Hague, Sept. 23. The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces are deliberating on the Affairs of their Department. We learn by Letters of the 18th Instant from Berlin, that Count Puebla, their Imperial Majesty's Minister to that Court, was set out from thence on his Return to Vienna.

Hamburg, Sept. 24. Yesterday the Burghers of this City were assembled, and after great Debates, it was at last agreed on to raise a Contribution under the Denomination of Head Money, in order to be employed towards finishing the rebuilding of the Parish Church of St. Michael, which was destroyed by a Flash of Lightning in March 1750. This Morning Baron d'Hæfeler, his Prussian Majesty's Envoy at the Court of Denmark, who has been some Months absent from his Post on Account of his private Affairs, arrived here from Berlin, on his Return to Copenhagen.

Dresden, Sept. 26. Every Thing is here in the same Situation as it was almost three Weeks ago, except, that since Wednesday last, the 22d Instant, the Prussian Soldiers have received Orders to live for the Future upon their Pay, and not to be any longer entertained by the Burgeses. The Country People also are ordered not to deliver any more Forage; but what is wanted for the Erecting of a most complete Magazine, is paid for with ready Money;

for which Purpose, one of those who had farmed the Excise here, whose Name is Schimmelman, has received a considerable Sum of Money out of the Prussian Cash. His Prussian Majesty continues before Pirna with an Army sufficient to block up the Saxons in their Camp; to which Place, now and then, one of his Polish Majesty's Waggons, loaded with Wine, Flower, Game, Spices, &c. is permitted to go from hence. On Saturday last, the 18th Instant, fifteen hundred Hungarian Sheep, which were to enter the Saxon Camp through the Wood, were all taken by the Prussian Hussars. The greatest Part of the Prussian Army is actually in Bohemia under Field Marshal Keith's Orders. They took Tetschen, a City with a Palace situated upon a Rock, which belongs to Count Thun, and is considered as a Frontier Fortrefs against Saxony; and made the Garrison, consisting of one Captain, one Lieutenant, four under Officers, and twelve Soldiers, Prisoners of War. These Prisoners arrived here Yesterday, and are to be conducted by Water to Magdeburgh. 'Tis assured that the Prussian and Austrian Armies in Bohemia are so near each other, that we may soon expect to hear of a Battle between them.

Brussels, Oct. 1. Four Independent Companies, of 100 Men each, are ordered to be forthwith raised in the Austrian Netherlands. The Orders for assembling the Troops, that are to take the Field, are not yet given out. Those that are intended by the Court of France for the Assistance of the Empress-Queen, are actually assembling at Metz.

Admiralty-Office, October 4, 1756.

Pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information hath been sent to this Office, That the Ship Ann, of Bristol, William Perry, Master, Burthen about 150 Tons, laden with 304 Hogheads of Tobacco, 29 Tons of Pig Iron, and 7000 Staves, and bound from the River York in Virginia to Bristol, was drove on Shore about Eleven at Night, on the 25th past, on the West Side of Dale within the Port of Milford, where she entirely beat to Pieces; the Tobacco Hogheads were staved, and the Tobacco entirely lost; that the Pig Iron remained in deep Water, and was not come at, and that some Pieces of the Cables, some of the Sails and Rigging, and some of the Staves, which were on board, are the only Things which were then saved.

General Post-Office, October 2, 1756.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the Mail, dispatched from this Office upon Tuesday the 28th of September, from Chesterfield to Sheffield, was, on Thursday last, the 30th of the same Month, about half an Hour past Six of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, in a Lane between Coal Ashon and Little Norton, in the County of Derby, by Two Men on Foot, who took from him and carried away the Mail, containing the Bag of Letters from London to Sheffield, and likewise the Bag containing the Bye and Cross-Road Letters, from Chesterfield to Sheffield, as also four Shillings and Sixpence from the said Post-Boy.

The two Persons who committed this Robbery are described as middle sized Men, and wearing, the one of them a blue Coat and white Waistcoat, and the other a light coloured Frock; one of them was pitted with the Small-Pox, and the other had a Mark upon one Hand, as if the same had been cut.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the two Persons who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
