AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 13th Day of October 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 29th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the same should be continued for some longer Time, — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th of this Instant October, (being the Expiration of the Time limited by His Majesty's aforesaid Order in Council) presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, entituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre;" and to enforce the Law for "impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of

Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Vienna, Oct. 19. The Empress Queen has given the Command of the Regiment of Cuirassiers of the late Count Radicati, who was killed in the Battle with the Prussians on the 1st Instant, to Prince Lowenstein. We have received an Account, that the first Column of Troops, who are marching from Italy to Bohemia, are already arrived in Upper Austria. They write from the Camp at Budyn, that Count Verneda, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Cardoua, died on Thursday last of the Wounds he received at the late Battle of Lowofchutz. The same Letters also inform us, that all the Prussians, taken at the said Battle, amounting to about 300, were sent from thence to Prague. Yesterday died here, in the 33d Year of his Age, Count Leopold de Dietrichstein, Count of the Holy Roman Empire, and one of their Imperial Majesties Chamberlains, &c.

Frankfort, Oct. 20. We are informed by our last Letters from Landau, that the Body of French Troops, which were assembled in the Neighbourhood of Fort-Lewis upon the Rhine, is separated; and the Regiments, of which it was composed, are marched into Garrison at Straßbourg, Schlestadt, Huninguen, New-Brissac, Phaltzbourg, &c. They write from Franconia, that Part of the Troops of the Prince Bishop of Wurtzbourg is preparing to set out for Bohemia, in order to join the Army of the Empress-Queen.
