Admiralty Office, November 6, 1756.

BY Letters from Vice Admiral Watfon, dated the 15th of February and 10th of March laft, in Geriah Harbour, we have an Account, that he arrived off that Place the 11th of February, with the Ships under-mentioned, where he was informed Tujagee Angria was treating with the Morattoes to furrender the Place to them.

In Confequence of this Intelligence, the Vice Admiral fent him a Summons the next Morning to furrender the Town and Fort to him, but receiving no Answer in the Time he propofed, and finding the Morattoes (from whom he has received no Affiftance) were trifling with him, he weighed in the Afternoon, and flood into the Harbour in two Divifions, in the Order as under-mentioned: The Enemy fired at the Ships as they paffed their Batteries; but as foon as they were got by them, and were properly placed, they began fuch a Fire as foon filenced their Batteries, and likewise the Fire from their Grabs. Soon after Four o'Clock a Shell was thrown into the Refortation, an armed Ship which Angria fometime ago took from the East India Company, which fet her on Fire, and very foon after his whole Fleet fhared the fame Fate, and are all entirely deftroyed. In the Night the Vice Admiral landed all his Troops, fufpecting the Enemy would endeavour to let in the Morattoes, which Suppofition was verified by a Deferter, who informed Mr. Watfon that Angria (who himfelf was not in the Fort) had fent Orders to his Brother-in-Law, who commanded the Garrifon, on no Account to fuffer the Englifh to come in.

On the 13th in the Afternoon, after feveral Meffages had paffed to no Purpofe, the Vice Admiral renew'd the Attack, and in about twenty Minutes they flung out a Flag of Truce, but the Admiral infifting that his Troops fhould be let in, and their Colours hawled down, and they not complying with his Demand, he repeated his Attack with great Vigour, and the Enemy very foon called out for Mercy, which our Troops were near enough to hear very diftinctly. An Officer with fixty Men marched into the Fort that Night, and the next Morning all our Forces.

The Vice Admiral reports, that all his Officers and Men behaved with great Spirit; that our Lofs was very inconfiderable, as well with refpect to Men as to the Damage done to the Ships, infomuch that he fhould have been able to have proceeded to Sea again in Twenty-four Hours, had there been a Necessity for fo doing.

They found upwards of two hundred Guns in the Place, fix Brafs Mortars, and a very large

Quantity of Ammunition of all Kinds; and in Money and Effects about 120,000 l. or 130,000 l.

The Grabs, which were burnt, confifted of eight Ketches and one Ship, befides two others which were building, one of which was to carry 40 Guns; and a confiderable Number of fmall Veffels called Gallivats.

There were in the Fort about 2000 People, 300 of whom bore Arms. Among the Prifoners are, Angria's Wife and Children, his Mother, his Brother-in-Law, and the Commander in Chief of his Grabs.

The Vice-Admiral has left about 300 of the East India Company's European Troops in the Garrifon, and as many Seapoys, and three or four of the Company's armed Veffels in the Harbour, for the Defence of the Place, as it is judged to be extremely well fituated for the Interest of the Company, and very tenable.

The Continuation of the Journal of the Army in the Camp of Budin.

October 2. After having paffed the Night on the Field of Battle, the Army entered quietly into the Camp of Budin, and, by the particular Order of Marshal Brown, we took all the poffible Care of our wounded, as well as thofe of the Enemy; and his Excellency fhewed great Civility and Politenefs to the eight Pruffian Officers, who were taken in the Battle of Lowofchutz.

Oct. 3. The Prince of Durlack, the Duke of Arenberg, the Counts Bendiſt Daun, Althan, and Joſeph Eſterhaſi, all Generals who are to ſerve in this Army, arrived here.

Oct. 4. The Regiment of Spleni, Huſſars, who came from Hungary, arrived here in very good Order. This Day, being the Feaſt of our Auguſt Emperor, his Excellency ordered Te Deum to be ſung in the Camp, and treated all the General Officers at Dinner; in the Evening the Army were ranged in Order of Battle, and the Rejoicings were concluded by a triple Fire of the Muſketry of the Army.

Oct. 5. All the ſick and wounded were ſent to Prague to be better taken Care of; and as his Excellency Marshal Brown had ſent back, on their Parole, the Pruffian Officers, the Enemy alſo ſent us the Prince of Lobkowitz, and

the Count de Verneda, Major of Cordua, who were taken in the Battle of Lowoschutz.

Oct. 6, 7. Our Hussars brought in several Prisoners, took in the Circle of Satz, where they had been extorting Forage and Provisions. The Desertion of the Enemy still continues, a Number coming in every Day to our Camp. Both the Armies, since the Battle, continue in the same Position.

Brussels, Oct. 29. The several Corps in the Austrian Netherlands, that are to take the Field, have received their Orders and Route for marching to Luxembourg, some by the Way of Namur, and others by that of Huy; and To-morrow all the Troops that are not already at Luxembourg, will be in Motion for that Place. Of those that are to remain in this Country, 4 Battalions are to be in Garrison at Ostend, under the Command of Major General Pifa. Several Detachments are likewise to be sent to Nicuport, in order to form a Garrison there of 7 or 800 Men. Late on Tuesday Evening, a Messenger arrived here from Vienna, with the News of the Surrender of the Saxon Army to the King of Prussia. M. de Bonnac, who was the French King's Ambassador at the Hague, after stopping here a few Days, proceeded this Morning on his Journey to Paris.
