Dresden, October 2.

WE received this Day about Noon the News of a Victory the King of Prussia has gained over the Austrians. The King of Prussia was posted in the Neighbourhood of a Village called Welmina, with an Army of about 35000 Men, and Marshal Brown was between that Place and Lowositz, with his whole Army, amounting, it is said, to near 60000 Men. The Action, which began at Seven o'Clock in the Morning, was obstinate and bloody; but about Noon, the whole Austrian Army retreated, and left the Prussians Masters of the Field of Battle; and, as they went through Lowositz, set Fire to the Suburbs, to stop the Prussians in their Pursuit. It is thought the Austrians have lost about 4000 Men, and the Prussians half that Number.

Berlin, Oct. 3. This Morning, about Seven o'Clock, an Officer in the Guards, arrived here from the Prussian Camp in Bohemia, in 39 Hours; he had no Letters from any Body, but only a short Note to the Queen Mother, wrote by the King himself on the Field of Battle, acquainting her Majesty with his having gained a complete Victory over the Austrians, which cost him 2000 Men. The Particulars that have been collected from the Officer, are, That on the 30th of September, the King of Prussia's Army moved from their Camp at Auflig; that when they came to the Ground they were to occupy that Night, they perceived some Tents pitched, which they took to be an advanced Guard, or some small Out-Party of Austrians; but that his Prussian Majesty had the Precaution to make his Army remain under Arms all Night; and, early in the Morning, the 1st of October, observed some Motions among the Enemy, which very soon shewed that the whole Austrian Army were preparing to attack him. That the King

of Prussia made the proper Dispositions, according to his Ground; and, about Seven in the Morning, the Austrians attacked, with great Fury, the Left Wing of the Prussians, and the Action continued very hot, till half an Hour past One, when the Austrians gave Way, but retired in good Order; and, to cover their Retreat, burnt the Town of Lowositz, in which they had a Magazine. The Number of the Austrians under Marshal Brown are said to be about 60000, and the Prussian Army from 35 to 40000 only, by Reason of several Detachments left to guard the Passes in the Mountains, and on the Elbe. The King had under him, his Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and Marshal Keith, having left his Brothers the Princes Henry and Ferdinand, with many other General Officers, in his Camp at Sedelitz. A distinct Relation of the Action is daily expected.

Leghorn, Sept. 27. The 21st Instant arrived here His Majesty's Ship the Jersey, commanded by Sir William Burnaby, and the Isis, commanded by Captain Wheeler, having been detached by Sir Edward Hawke to take under their Convoy the Ships homeward bound from this Port, and to bring away the Snow St. George, Captain Fortunatus Wright, which had been for some Time unjustly detained here. The two Men of War abovementioned, accordingly left this Port on the 24th, with the said Snow St. George, and the Trade under their Convoy.

Brussels, October 8. The Austrian Troops which are to march from the Low Countries into Bohemia, are the German Regiments of Charles Lorrain, Salm-Salm, Platz, Bareith, Colloredo and de Wied, consisting each of four Battalions and two Companies of Grenadiers;

two Battalions and the Grenadier Companies of each of the Walloon Regiments of Los Rios and Arberg, and the Companies of Grenadiers belonging to the other two Walloon Regiments of Ligne and Saxe Gotha, besides the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Anhalt Zerbst, and that of Dragoons of Ligne, each of six Squadrons. The whole it is computed will amount to about 16000 Foot, and 2000 Horse and Dragoons. They are all to receive immediately a Gratification of three Months Pay. This Corps is to be assembled at Luxembourg against the latter End of this Month. The Infantry is to be commanded by four Majors General, viz. Count d'Arberg, M. Hanger, the Prince of Stolberg, and the Duke d'Urfel; Major General Count d'Argenteau commands the Cavalry. Their High Mightinesses have ordered back into their Dominions five Battalions of the Troops which they have at Tournay, Menin, Ypres, Furnes and Knocke. We are now positively informed that the Troops which the French are sending to the Assistance of the Empress Queen, are to be assembled at Pfaltzbourg on the 17th Instant, under the Command of the Prince of Soubize.
