AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 13th Day of October 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 29th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the same should be continued for some longer Time, — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do at any Time, during the space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th of this Instant October, (being the Expiration of the Time limited by His Majesty's aforesaid Order in Council) presume to transport into any Parts, out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, entituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre;" and to enforce the Law for "empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque-Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Petersburgh, September 11. Yesterday being the Feast of St. Alexander Newsky, the same was celebrated at Court with the usual Formalities: On this Occasion her Imperial Majesty came here from Czarkazelo, and assisted at Divine Service in the Chapel of the Palace; after which she dined in Publick with the Knights of that Order, and at Night there was a Supper and a Ball at Court.

Naples, Sept. 14. The Report that prevailed some Time since of the Death of the Princess Maria-Josepha, their Majesties eldest Daughter, was without Foundation, that Princess being perfectly recovered from her Indisposition.

Milan, Sept. 18. This Morning the Battalions ordered to be detached from the Regiments in Garrison at Mantua, began their March for Bohemia, and are to be successively followed by others from the different Garrisons in that Dutchy. The whole Number of Troops to be sent from thence amounts to about 7000, including Holi's Regiment of Dragoons.

Prague, Sept. 26. Yesterday, and the Day before, several Battalions of Croats marched through this City to join the Imperial Army under the Command of Prince Piccolomini.

Madrid, Sept. 27. On Thursday the 23d Instant, their Catholick Majesties were complimented by all the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, on Occasion of it's being the King's Birth Day, which was celebrated in the usual Manner; and at Night a new Opera, called *La Niteti*, was performed. Count Rosembergh, the Imperial Minister appointed to reside at this Court, arrived here some Days ago; and his Predecessor, Count Migazzi, set out this Morning on his Return to Vienna.

Turin, Sept. 29. On Saturday last the 25th, his Sardinian Majesty, with the rest of the Royal Family, left Turin, in order to reside at the Venerie till the Beginning of December. The same Morning the Count Tana was declared Governor of Coni; and the Count Montault, Governor of Fenestrelles; Count Maffet was appointed Colonel of the Regiment of Piemont; and Count St. Sebastien, Son of the Marquis of Soins, Colonel of that of Aost. Some other inferior Military Promotions were made, occasioned by the Removal of these Officers from their different Corps. The King of Sardinia has named the Chevalier St. Peyre, one of the first Equeries of his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy, to be his Ambassador at the Court

Court of Madrid, in the room of the Baron of Blonay, whose bad State of Health has long made him follicit to be recalled.

Brussels, Oct. 12. According to the Advices received Yesterday from Paris, the March of the French Troops, which were to be assembled under the Command of the Prince de Soubise, at Pfaltzbourg, is suspended till further Orders. The Austrians are not yet in Motion, nor have they yet received their last Orders for Marching. M. d'Affry arrived here on Sunday Evening, and proceeded Yesterday Morning on his Journey to the Hague.

General Post-Office, October 2, 1756.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the Mail, dispatched from this Office upon Tuesday the 28th of September, from Chesterfield to Sheffield, was, on Thursday last, the 30th of the same Month, about half an Hour past Six of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, in a Lane between Coal Aston and Little Norton, in the County of Derby, by Two Men on Foot, who took from him and carried away the Mail, containing the Bag of Letters from London to Sheffield, and likewise the Bag containing the Bye and Cross-Road Letters, from Chesterfield to Sheffield, as also four Shillings and Sixpence from the said Post-Boy.

The two Persons who committed this Robbery are described as middle sized Men, and wearing, the one of them a blue Coat and white Waistcoat, and the other a light-coloured Frack; one of them was pitted with the Small-Pox, and the other had a Mark upon one Hand, as if the same had been cut.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the two Persons who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
