Hereas by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, entituled, An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of His Majesty's Land Forces and Marines, it is provided, amongst other Things, That at such Time as His Majesty shall be satisfied by the Returns of the Commissioners appointed to carry the said Act into Execution, or otherwise, that a sufficient Number of Recruits in the Whole, shall have been raised for His present Service, He might be graciously pleased to suspend or stop the further Execution of the faid Act, by Proclamation, or Order in Council, or other Publick Notice in the London Gazette. - And whereas in Pursuance of the Power so reserved to His Majesty, Publick Notice was given in the London Gazette of the 17th Day of April last, as likewise in the three following Gazettes, by His Majesty's Secretary at War, That His Majesty was graciously pleased to suspend and stop the further Execution of the said Act, from and after the first Day of May then next, till further Notice—And whereas His Majesty hath judged it necessary for His Service, to cause several new Levies to be made, as well for the Land Forces as the Marines, and that it is therefore become necessary to cause the said Suspenfion to be taken off; - His Majesty is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Declare His Royal Will and Pleasure, that the aforementioned Suspension and Stop, put to the Execution of the said Act, be now taken off: And His Majesty doth hereby strictly Order, Charge and Command all the Commissioners, and other His Majesty's loving Subjects, authorized to carry the faid Act into Execution in those Counties where Precepts have been issued by the High Sheriff or his Deputy, purfuant to Notice fent by His Majesty's Secretary at War for that Purpose, that they do forthwith re-affemble themselves, and proceed with their utmost Diligence in carrying the said Act into Execution, pursuant to the Directions therein And with respect to those Councontained.ties to which His Majesty's Secretary at War hath not hitherto fent fuch Notice, the High Sheriffs of such Counties or their Deputies shall, (notwithstanding the aforementioned Suspension) upon receiving Notice from the Secretary at War, at any Time hereafter, during the Continuance of the said Act, iffue their Precepts in the Manner required by the faid Act, in order to its being carried likewise into Execution in those respective Counties.

Naples, October 26. On Friday last, about half an Hour past Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, a very sensible Shock of an Earthquake was selt in this City and its

Neighbourhood. It lasted near a Minute, but has done no considerable Damage. Yesterday there was a brilliant Appearance at Court on Account of its being the Birth Day of the Queen Dowager of Spain. The same Day the King's five Chebecks returned into this Port from a Cruize of several Months, without having taken any Prize. The Coust's Return from Portici to this Capital remains fixed for the 3d of next Month.

Continuation of the Journal of the Camp at Budin, from the 27th of October to the 5th of November.

The 27th, His Excellency Marshal Brown took Possession of Aussig, which the Fremy had abandoned; and Colonel Vehla, with a Body of Croats, was posted there. At the same Time the greatest Part of our Troops had Orders to pass the Elbe at Tetschen, to fall on the Rear Guard of the Enemy, which was accordingly put in Execution, and they killed several, and took some Prisoners, besides Baggage.

The 28th, General Hadik advanced with the Hustars and Croats towards Petersvald, the Enemy having retired from thence, and he took

Possession of it.

The 29th, Lieutenant Colonel Macheligot advanced towards the Rear Guard of the Enemy, which confissed of 4000 Men, with eight Pieces of Cannon. He attacked their Camp with 300 Croats, and the Enemy desended themselves by the Assistance of their Cannon; but Colonel Vehla coming up with 500 Croats to sustain the Attack of Macheligot, they obliged the Enemy to retire, with the Loss of near 200 killed and wounded, besides a great Number of Oxen, Horses, and Baggage, which the Prussians were obliged to abandon to the Croats. We can't enough praise the Courage and Conduct with which these two Officers conducted this Enterprize, notwithstanding the great Inequality of Forces, and the Advantage of the Enemy's Cannon.

The 30th and 31st, We recalled the Detachments that had been sent into the Circles of Satz and Leitmaritz, to oppose the Enemy in their Foraging and Exactions. By the good and wise Dispositions of our Chief, and the determined Bravery of our Troops, the Enemy, after having been drove from Post to Post, and harrasted Day and Night, without Victuals or Forage, were at last obliged to abandon all Bohemia.

Some Days ago the Enemy spread a Report that they designed to enter into Bohemia with a Body of Troops by Zittau and Gabel, but the Marshal having ordered General Lacy, with some Battalions, and several Companies of Granadiers, besides Hussars and Croats, to Jung Bunzlau, and Lieutenant Colonel Lauden, with 800 Croats, to advance towards Gabel and Romburg, they thought proper to defer the Execution of their Design, and take up their Quarters at Zittau, Lobau, and Gerliz. General Perroni has been sent from hence with

Dispatches of the greatest Consequence to Vienna, from whence we soon expect to receive fresh Orders.

As the Prussians retired from Bohemia, General Hadik atways followed and harraffed them. He has taken many Prisoners, and a great deal of Baggage. The Defertion of the Enemy is greater than ever.

The Istoof November, Marshal Brown published, by Order of the Court, a Promotion made by her Imperial Majesty, in Consequence of which, General Macquire has been named Lieutenant General, and the Colonels Baron Butler, Count Warben, and Baron Unruke-graux, Majors General.

The 2d, Arrived at the Army, Lieutenant General Clerici, and the Majors General Prince Hokenzolleren, and the Baron of Bregfal.

The 3d, General Brown sent from the Army, towards the Borders of Saxony, Major General Wolffersdorff, with six Battalions, as many Companies of Grenadiers, and 12 Pieces of Cannon; likewise Colonel Gourcy with 600 Horse,

The 4th, His Excellency fent General Luchesi, with Dispatches of the greatest Imporrtance to Vienna.

The 5th, We received Advice, that the Enemy had put the greatest Part of their Troops' into Winter Quarters, and that they had only 2 Body of 2000 Men that are retrenched behind Hollendorff, with some Pieces of Cannon. Whereupon our General has formed a Plan to dislodge them. As soon as the bad Weather begins, our Army will go into Quarters of Cansonment. Here are arrived four Battalions and seight: Companies of Granadiers of the Regiments of Giulai, Staremberg, and Konigfegg, from The Rest of the Troops from Italy are in full March, so that the Whole will be affembled here by the End of the Month.

Prince's Dowager Colonna died suddenly in the Night, at her Country Seat at Albano.

Florence, Nov. 6. On the 22d past the Courier, whom the Regency dispatched some Time ago to Vienna, returned from thence. next Day the Regency had thereupon an Extraordinary Assembly, when Major General Henard, Commander in Chief, and M. Stelflin, Commissary of the Tuscan Troops, received the Emperor's Orders for three Battalions and fix Companies of Grenadiers of Tuscan Troops to hold themselves in Readiness to march for Germany on the first Notice. They write from Leghorne, that ome additional Works are making to the Fortifications of that Place towards the Sea. On the 23d a French Shebeck Privateers chased and took, within the Reach of the Cannon of Leghorne, being at most at the Diftance of but one Mile and a half from the Mole, an English Veffel called the Hibernia, Capt. Anfon, laden with Pilchards.

Brussels, Nov. 16. Prince Charles of Lorrain's Departure for Vienna, feems at prefent to be delayed for fome Time; and it is now faid, that his Royal Highness will continue here the best Part of the Winter. The General Officers, who are to serve in the Body of Troops that is marching from the Austrian Netherlands, are fucceffively fetting out for Luxembourg, where they are all ordered to be on the 20th Those Troops are to be commanded in Chief by Count d'Arberg, who, it is expected, will be promoted to the Rank of Lieutenant General at his Arrival at Luxembourg.

The Marquis Deynse has been added to the Number of Majors General who are to serve in this Corps.
