A PROCLAMATION,

For putting the Laws in Execution against Forestalling, Regrating, and Engrosfing of Corn.

> GEORGE R. HEREAS feveral good Statutes have been made against Forestallers, Regraters, and Engroffers, who are thereby declared open Oppreffors of

the Poor, and Enemies of their Country : And by an A& made in the Parliament holden in the Fifth and Sixth Years of the Reign of King Edward the Sixth, the Buying, Bargaining, or Contracting for any Corn coming by Land or by Water to any Market, or Fair, or to any City, Port, Haven, Creek, or Road, of this Realm, or Wales, from any Parts beyond the Sea, to be fold, before the fame shall be brought into the Markets, Fairs, Cities, Ports, Havens, Creeks, or Roads, to be fold; and the ma-king any Motion by Word, Letter, Meffage, or otherwise, to any Person, for the Inhauncing of the Price, or dear Selling of the same; and the diffwading any Perfon from bringing his or her Corn to any of the faid Markets, Fairs, Cities, Ports, Havens, Creeks, or Roads, to be fold, are prohibited, and adjudged Forestalling. And whereas by the fame Act it is declared, That the obtaining, or getting into any Man's Poffeffion, any Corn in any Fair or Market, and felling the fame in any Fair or Market held in the fame Place, or within four Miles thereof, shall be adjudged Regrating. And whereas by the fame Act it is likewife declared, That it thall be adjudged an unlawful Engroffing to Buy or Contract for any Corn, to fell the fame again, otherwife than is therein particularly al-lowed of (that is to fay) Buying of Barley, Bigg, or Oats (not by Foreftalling) to be converted into Malt or Oatmeal in the Houfe of the Buyer, which shall be fo converted indeed ; or the taking of any Corn referved without Fraud, upon any Leafe for Term of any Life

or Years; or the Buying of any Corn (not by Foreftalling) by any Badger, Lader, Kidder, or Carrier, who is to be licenfed to to do ; and shall fell the fame in open Fair or Market, or to fome Victualler, or other Person, for the Provision of his or their Houfes, within one Month after the fame fhall be fo first bought; or providing, without Forestalling, the usual Quantity of Corn, for any City, Borough, or Town Cor-porate; or for Provision, or Victualling any Ship, Caftle, or Fort, within the Dominions of the Crown : All which Sorts of Dealing in Corn are not Offences against the faid Statute. Nor the Buying of Corn (except by Foreftalling) by any Perfon licenfed fo to do, to be transported by Water from any Port or Place in England or Wales, unto any other Port or Place within our Dominions, fo that the fame be, without Fraud, shipped within Forty Days after the fame shall be bought, and carried with such Expedition, as the Wind and Weather will permit, to the Port the Cocquet of the fame shall declare, and there to difbarque and fell the fame, and bring a Certificate thereof from a Juffice of the Peace of the County, or Mayor or Bailiff of the Town, and of the Cuftomer of the Port, of the Place and Day where the Corn was un-laded and fold, to the Cuftomer and Comptrolher of the Port where the fame was fhipped; the Punishments of which faid Offences are enacted to be Imprifonment for two Months, without Bail or Mainprize, for the First Offence, befides Forfeiture of the Corn fo bought or had : For the Second Offence, Imprilumment for the Space of Half a Year, without Bail or Main-prize, and Lofs of Double the Value of the Corn fo bought or had, as aforefaid : And for the Third Offence, fetting on the Pillory in the Place where the Offender shall dwell, and Forfeiture of all his Goods and Chattels, and Imprisonment during our Pleasure ; the one Moiety of all which Forfeitures is given to the Profecutor, in cafe he will fue for the fame ; but the whole Forfeiture will belong to us, where the Conviction shall be at our Suit only. And it was thereby likewife enacted, That if any Perfon having fufficient Corn for Provision of his

his House, and sowing of his Ground for one Year, shall buy any Corn in any Fair or Mar-ket, for the Change of his Seed, and shall not bring to the fame Fair or Market, the fame Day, fo much Corn as shall be bought for his Seed, and fell the fame, if he can, at the Price the fame shall then go at, in the faid Fair or · Market, every fuch Perfon shall forfeit the Double Value of the Corn fo bought. And whereas by an Act made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, it was enacted, That no Badger, Lader, Kidder, Carrier, Buyer or Transporter of Corn, shall be licensed but in the General Quarter Seffions of the Peace for the County where fuch Perfon shall fo dwell, and hath dwelt for the Space of three Years before the Date of his Licence, and who is then an Householder, not a Servant or Retainer to any Perfon, and who, at the Time of granting fuch Licence, is, or hath been, a married Man, not under the Age of Thirty Years; which Licences are to continue but for a Year, and muft be figned and fealed by three of the Juffices then present, whereof one to be of the Quorum, on Pain of forfeiting Five Pounds by every Perfon teking any Licence not purfuant to the faid Act; and all fuch Licences are, by the faid Act, de-clared to be null and void : And the faid Juffices are, by the faid Act, impowered to take Bond and Surety by Recognizance of the Perfon licenfed, that he shall not Forestall or Engross, or otherwife practice or do any Act or Thing contrary to the faid Statute of Edward the Sixth. And it is likewife further provided by the faid Act, That no Perfon shall buy any Corn or Grain out of open Fair or Market, to fell again, unlefs fuch Perfon shall be thereunto licensed by fpecial Order and express Words, upon Pain of forfeiting the like Sum of Five Pounds: All which feveral Offences, the Juffices of the Peace, at the Quarter Seffions for the County where fuch Offences shall be committed, have Power to hear and determine. And whereas the Prices of Corn are already very much encreased, and the fame is likely to grow much dearer, to the great Oppreision of the Poor, partly because the faid Acts are not duly put in Execution, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation ; And We do hereby flrictly Charge and Command all and every Our Judges, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and all other Magistrates, Officers, and Ministers, whatfoever and wherefoever, within England, Wales, and Our Town of Berwick upon Tweed, that they, and every of them, within their respective Places and Jurifdictions, do caule the faid Acts, and all other AS. relating to the fame Matters, to be, in all and every the Parts and Branches the thereof, put in speedy and effectual Execution; the and that they do take Care, that no Licence has granted to any Badger, Lader, Kidder. 🤃 🐇 or Buyer of Corn or Grain, but re fuer the

as are or fhall be qualified for the fame, according to the Directions of the Acts of Parliament relating thereunto; and under fuch Sureties as those Acts do require; and that they do take Care, that all Offenders against the faid Acts be effectually profecuted according to the Purport of the faid Acts. And We do hereby Require and Charge all Our Officers, Ministers, and loving Subjects whatfoever, to be aiding and affisting in the due Execution of this Our Royal Proclamation, on Pain of our high Displeasure, and of fuch Pains and Punishments as may by Law be inflicted upon the Contemners of Our Royal Authority.

WHereas by an Act paffed the laft Seffion of Parliament entiruled An Act for the Parliament, entituled, An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of His Majefty's Land Forces and Marines, it is provided, amongst other Things, That at fuch Time as His Majefty shall be fatisfied by the Returns of the Commissioners appointed to carry the faid Act into Execution, or otherwile, that a fufficient Number of Recruits in the Whole, shall have been raifed for His prefent Service, He might be gracioufly pleafed to sufpend or stop the further Execution of the faid Act, by Proclamation, or Order in Council, or other Publick Notice in the London Gazette. - And whereas in Purfuance of the Power fo referved to His Majefty, Publick Notice was given in the London Gazette of the 17th Day of April last, as likewise in the three following Gazettes, by His Majesty's Secretary at War, That His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed to fulpend and ftop the further Execution of the faid Act, from and after the first Day of May then next, till further Notice-And whereas His Majefty hath judged it neceffary for His Service, to caufe feveral new Levies to by made, as well for the Land Forces as the Marines, and that it is therefore become neceffary to caule the faid Sufpenfion to be taken off; - His Majefty is hereby pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Declare His Royal Will and Pleafure, that the aforementioned Sufpension and Stars and the Execucion of the fail off a

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authorized to carry the faid Act into Execution in those Counties where Precepts have been iffued by the High Sheriff or his Deputy, purfuant to Notice fent by His Majesty's Secretary at War for that Purpole, that they do forthwith re-affemble themfelves, and proceed with their utmost Diligence in carrying the faid Act into Execution, purfuant to the Directions therein -And with respect to those Councontained.ties to which His Majesty's Secretary at War hath not hitherto fent fuch Notice, the High Sheriffs of fuch Counties or their Deputies fnall, (notwithstanding the aforementioned Suspension) upon receiving Notice from the Secretary at War, at any Time hereafter, during the Continuance of the faid Act, iffue their Precepts in the Manner required by the faid Act, in order to its being carried likewife into Execution in those respective Counties.

From the Camp of Zudin, Nov. 10.

Upon Advice that the Enemy were entred into Winter Quarters, his Excellency Marshal Brown fent Capt. Raizenstein to General Haddik, who is between Toplitz and Peterswalde, with a Plan of a Line to be drawn upon the Fiontiers of Saxony; and General Guafco, an Officer of Merit, and an excellent Engineer, was entrusted with the Execution of it.

The Marshal has given the Command of all the Pofts on this Side of the Elbe to General Haddik, and of those of the other Side to General Maeguire. Befides all the Croats and Huffars, his Excellency has appointed a fufficient Number of Batallions, Companies of Grenadiers, German Horfe, with Artillery proportionable, to cover the Frontiers, and to defend the Country from the Infults of the Enemy's Parties.

Since his Excellency has fixed the Winter Quarters for the Army, feveral Regiments defile off daily towards the Quarters affigned them, and in 15 Days all the Army will be in Winter Quarters.

The Head Quarters are established at Prague. The Garrison whereof is composed of the Regiment of Louis Wolffenbuttel, a Batallion of that of Wallis, and 22 Companies of Grenadiers that came from Italy.

Marihal Brown has confented to a Negociation with Marshal Keith, General in Chief of the Pruffian Army, for the Exchange of Prifoners. And as the Town of Carlftrad has been fixed on as most convenient for both Parties, and each Party having agreed to fend thither a Lieutenant Colonel, a Captain, an Auditor, and a Commissiary of War, Marshal Brown has already appointed Lieutenant Colonel Thurn, and Capt. Churfield, both of the Regiment of the Archduke Ferdinand's Cuirafliers, to negociate on the Part of the Auftrians. The Regiments of Schmertzing,

Kalkreute, and Gelhai, Cuiraffiers; and those of Nadafty, and Kalncki, Huffars, who all came from Hungary, are gone to Moravia, where they will remain till they receive further Orders. Count Sternberg, Minister Ple-nipotentiary of their Imperial Majeflies at the Court of Drefden, has pailed by this Place, with all his Family, on his Way to Vienna.
