The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 29th of April laft, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this King-

dom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Inftant October : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majerty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the fame fhould be continued for fome longer Time, — His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majefty's Service) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th of this Inftant October, (being the Expiration of the Time limited by His Majefty's aforefaid Order in Council) prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coaftwife, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammuni-tion, or fhip or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the fame into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Per-miffion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forseitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed the last Seffion of Parliament, entituled, "An Act to "impower His Majefty to prohibit the Expor-tation of Salt Petre;" and to inforce the Law for "impowering His Majefty to prohibit "the Exportation of Guapewder, or any Sort " of Arms and Ammunitico, and alfo to im-" power His Majefty to reitrain the carrying " Coaftwife of Sale Petre, Gunpowder, or any " Sort of Arms or Ammunition," And the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, | the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain, the Loro Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Miffer General of the Ordnance, and His Majetty's Se cretary at War, are to give the neceffary Direc-tions herein, as to them may respectively ap-W. Ratisbon, Off. 5. We are informed by Letters from the Electorate of Bavaria and the Upper Palatinate, that the Crops having proved this Year very indifferent, the Exportation of all Kinds of Grain, out of those Countries, is strictly prohibited under severe Penalties.

Hamburgh, Oct. 8. Yefterday Morning we had a moft violent Storm of Wind at almoft Weft; which began at about Nine, and continued till Break of Day next Morning: Several Ships were driven from their Anchors in this Harbour: The Waters role to a very great Height in the Old Town, and great Quantities of Merchandize have been greatly damaged, which will make the Lofs very confiderable; and we alfo expect to hear of very great Loffes at Sea.;

Drefden, Ost. 13: On the 8th, 9th, 10th; and 11th Inftant, feveral wounded Soldiers, Pruffians and Auffrians, were brought hither. They are all but flightly wounded; those that are in Danger of Life remain at Auffig. The Pruffian General Oertz is dead of his Wounds, and has been buried here. It is reported that the Auftrians under Count Piccolomini joined those under Marshal Brown on Friday last the 8th Instant. The same Day, at Three of the Clock in the Morning, the Saxons attempted to pais the Elbe, but were driven back. In this Encounter the Lofs of the Pruffians amounted to two or three Men, but that of the Saxons is thought to have been confiderably greater. Yef-terday the Report was general here, that an Auftrian Body of Troops, to the Number of 30000 Men was at Schandau, about Half a German Mile distant from Konigstein, and that the Saxons had fortified the Head of a Bridge on the other Side of the Elbe. Laft Night the Magistrate ordered, at the Requisition of the Commandant General Willich, that this Morning about Six o'Clock, each Houfe in this Town should fend one Man provided with a Spade and Pick-ax, to enlarge the Ditch of this Fortification, and to put it in a Condition fufficient to prevent a Surprize, and to fecure their Maga-zine, which is very confiderable; and this has accordingly been done. The Country People are extremely well pleafed with the exact Payment made them for what they deliver to the Pruffian Troops.

Bruffels, Oct. 19. Two hundred cover'd Waggons, with four Horfes each, arrived here aft Saturday for the Ufe of the Troops that re to march from hence. They are now pofted without the Gate which leads to Mechlin; bus

but the last Orders for the Troops to put themfelves in Motion are not yet arrived. The Regiments of Marjoribanks and Kinschot, which were in Garrison at Tournay, marched by this Town on Friday and Saturday last, in their Way to Guelderland.

# General Post-Office, October 2, 1756.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the Mail, difpatched from this Office upon Tuesday the 28th of September, from Chefterfield to Sheffield, was, on Thursday last, the 30th of the fame Month, about half an Hour past Size of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, in a Lane between Coal Afhon and Little Norton, in the County of Derby, by Two Men on Foot, who took from him and carried away the Mail, containing the Bag of Letters from London to Sheffield, and likewife the Bag containing the Bye and Großs-Road Letters, from Chefterfield to Sheffield, as also four Shillings and Six-pence from the faid Post-Boy.

The two Perfons who committed this Robbery are de-

scribed as middle fized Men, and wearing, the one of them a blue Coat and white Waistcoat, and the other a light coloured Frock; one of them was pitted with the Small-Pox, and the other had a Mark upon one Hand, as if the fame had been cut.
