Lyme, Febr. 15.

Vienna, Febr. 3. On Monday last the Count of Oxenstern?, Ambassador Extraordinary of Sueden, took his leave of the Emperor, in order to his departure from this Court; but having the next day received an Express from the Baron Sparr, who resides with the same Chara-feer in the Court of France, his Excellency desired a Conference, in which he acquainted the Commissioners, That his Most Christian Majesty had made a farther step in the matter of the Peace, by condescending to send his Ambassadors to any place which the Allies should choose, within the United Provinces, except Friseland and Gro-ninguen, seeing they did not like of Breda, which his Majesty had proposed and as for the Prince of Furstenbergh that his Majesty would be content he should be put into the hands of the Pope, till the conclusion of a general Peace; what answer was returned his Excellency in these points, we do not certainly learn; but it is thought nor to have been to his Excellencies satisfaction, seeing he continues his refolution, to fet forward on his journey from hence the beginning of the next week. On Monday next General Cops will part hence for silefia, to put himself at the head of the Emperor's Forces in that Countrey. The Count of Hofkircken is appointed by the Emperor to go and take an account of the Imperial Troops commanded by the Duke of Bournonville, in order to the informing his Majesty of the true posture they are in.

Steein, Febr. 12. Most of the Suedish Troops are retired out of the Ukk rmarke, belonging to the Elector of Brandenburgh; and this day two Regiments of Horse, with one of Foot, passed through this place; and took their march towards Hinder Pomeren, likewise belonging to his Electoral Highness, having with them 19 pieces of Cannon, and about 50 Wagons laden with Ammunition, Gro. The 14, we expect here General Wrangel with the rest of the Troops and the Artillery, except five or six Regiments, which are to continue their Quarters in the Ukkermarke.

Cologne, Febr. 12. On Monday last Monsieur Fischer returned hither from Munster, and the next day parted for B n, to give the Generality there an account of his Negotiation. Court, against his Electoral Highnesses's person, and that
12 persons, some of them of Note, had been apprehended thereupon. The seventh instant, the Count Waldeck
passed through Ratibbon on his way to Vienna, whither
he is sent by the States General of the United Provinces, and the Prince of Orange, to adjust matters relating
to the next Campagne. The Marquels of Grana comes
hither again with his Regiment.

Strasburgh, Febr. 15. The French are now absolute Masters in Alfatia, and the monthly Contributions which the Garisons of Brifac and Philipsburgh exact of the Inhabitants as far as the Neckar, amount to above 150 000 Crowns. In the mean time the French make a great Magazine at Colmar, bringing thither great stores of all forts of Military provisions from Metr. The Duke of Lorrain is still here, but (as we are told) much diffatisfid at the ill conduct of things among the

Conféderates.

Aerntem, Febr. 21. On Friday the 15 instant, his Highness the Prince of Orange arrived here, the Deputies of the three quarters of Gelderland having received his Highness about a mile out of Town, without the Gate, which his Highness entered, was drawn up the Regiment of Horse of the Marquess de Mompellian in Garison here; within the Gate two Regiments of Foot, and fix Companies of Burgers were drawn up on each side of the street, to the house of the Sieur Rosenda:1, which was prepared to lodge his Highness. The Mawhich was prepared to lodge his Highness. The Ma-gistrates having received his Highness as he entred the Town, conducted him to his Apartment amidst the Acclamations of the People, who, by adorning the streets with Herbs, fetting up of Flags, and erecting Trium-phal Arches, and all other ways the place was capable of, expressed their respect and affection to his Highness. The next day his Highness received the Complements of most of the persons of quality of this Province, who had purposely resorted hither on this occasion. On the Sunday his Highness went to the Great Church, where, after the Sermon, the Pfalms or Hymns were fung with excellent Musick, purposely prepared. On Monday his Highness, accompanied with several Persons of Quality, diverted himself with Hunting. On Tuesday the States of the Province met, and his Highness being come into their Affembly, thanked them for their great affection to him in offering him the Sovereignty of their Province, which he refused to accept of, relling them, that the Interests of the Provinces were more dear to

him than those of his own Person; after which, his Highness communicated to them, the Establishment he had caused to be made of the Magistracy, being much on the same foot, as before the War ; and received from the States their Act, constituting him Hereditary Stadtholder, and Captain General of this Province; Upon which, his Highness ordered the Re-establishment of the Court of Jullice; where his Highness took his place this day as Stadeholder, to hear the first Cause pleaded

Hague, Febr. 23. Our Letters from Gelderland give usan account of the Prince of Orange's having refused the offers of that Province, though with hearty thanks for to great a demonstration of their affection to him; about the latter end of this week his Highness intends to part from Aernhein towards Groninguen. We know not yet what certainly to fay of the intention of the Crown of Sueden, and many people are of opinion things will not come to a Rupture; in the mean time the Special Ambassador here continues to perform the part of a Mediator, giving in several Memorials to the States General about the matter of the Peace. And this week Sir William Temple, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majety of Great Britain, (who hath been received as Mediator by all the Parties engaged in the present War) gave likewise in a Memorial in order to the disposing the States and their Allies to agree, that Nimeguen may be the place of Congres; which they still seem to eccline. It is reported as if the Bishop of Munster had refused to ratifie the Treaty not long since concluded by his Minister at Vienna, unless the Emperor did exempe the Bishoprick of Paderborne from quartering of any of the Imperial Troops; and that he had declared to the Emperor's Minister at his Court, that he was not able to bring on foot the number of Troops Ripulated by the faid Treaty.

His Majesties Declaration for Enforcing a late Order made in Council.

HE Administration of Justice according to the setled and known Laws of Our Kingdom, We take to be the most reasonable and proper Method for attaining and preserving the Peace and Safesy both of Cuurch and State. As therefore We find it necessary, That the Lawsthould be put in Frecution with more care and diligence than of late they have been. So also We think it expedient, That the Orders We have already given for that purpose, should be made Publick in such a manner, that all men may find themselves obliged to take notice of the such as and to see and to the fame, and to give a due obedience thereunto. For which Reasons We have thought fit to Declare, and so hereby Publish and Declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That our Order made in Council on Wednesday the Third day of this instant Forurry, and fince Princed and Published, be exactly observed by all and every person and persons to whom it shall or may apby all and every period and period and period in the Convictions of Popily haufants be every where Encouraged, Quickned, and made Effectual; And that all Convictions, as foon as they shall be persecued, be forthwish Certified into the Exchequer, and that speedy Process do issue upon fied into the Exchequer, and that speedy Process do sidue upon all such Convictions as are or shall be Certified; And that care be taken, that no Persons of Quality, who shall be suspected to be Poppis Recusaris, be omitted to be Presented; And that so delay be used, nor any practice suffered, which may hinder of obstruct the compleating of such Convictions as are now preparing. And We do strictly Charge and Command. That no Mass be said in any part of this Kingdom, the Chappels of Out Dearest Consortine Queen and the Chappels of Foreign Ministers onely Excepted: And to prevent all extraordinary refort to those Chappels by such who are not Menial Servants to the Queen, or to Poreign Ministers, We Declare, That every such Offender shall incur the Foresiture of One hundred Marks, provided by the Statute made in the Twenty third year of Queen Elizabrin; whereof Our Third part shall be given to the Informer for his surface. And We Require all Officers and Ministers of Justice, to cause

diligent Search to be made in all other places where they shall bear or suspect that Mals is said, and to cause all Offens ers in this kind to be Apprehended, and proceeded with according to Law. And We Forewarn all Our Subjects, That they prefume this kind to be Apprehended, and proceeded with according to Law. And We Forewarn all Our Subjects, That they prefume not to fend any person to be Educated abroad in any Profit Colledge or Semmary; And We Command all Parents, or Guardians of any person or persons, now remaining in any such Colledge or Semmary; That they cause the said person or persons speedily to return home, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril. Moreover, We Require all persons both within any of Our Dominions, and out of Prison; who have taken Orders by any Authority derived from the Church or See of Reme, (except Mr. John Haddissan) to depart the Kingdom before the Twenty fifth day of March next, according to the Tener of Our late Proclamation; and also to depart the Court within the Fourteen days appointed by Our late Order in Council. And we forbid all Papists, or reputed Papists, to come into Our Palace at White chall, or Saint James's, or into any other place where Our Court shall be, contrary to Ourside Prohibition, upon pain of Imprisonment in the Kyper, if he be a Beer of the Realm; or in some other Prison, if he be of lefter quality. And lastly, We appoint, That care be taken for the Suppression of Conventicles, hereby Declaring, That all Our Licences were long since Re-called; And that no Conventicle hath any Authority, Allowance, or Incouragement from Use and Specialmed in the usual manner.
