his House, and sowing of his Ground for one Year, shall buy any Corn in any Fair or Mar-ket, for the Change of his Seed, and shall not bring to the fame Fair or Market, the fame Day, fo much Corn as shall be bought for his Seed, and fell the fame, if he can, at the Price the fame shall then go at, in the faid Fair or · Market, every fuch Perfon shall forfeit the Double Value of the Corn fo bought. And whereas by an Act made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, it was enacted, That no Badger, Lader, Kidder, Carrier, Buyer or Transporter of Corn, shall be licensed but in the General Quarter Seffions of the Peace for the County where fuch Perfon shall fo dwell, and hath dwelt for the Space of three Years before the Date of his Licence, and who is then an Householder, not a Servant or Retainer to any Perfon, and who, at the Time of granting fuch Licence, is, or hath been, a married Man, not under the Age of Thirty Years; which Licences are to continue but for a Year, and muft be figned and fealed by three of the Juffices then prefent, whereof one to be of the Quorum, on Pain of forfeiting Five Pounds by every Perfon teking any Licence not purfuant to the faid Act; and all fuch Licences are, by the faid Act, de-clared to be null and void : And the faid Juffices are, by the faid Act, impowered to take Bond and Surety by Recognizance of the Perfon licenfed, that he shall not Forestall or Engross, or otherwife practice or do any Act or Thing contrary to the faid Statute of Edward the Sixth. And it is likewife further provided by the faid Act, That no Perfon shall buy any Corn or Grain out of open Fair or Market, to fell again, unlefs fuch Perfon shall be thereunto licensed by fpecial Order and express Words, upon Pain of forfeiting the like Sum of Five Pounds: All which feveral Offences, the Juffices of the Peace, at the Quarter Seffions for the County where fuch Offences shall be committed, have Power to hear and determine. And whereas the Prices of Corn are already very much encreased, and the fame is likely to grow much dearer, to the great Oppreision of the Poor, partly because the faid Acts are not duly put in Execution, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation ; And We do hereby flrictly Charge and Command all and every Our Judges, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and all other Magistrates, Officers, and Ministers, whatfoever and wherefoever, within England, Wales, and Our Town of Berwick upon Tweed, that they, and every of them, within their respective Places and Jurifdictions, do caule the faid Acts, and all other AS. relating to the fame Matters, to be, in all and every the Parts and Branches the thereof, put in speedy and effectual Execution; the and that they do take Care, that no Licence has granted to any Badger, Lader, Kidder. 🤃 🐇 or Buyer of Corn or Grain, but re fuer the

as are or fhall be qualified for the fame, according to the Directions of the Acts of Parliament relating thereunto; and under fuch Sureties as those Acts do require; and that they do take Care, that all Offenders against the faid Acts be effectually profecuted according to the Purport of the faid Acts. And We do hereby Require and Charge all Our Officers, Ministers, and loving Subjects whatfoever, to be aiding and affisting in the due Execution of this Our Royal Proclamation, on Pain of our high Displeasure, and of fuch Pains and Punishments as may by Law be inflicted upon the Contemners of Our Royal Authority.

WHereas by an Act paffed the laft Seffion of Parliament entiruled An Act for the Parliament, entituled, An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of His Majefty's Land Forces and Marines, it is provided, amongst other Things, That at fuch Time as His Majefty shall be fatisfied by the Returns of the Commissioners appointed to carry the faid Act into Execution, or otherwile, that a fufficient Number of Recruits in the Whole, shall have been raifed for His prefent Service, He might be gracioufly pleafed to sufpend or stop the further Execution of the faid Act, by Proclamation, or Order in Council, or other Publick Notice in the London Gazette. - And whereas in Purfuance of the Power fo referved to His Majefty, Publick Notice was given in the London Gazette of the 17th Day of April last, as likewise in the three following Gazettes, by His Majesty's Secretary at War, That His Majefty was gracioufly pleafed to fulpend and ftop the further Execution of the faid Act, from and after the first Day of May then next, till further Notice-And whereas His Majefty hath judged it neceffary for His Service, to caufe feveral new Levies to be made, as well for the Land Forces as the Marines, and that it is therefore become neceffary to caule the faid Sufpenfion to be taken off; - His Majefty is hereby pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Declare His Royal Will and Pleafure, that the aforementioned Sufpension and Stars and the Execucion of the fail off a

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
