Prague, Dec. 17. Prince Piccolomini, who came here some Days ago, in order to confer with Marshal Brown, in Relation to the Operations of the next Campaign, set out from hence Yesterday on his Return to the Army under his Command. Within this Fortnight past, upwards of 500 Horses have passed through this City for the Use of the Imperial Cavalry.

Dresden, Dec. 19. A Report has prevailed here, for some Days past, that the Austrian Irregulars intend to disturb the Prussians in their Winter Quarters in Upper Lusatia; but as the Prussians have greatly strengthened themselves in those Parts, and as Marshal Brown has quitted the Army, and is gone to Vienna, very little Credit is given to such Report; on the contrary, it is not expected that any Action of Consequence will happen there this Winter. This Court is gone into Mourning for six Weeks, for the Death of the Empress, Dowager of the Emperor Charles VII. and Sister to the Queen of Poland. The Discipline of the Prussian Troops in this City is so strict, that we enjoy perfect Tranquillity.

Hague, Dec. 30. Yesterday the Council of State in a Body, with her Royal Highness the Princess Governante at their Head, carried the State of War, for the Year 1757, to the Assembly of their High Mightinesses.
