Constantinople, October 2.

FOR some Time past we have had no Changes of Consequence, and the Ministry seems fixed. The great Prudence of the Vizir, joined to his Abilities in managing the Affairs of this Empire, gains him the Sultan's Favour and Confidence: As a Proof of it, on the 30th past, the Grand Signor condescended to accept of a magnificent Entertainment, which had been preparing for several Days, and did not withdraw till near Five o'Clock, which is much later than he usually stays on those Occasions. The same Day the Great Imrehor, or Master of the Horse to the Grand Signor, was named Pascha of Three Tails, and appointed to the Government of the Morea; and the Cuchuk Imrehor, or his Deputy, succeeds him. Prince Dolghorucky, the Russian Envoy Extraordinary, has had his Audiences of Leave of the Grand Signor and Vizir, and reckons to be able to depart some Time this Month.

Rome, Oct. 16. On the 25th past the Pope held a private Consistory, in which he disposed of several vacant Bishopricks; appointed Cardinal Stoppini, Legate of Ravenna; and confirmed Cardinal Banchieri, for three Years longer, in the Legation of Ferrara. The Pope's two Frigates, having been fitted out at Civita Vecchia, are on the Point of sailing on a Cruize, for the Winter Season, against the Barbary Corsairs. They are to proceed first to Toulon, to provide themselves with Anchors, and other necessary Stores.

Florence, Oct. 23. Since the Departure of the Courier, which the Regency dispatched to Vienna on the 28th past, the Dispositions for the March of three Thousand of the Tuscan Troops are carried on very slowly, but the Emperor's final Orders, on this Particular, are daily expected by the Return of the said Courier.

Turin, Nov. 3. Yesterday the Prince and Princess of Carignan came to Town from their

Castle of Raconis. This Day being the Feast of St. Hubert, his Sardinian Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness the Duke and Dutchess of Savoy, and the Princesses, went to hunt in the Forest of Stupiniz.

Hambourg, Nov. 5. The three young Princes of Hesse Cassel arrived here the Day before Yesterday, and set out this Morning for Copenhagen; and it is said, that their Highnesses are to reside for some Time in Denmark.

Brussels, Nov. 12. The States of Brabant separated Yesterday, and have agreed to the immediate raising of an extraordinary Sum, by Way of a Free Gift, to assist the Empress Queen in the present Circumstance of a War against the King of Prussia. The States of Flanders have been likewise assembled on this Occasion, and came to the same Resolution as those of Brabant; and 'tis not doubted but their Example will be followed by the States of the other Provinces, which are to meet very shortly. According to the Advices received here Yesterday from Bohemia, Marshal Browne's Army was to separate immediately to go into Winter Quarters.

General Post-Office, October 2, 1756.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the Mail, dispatched from this Office upon Tuesday the 28th of September, from Chesterfield to Sheffield, was, on Thursday last, the 30th of the same Month, about half an Hour past Six of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, in a Lane between Coal Ashon and Little Norton, in the County of Derby, by Two Men on Foot, who took from him and carried away the Mail, containing the Bag of Letters from London to Sheffield, and likewise the Bag containing the Bye and Cross-Road Letters, from Chesterfield to Sheffield, as also four Shillings and Sixpence from the said Post-Boy.

The two Persons who committed this Robbery are described as middle sized Men, and wearing, the one of them a blue Coat and white Waistcoat, and the other a light-coloured Frock; one of them was pitted with the Small-Pox, and the other had a Mark upon one Hand, as if the same had been cut.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the two Persons who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or

knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
