His day his Majefly was pleafed to caufe to be iffued, His Proclamation as follows; Where as We have fully refelved to ufe Our

ntmost endeavours for the prefervation of the True Religion established in this Kingdom, to which We have always ashered, sgainft all temptati-ons whatfoever; And in order to this great end, have thought fit to Command all Popish Priests an Fefuits. being our Nathral born Subjects, to depart out of, and not to return or come into this Our Kingdom, under Juth genalties, and in fuch manner as wherein after expressed We do thereford by this Our Royal Pr slamarion, firidly Charge and Command all Fefuirs and Priefis whatfoever, being Our Natural born Subjects who have taken Orders from the See of Rome, or by the Authority, or presended Authority thereof, and not being under restraint by Imprisonment, (except Mr. John Huddlefton, who di i eminenti, (cupt Mr. House from Worcefter) Thurbey do befure the 25 day of March next enfuing, depart out of this. Our Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales and Town of Berwich upon Tweed; and that they or any of them, or any wither fuch Priefts or Fesuits, do not after the said 25 day of March, presume to some or return into Our faid Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick upon Tweed; upon pair of baving the penal-sies of the Laws and Statutes of this Our Realm in-flisted upon them : And for their better means to de-part accordingly, we do hereby Deslare and Publish Our further Will and Pleasures That if at any time before the laid 15 day of March, they, or any of them find refore to the Town or Port of Berwick, or to any Port-Town of our faid Ki gdem of England, or Dominion of Wales, and there declare himfeif to the Magistrate of the Town, or the Officers of any Port, that he is a Priefts and that he is there to take Shipping for Dis Pajlage, they fall fuffer him or them quietly to depart, and Jhall fee them Shipt and fent away for Foreign Porses, and give their their furtheranca for their de-parsura. And so the end, this Our Proslamation may be the bester observed and obeyed, We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Lieutenants, Deputy Lieuzenants, Commiflioners, Justices of the Feace, Mayors, Sberiffs, Bayliffs and all other Our Officers and Mini-Bers mhat oever That they be sircum peet and vigilant each of scemain their feveral Charges. from and after she faid 25 d.y of March next, in fearshing for, and diffevering all fuch Jefuiss and Priests as aforefaid. es fall prefume to remain or come into our faid King-dom of England, Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick, contrary to Our Royal Pleasure and Command herein declared, that fo the Laws may be put in due execution se with them.

Naples, Ian: 15. From Sicily we have advice, that the Chevalier de Valbelle's arrival with the Brench Succors at Mefsine, was to featonable for those Inhabitants, that without it, they must have been necessitated to furrender themfelves to the Spaniards, or elfe flarye 3 that he, and the Soldiers he brought with him,

about 600 in all, had (as may well be imagined) been received with the greateft joy and fatistaction poffible. Our Viceroy not to be wanting in the mean time on his part, labors with great earneitnefs to fupply the Viceroy of Sickly with a confiderable affiftance from hence, in order to which his Excellency has demanded of the Nobility, that they according to their refpective qualities, will raife certain Horfemen, to be formed into Troops and Regiments for his Majellies fervice againft the Mefsinefs: they have not as yet returned any anfwer, though it is faid, that they would rather contribute, what may be reafonably expected of them, in Money. The 'Spaniards' have taken a Veffel, going for Mejsina, in which they found 5000 Meafures of Corn, and 5000 Crowns in Money. Venice, Ian. 26. The Letters which we received

this week by Land from Conft ntinople, are dated the 28 of November, and give us an account, of a great fire which had happened in that City fome days before's by which above 3000 chops or Warehoufes, which aff their Merchandifes in them, had been confumed to affris ; that the Grand Signior, who was then at Adridnople, had been ill of a Feavor, which cont inued upon him above 20 days rogether, but that at the coming away of thefe Letters, he was pretty well recovered that they had not any fresh news of the Progrets of the Persians, farther then that according to their last advices, they feemed still to look towards. Babilon, upon which the Armenians, and other confiderable Merchanis were retired from thence ; The fame Letters add, that a famous Arabian Rebel, fraving gotten a good Body of Men together, had facked and pillaged the City of A. ecca, in which is the Tomb of Mahomer, and where by that means was an immenfe riches heaped up, by the devout Turks, who made pilgrimages to visit his Tomb ; the Turks are greatly afflicted therear, and out of their hatural fuspition, look upon it as an ill prefage to the whole Ottoman Empire.

Disto, Feb. i. On Sarurday last dyed here our Doge, Signior Dominico Contarini, in the 92 year of his age, to the grief of all people, who had a particular veneration and effectm for his great Verties and Merits.

Madrid, Jan, jo. The Kings Houshold is now eftablished, but his Majefty is not yet removed to his own Apartment; it is reported as if his Majefty would go this Spring to Arago', to swear the observation of the Laws of that Kingtom; From Gadi's we have advice of the 15 inflane; of the arrival there of Captain Weimang in the New aftle; as likewife of two Duteh Men of War from Holland, wh about the South Cape, happened to meet with an Argiers Man of War of 18 Guns, and 113 Men, which they funk, having only faved 34 of her Men. The last acvices from Sisily gave us an account of the arrival of the Duke of Ferranding at Falerino, and of his good Reception there is as likewife of the ill poflure the affairs of the Mefflncfes were in.
