Lisbon, August 24.

HE Fleet from Fernambuco, confifting of 15 Ships, arrived in the Texel laft Friday. A few Days ago two of our Men of War put to Sea on a Cruize against the Barbary Corfairs.

Vienna, Sept. 15. This Morning feven Companies of the Regiment of Cuiraffiers of Archduke Peter Leopold, marched from hence for Bohemia, and are to be replaced by the fame Number of Companies from the Regiment of Cuiraffiers of Portugal.

Liege, Sept. 21. We are informed by Letters from Givet, that the French are not only buying up great Quantities of Provisions and Forage, but that they are also collecting together a great Number of Boats for transporting a large Train of Artillery.

Last Monday General Cologn, Sept. 22. Count Luchefi pailed through this City for Bohemia, in order to join the Imperial Army. 'Tis faid that a large Body of French Troops will foon arrive in this Country, and that they are to pass the Rhine on a Bridge of Boats to beprepared for that Purpofe in the Neighbourhood of Neuwied.

Hague, Sept. 23. The Deputies of the fe-veral Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces are deliberating on the Affairs of their Department. We learn by Letters of the 18th Instant from Berlin, that Count Puebla, their Imperial Majeflies Minister to that Court, was fet out from thence on his Return to Vienna.

Hamburgh, Sept. 24. Yesterday the Burghers of this City were assembled, and after great Debates, it was at last agreed on to raife a Contribution under the Denomination of Head Money, in order to be employed towards finishing the rebuilding of the Parifh Church of St. Michael, which was deftroyed by a Flash of Lightning in March 1750. This Morning Baron d'Hæseler, his Prussian Majesty's Envoy at the Court of Denmark, who has been fome Months absent from his Post on Account of his private Affairs, arrived here from Berlin, on his Return to Copenhagen.

Dreiden, Sept. 26. Every Thing is here in the fame Situation as it was almost three Weeks ago, except, that fince Wednefday laft, the 22d Inftant, the Pruffian Soldiers have re-ceived Orders to live for the Future upon their Pay, and not to be any longer entertained by the Burgefles. The Country Pcople alfo are ordered not to deliver any more Forage ; but] what is wanted for the Erecting of a most compleat Magazine, is paid for with ready Money;

for which Purpofe, one of those who had farmed the Excife here, whofe Name is Schimmelman, has received a confiderable Sum of Money out of the Pruffian Cash. His Pruffian Majefty continues before Pirna with an Army fufficient to block up the Saxons in their Camp 3 to which Place, now and then, one of his Po-lish Majesty's Waggons, loaded with Wine, Flower, Game, Spices, &c. is permitted to go from hence. On Saturday last, the 18th In-stant, fifteen hundred Hungarian Sheep, which were to enter the Saxon Camp through the Wood, were all taken by the Pruffian Huffars. The greatest Part of the Pruffian Army is actually in Bohemia under Field Marshal Keith's Orders. They took Tetschen, a City with a Palace fituated upon a Rock, which belongs to Count Thun, and is confidered as a Frontier Fortrefs against Saxony; and made the Garrifon, conlifting of one Captain, one Lieutenant, four under Officers, and twelve Soldiers, Prifoners of War. These Prifoners arrived here Yesterday, and are to be conducted by Water to Magdeburgh. 'Tis affured that the Pruffian and Auftrian Armies in Bohemia are fo near each other, that we may foon expect to hear of a Battle between them.

Brussels, Oct. 1. Four Independent Companies, of 100 Men each, are ordered to be forthwith raifed in the Auftrian Netherlands. The Orders for affembling the Troops, that are to take the Field, are not yet given out. Those that are intended by the Court of France for the Affiltance of the Empress-Queen, are actually affembling at Metz.

Admiralty-Office, October 4, 1756. PUrfuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information hath been fent to this Office, That the Ship Ann, of Briftol, William Perry, Mafter, Burthen about 150 Tons, laden with 304 Hogfheads of Tobacco, 29 Tons of Pig Iron, and 7000 Staves, and bound from the River York in Virginia to Briftol, was drove on Shore about Eleven at Night, on the 25th past, on the West Side of Dale within the Port of Milford, where she entirely beat to Pieces; the Tobacco Hogsheads were staved, and the Tobacco entirely loft; that the Pig Iron remained in deep Water, and was not come at, and that fome Pieces of the Cables, fome of the Sails and Rigging, and fome of the Staves, which were on board, are the only Things which were then fayed.
