Warsaw, Jan. 22. Our King continues in the full being resolved not to quit those parts till he see them under the obedience of the Crown, to which accommodation with *Dorofensko* and the *Cossack* his party, will greatly contribute. His Majesty is not at all like the proceedings of the *Moscovites*, as seems to have only more and more reason to suspect their sincerity, and even to believe that they are so far from really intending to joyn their Forces with those of this Crown, as that they are troubled at his Majesty's great success in the *Ukrain*, and that they would be glad to give a stop to it. We are told, that his Majesty has desired his Coronation may be celebrated at *Leopold*, because of its nearness to the *Ukrain*, though we do not hear that it is finally resolved.

Copenhagen, Jan. 26. It is said that his Majesty has nominated *Monseur Clineberg* to go in quality of his Ambassador Extraordinary to the *States General* of the *United Provinces*. We do not hear that the *Suedish* Ambassador has obtained any positive answer to the propositions he hath made on the part of the King of *Sueden*; this Court being it seems very loth to declare it self as yet. This night is expected here an Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*.

Genova, Jan. 31. It is certainly said that the Duke of *Savo* makes preparations of War, and this Senate for that reason has given our Commissions to several Reformed Officers likewise to raise Men. We hear of another Squadron of Men of War that is gone from *Thoulon* under the command of the Duke de *Vivonne*, for *Messina*; from whence we have advice, that upon the arrival of the Chevalier de *Kalbetle*, the Inhabitants immediately put into the hands of the French, the Castles of *St. Salvador*, and of *Mantufrigone*, the one commanding

anding the City, and the other the Port, so that they are now absolutely Masters of both.

Berlin, Jan. 31. The Prince d'Anhalt, hath, as we are informed, lately received Letters from the Elector of Brandenburg, in which his Electoral Highness tells him, that he purposes to be here very suddenly, where his presence is much wished for. The Swedes have possessed themselves of all the district of Rappin, having their quarters as far as Havelburg; They have required a monthly contribution of 21 thousand Crowns of the Countrey called Newmarke.

Strasburg, Feb. 4. The Chief officers who commanded in Duchsfeyn, have been sent prisoners to Frisburg, in order to their tryall before a Councell of War, for having surrendered the place, when they were in a condition to have defended it much longer; which many People attribute chiefly to the Sieur Contarini, who killed himself the night after his arrivall here, and seem to accuse him of foul things, which others in respect to the Noble Family he is of, are unwilling to believe. The Marquis de Vaubrun has (as we are told) sent the Cavalry that was employed before Daubstein towards Lorraine, to take winter quarters, and has put the Infantry into Haguenau and Sauerne, from whence they were drawn for that service; at Colmar are 1200 French in Garrison, where, as likewise at Haguenau and Scarbruck, they make great Magazines.

Ulm in Suabia, Feb. 7. The Confederate Troops are now all in their winter quarters. The third instant dyed Monsieur d'Allemant, Lieutenant General of the Forces of the Duke of Lorraine. And the next day the Duke of Zell parted from hence on his way home.

Mayence, Feb. 9. The seventh instant arrived here Colonel Arenden in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from Sweden; and yesterday he had audience of his Electoral Highness, whom he acquainted with the just motives he said the King his Master had to employ his Arms against the Elector of Brandenburg, for the maintenance of the Peace of Westphalia &c. It is reported here, that the Marquis de Vaubrun is marched with the Forces that he commanded before Daubstein towards the Palatinate with designe to attack some place of note; some speak of Newstadt, others of Lauterne. The Elector of Brandenburg is arriv'd with his whole Court at Ochsenfurt, on his way towards his own Territories, having quarter'd most of his Troops in the Bishoprick of Wirzburg, and appointed the head quarter to be at Schweinfurt. From Vienna they write that the Emperor is sending the Count de Mandingrats into Sweden; and that the Count de Montecoulli will go into the Field very early, having already sent away from Vienna part of his Bagage towards Cologne.

Hamburg, Feb. 12. Our Letters from Berlin dated the eighth instant say, that the Swedish Forces are within some days retir'd near to the Countreys of Mechtlenburgh, as if they had designe to quit the Brandenburg Territories. It is confidently say'd that the said Forces do not much exceed 12000 Men in all. The Elector of Brandenburg is daily expected at Berlin, notwithstanding the Emperor, as is said, had written to him to desire him not to quit the Confederates in the Empire, promising on that condition to have an Army in Silesia, sufficiently able to oppose the Swedes.

Hildeshim, Feb. 12. The 10 instant arrived here the Duke of Zell, and the next day continued his journey homeward.

Brussels, Febr. 15. On Saturday last, the several Councils, and afterwards the Magistrats of this City were in body to complement the Duke de Villa Hermosa upon his happy entrance upon the Government of these Provinces; the same day his Excellency, accompanied with all the Nobility and Persons of

Quality about Town, went to our Cathedral Church, where Te Deum was sung, with the Solemnity usual on such occasions. Yesterday morning parted hence Don Francisco de Melasco for England, whither he is sent by his Excellency to make his complement to his Majesty; and Monsieur de Foe is gone on the same errand to the Hague. In the mean time his Excellency has issued orders to all the Villages round this City, to bring hither all their Corn and Grain within 15 days, to be laid up in publick Granaries. The same orders are given to the several Towns within these Provinces, that they cause the Countrey people to bring their Corn, &c. to such City or Garrison as shall be nearest to them. This day his Excellency directed a General Muster of all the Troops that are lodged in this Province, and has commanded that the like be forthwith done in the other Provinces. From Liege they write, that that Countrey hath been so eaten up and destroyed by the Armies, that provisions can hardly be got sufficient for subsistence of the Inhabitants. The French of Masficht give the Germans daily some disturbance or other in their quarters. Our last Letters from Spain inform us, that her Majesty has made choice of Don Hieronimo de Quiñones late Governor of the Franche Comté to be Maître de Camp General of the Forces of these Provinces, which hath been void since the Death of the Marquis d'Assinar, killed in the Battel of Seneff; the same Letters tell us, that 1200000 Crowns are design'd to be remitted thither from Spain.

Hague, Feb. 19. The 15 instant, the Prince of Orange arriv'd at Arnhem, having been received with all the honor and respect the place was capable of. Yesterday the States of the Province were to assemble there, when it is thought his Highness declared his mind upon the offers they had by their Deputies made to him. The Council of State is making all necessary provision of Corn, Carriages, and Horses for the Artillery against the next Campaigne. The States of Zealand have, it is said, resolv'd to offer his Highness the property of Swinam in lieu of 300000 Guilders they formerly presented him, which are not yet paid; and that they will endeavor to dispose the States General to confer upon him the sovereignty of the same.
