## A PROCLAMATION,

*For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War ; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves ; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and shall return into the Service ; and also for taking up all Stragling Seamen.*

**W**HEREAS Our Service doth at this Time require a speedy Supply of Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, to serve on Board Our Ships of War, and it being Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation ; and We do hereby promise and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the Tenth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy ; and also, That a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not

above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the said Tenth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy ; and that such respective Sums be paid them by the Clerks of the Cheque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen : And We do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen so entering themselves, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatwain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money ; We do hereby Declare and Command, That such Seamen or Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further Promise and Declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, on or before the said Tenth Day of February next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men ; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman

man or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, where there are any, and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service. And as an Encouragement to such Seamen who may have deserted from Our Ships to return to the Service, We do promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships or Vessels, by or before the Tenth Day of February next; and also to all such who have deserted, but are now belonging to some one of Our Ships (in which they are hereby permitted to continue.) And We do hereby further Declare, That such Deserters shall be intitled to receive all Wages that were due to them in the Ships from which they have deserted, at the Time of such Desertion. And We do hereby further Declare, That such Seamen who have absented themselves from any of Our Ships, and shall render themselves on Board the same, or any other of Our Ships of War, by or before the Time above-mentioned, shall not be prosecuted for such their Desertion; but that all such Deserters who shall not, on or before the said Tenth Day of February next, render themselves on Board some of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, without Leave from the Commanding Officer, shall be tried at a Court Martial; and, being found guilty of deserting at this Time, when their Country so much wants their Service, they shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer Death according to Law. And we do hereby Require and Command all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bailiffs, and Magistrates, of the several Shires, Counties, Cities, Towns Corporate, and all other Places within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, to give the strictest Orders and Directions to the Constables, and other inferior Civil Officers, to take up all Straggling Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall be of Health and Ability fit for Our Service; and that they do exert themselves in the Service, and take Care that the inferior Civil Officers be diligent in the Discharge of their Duty herein; and that the said Magistrates do cause all Seamen so taken up, and fit for Our Service, to be conducted by such

Constables, or inferior Civil Officers, or other proper Persons, to the Clerk of the Cheque of any of Our Yards, or to a Regulating Captain in London, or any other Place, or to any Port, or Place, where any of Our Ships or Vessels may be, or to any Officer of Our Navy employed in raising Men; and that the Persons who shall be intrusted with the conducting such Straggling Seamen, be paid a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, received from them for Our Service, over and above Six Pence a Mile for every Mile they shall travel with such Seaman or Seamen, not exceeding Twenty Miles; which respective Rewards are to be paid by the Clerks of the Cheque of Our Yards, where any of the said Men shall be delivered to them; or if delivered to a Regulating Captain in London, that the said Rewards be then paid by the Commissioners of Our Navy; or if delivered to any of the Officers of Our Navy employed in raising Men, that then the said Rewards be paid by the Collector of Our Customs residing at or nearest to the Place where such Men shall be brought, upon producing a Certificate from the Officer of Our Navy, to whom such Men shall be delivered, of the Names and Number of Men received by him; and the said Collector of Our Customs is to take a Receipt on the Back of the said Certificate for the Sum he pays; which Sum the Commissioners of Our Navy are required to reimburse to the said Collector of Our Customs, upon his transmitting such Certificate and Receipt to them.

W H E R E A S George Clemison, of Annan in North Britain, Mariner, late a Boatman in the Cruizing Boat, stationed near that Place, in the Service of the Customs; John Irwin alias Irvin, of Seafield, Farmer; Richard Bell of Longlands, and Alexander Hannah of Dornock, Labourers, all of North Britain; were, upon the Fourth Day of December last, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed, before Mountague Farrer, Esquire, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Cumberland, with  
having

having been guilty, upon Tuesday the Twentieth Day of July last, (the said John Irwin alias Irvin aforesaid, being armed with a double Barrel'd Pistol; George Clemison, Alexander Hannah, and Richard Bell aforesaid, and several others, to the Number of Seven and upwards, being all armed with large Clubs and Sticks) of being assembled in a riotous Manner at Brampton in the said County of Cumberland, and of having rescued and taken away by Force Eight Casks, containing about Eighty Gallons, Part and Parcel of Twelve Casks, containing about One Hundred and Twenty Gallons of Foreign Brandy, which had been seized by the Officers of the Customs and Excise; the aforesaid John Irwin alias Irvin firing his Pistol at one of the said Officers, and the aforesaid George Clemison, Alexander Hannah, and Richard Bell, and the others, beating the aforesaid Officers with their Clubs and Sticks in a barbarous Manner—Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Mountague Farrer, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who hath laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty in that Case made and provided—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said George Clemison, John Irwin alias Irvin, Richard Bell, and Alexander Hannah, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

*Rome, December 18.* The Pope, agreeable to the Testamentary Disposition of the late Cardinal Mellini, for the Distribution of 20000 Crowns to the Poor, has caused 9000 Crowns to be paid to the Hospital of St. James for Incurables; and 11000 has been given to the Curates of the Parishes of this City, to be distributed amongst the poor Families of their respective Parishes. On the 13th Instant, the Pope was again taken ill with a Suppression of Urine, which occasioned a violent Fever, accompanied with other very dangerous Symptoms. On the 14th and 15th he grew worse, whereupon the Sacraments, and other Ceremonies of the Church, were administered to him; and it was thought he was past all Hopes of Recovery. On the 14th there was an extraordinary Meeting at the Datery, when all the Bulls, Benefices, and Pensions that were depending, were

dispatched. The same Day Cardinal Millo, by a Notification from the Secretary of State, was appointed Prefect of the Council. *Commo ore Charos*, of the Pope's Frigats St. Peter and St. Paul, has acquainted the Commissary of the Marine, that having provided those Frigats with the necessary Stores at Toulon, he was sailed from that Port, agreeable to his Instructions, for the Coast of Barbary.

*Madrid, Dec. 20.* Their Catholick Majesties continue in perfect Health at their Palace de Buen Retiro, where they received, on Saturday the 18th Instant, the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, on Occasion of its being her Catholick Majesty's Birth Day, which was celebrated with the Rejoycings and Diversions that are usual at this Court.

*Florence, Dec. 25.* On the 17th Instant, the Regency received, by an Express from Vienna, an Account of the Empress's Delivery of a Prince. This Event was, on the 18th, notified to the Publick by a Proclamation for three Days Rejoycings; and accordingly, on the 19th, *Te Deum* was sung, at which the Members of the Regency, the Magistrates, and many of the Nobility, attended; and that, and the following Evenings, Fire Works were played off, and the Cannon of the Castles were fired.

*Dresden, Dec. 26.* We continue to enjoy perfect Tranquillity in this City, and the Prussian Discipline seems to be introduced everywhere. Fifty of the Saxon Officers, who were made Prisoners of War by his Prussian Majesty, now dine regularly at Court: And two Ducats a Head per Month is allowed for their Subsistence. This Money is collected by Subscription, her Majesty the Queen of Poland having engaged herself to pay fifty Dollars a Month towards that Sum. Their Highnesses the Electoral Prince and Princess also join in the Subscription, as do likewise the Countess of Buehl, Count Rex, and some other Persons of Distinction. 'Tis rumoured here, that a Jealousy has arose between the Austrian Field Marshals Prince Lichtenstein and Count Brown; for which Reason 'tis said Prince Charles of Lorraine is to take upon himself the Command of the Army in Bohemia.
