A PROCLAMATÍOÑ,

For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering fuch Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deferted, and shall return into the Service; and aljo for taking up all Straggling Seamen.

HEREAS Our Service doth at this Time require a speedy Supply of Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, to ferve on Board Our Ships of War, and it being Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation ; and We do hereby promife and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who fhall, on or before the Tenth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for raifing Men for the Service of Our Royal Na-vy; and alfo, That a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman not

above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the faid Tenth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board fuch Tenders as fhall be employed for raifing Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy; and that fuch respective Sums be paid them by the Clerks of the Cheque refiding at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of fuch Seamen and Landmen : And We do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen fo entering themfelves, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatfwain of the Ship or Veffel where they fhall And for Prevention of any Abufes by enter. any Perfons leaving the Ships or Veffels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Veffels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty Money; We do hereby Declare and Command, That fuch Seamen or Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Veffels, as shall absent themselves from any of the faid Ships or Veflels to which they fhall belong, and enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty, fhall not only lofe the Wages due to them in the Ships or Veffels they fhall leave, but alfo be feverely punifhed according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further Pro-mife and Declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fhall be paid any Perfon who fhall difcover any Seaman' or Seamen who may fecret themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our faid Service, on or before the faid Tenth Day of February next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raifing Men ; the faid Rewards to be paid for any Seaman man or Seamen fo discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, where there are any, and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Cuftoms, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Perfon who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforefaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Confequence of his Discovery; and the faid Certificate to be given by fuch Officer as may take fuch Seaman or Seamen for Our Service. And as an Encouragement to fuch Seamen who may have deferted from Our Ships to return to the Service, We do promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships or Veffels, by or before the Tenth Day of February next; and also to all fuch who have deferted, but are now belonging to fome one of Our Ships (in which they are hereby permitted to continue.) And We do hereby further Declare, That fuch Deferters shall be intitled to receive all Wages that were due to them in the Ships from which they have deferted, at the Time of fuch Defer-And We do hereby further. Declare, tion. That fuch Seamen who have ablented themfelves from any of Our Ships, and shall render themfelves on Board the fame, or any other of Our Ships of War, by or before the Time abovementioned, shall not be profecuted for such their Defertion; but that all fuch Deferters who shall not, on or before the faid Tenth Day of February next, render themfelves on Board fome of Our Ships or Veffels of War, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, without Leave from the Commanding Officer, shall be tried at a Court Martial; and, being found guilty of deferting at this Time, when their Country fo much wants their Service, they shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer Death according to Law. And we do hereby Require and Command all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bailiffs, and Magistrates, of the feveral Shires, Counties, Cities, Towns Corporate, and all other Places within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, to give the Aricless Orders and Directions to the Constables, and other inferior Civil Officers, to take up all Straggling Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who thall be of Health and Ability fit for Our Service; and that they do exert themfelves in the Service, and take Care that the inferior Civil Officers be diligent in the Difcharge of their Duty herein ; and that the faid Magistrates do cause all Seamen so taken up, and fat for Our Service, to be conducted by fuch

Constables, or inferior Civil Officers, or other proper Perfons, to the Clerk of the Cheque of any of Our Yards, or to a Regulating Captain in London, or any other Place, or to any Port, or Place, where any of Our Ships or Veffels may be, or to any Officer of Our Navy employed in raifing Men ; and that the Perfons who thall be intrusted with the conducting fuch Straggling Seamen, be paid a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, received from them for Our Service, over and above Six Pence a Mile for every Mile they shall travel with such Seaman or Seamen, not exceeding Twenty Miles ; which respective Rewards are to be paid by the Clerks of the Cheque of Our Yards, where any of the faid Men shall be delivered to them; or if delivered to a Regulating Captain in London, that the faid Rewards be then paid by the Commiffioners of Our Navy ; or if delivered to any of the Officers of Our Navy employed in raifing Men, that then the faid Rewards be paid by the Collector of Our Cuftoms refiding at or near-eft to the Place where fuch Men shall be brought, upon producing a Certificate from the Officer of Our Navy, to whom fuch Men shall be delivered, of the Names and Number of Men received by him; and the faid Collector of Our Cuftoms is to take a Receipt on the Back of the faid Certificate for the Sum he pays; which Sum the Commiffioners of Our Navy are required to reimburfe to the faid Collector of Our Cuftoms, upon his transmitting such Certificate and Receipt to them.

A T the Court at St. James's the 4th Day of January, 1757,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in His Privy Council.

WHEREAS George Clemifon, of Annan in North Britain, Mariner, late a Boatman in the Cruizing Boat, flationed near that Place, in the Service of the Cuftoms; John Irwin alias Irvin, of Scafield, Farmer; Richard Bell of Longlands, and Alexander Hannah of Dornock, Labourers, all of North Bitain; were, upon the Fourth Day of December laft, charged by Information of a credible Perfon upon Oath, by him fubfcribed, before Mountague Farrer, Efquire, one of His Majefty's Juftices of the Peace for the County of Cumberland, with having

having been guilty, upon Tuefday the Twentieth Day of July last, (the faid John Irwin alias Irvin aforefaid, being armed with a double Barrel'd Pistol; George Clemison, Alexander Hannah, and Richard Bell aforefaid, and feveral others, to the Number of Seven and upwards, being all armed with large Clubs and Sticks) of being affembled in a riotous Manner at Brampton in the faid County of Cumberland, and of having refcued and taken away by Force Eight Cafks, containing about Eighty Gallons, Part and Parcel of Twelve Cafks, containing about One Hundred and Twenty Gallons of Foreign Brandy, which had been feized by the Officers of the Cuftoms and Excife; the aforefaid John Irwin alias Irvin firing his Piftol at one of the faid Officers, and the aforefaid George Clemison, Alexander Hannah, and Richard Bell, and the others, beating the aforefaid Officers with their Clubs and Sticks in a barbarous Manner-Which Information was afterwards certified by the faid Mountague Farrer, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majefty's Principal Secretarys of State, who hath laid the fame before His Majesty in His Privy Council, purfuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty in that Case made and provided-His Majest doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the faid George Clemifon, John Irwin alias Irvin, Richard Bell, and Alexander Hannah, and each of them, do furrender himfelf and themfelves within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Juffice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majefty's Juffices of the Peace. William Sharpe.

Rome, December 18, The Pope, agreeable to the Teffamentary Disposition of the late Cardinal Mellini, for the Distribution of 20000 Crowns to the Poor, has caufed 9000 Crowns to be paid to the Hospital of St. James for Incurables; and 11000 has been given to the Curates of the Parishes of this City, to be distributed amongst the poor Families of their respective Parishes. On the 13th Instant, the Pope was again taken ill with a Suppression of Urine, which occasioned a violent Fever, accompanied with other very dangerous Symptoms. On the 14th and 15th he grew worle, whereupon the Sacraments, and other Ceremonies of the Church, were administered to him, and it was thought he was past all Hopes of Recovery. On the 14th there was an extraordinary Meeting at the Datery, when all the Bulls, Benefices, and Penfions that were depending, were

dispatched. The fame Day Cardinal Millo, by a Notification from the Secretary of State, wis appointed Prefect of the Council. Commo ore Charos, of the Pope's Frigats St. Peter and St. Paul, has acquainted the Commiffary of the Marine, that having provided those Frigats with the neceffary Stores at Toulon, he was failed from that Port, agreeable to his Inftructions, for the Coaft of Barbary.

Madrid, Dec. 20. Their Catholick Majesties continue in perfect Health at their Palace de Buen Retiro, where they received, on Saturday the 18th Inflant, the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and other Perfons of Diftinction, on Occasion of its being her Catholick Majesty's Birth Day, which was celebrated with the Rejoycings and Diversions that are usual at this Court.

Florence, Dec. 25. On the 17th Infant, the Regency received, by an Express from Vienna, an Account of the Empress's Delivery of a Prince. This Event was, on the 18th, notified to the Publick by a Proclamation for three Days Rejovcings; and accordingly, on the 19th, Te Deum was lung, at which the Members of the Regency, the Magistrates, and many of the Nobility, attended ; and that, and the following Evenings, Fire Works were played off, and the Cannon of the Caffles were fired.

Dresden, Dec. 26. We continue to enjoy perfect Tranquillity in this City, and the Pruffian Discipline feems to be introduced everywhere. Fifty of the Saxon Officers, who were made Prifoners of War by his Pruffian Majefty, now dine regularly at Court /: And two Ducats a Head per Month is allowed for their Subfiftance. This Money is collected by Subfcription, her Majefty the Queen of Poland having engaged herself to pay firty Dollars a Month towards that Sum. Their Highnesses the Electoral Prince and Princels allo join in the Subleription, as do likewife the Counters of Bruhl, Count Rex, and some other Persons of Distinction. 'Tis rumoured here, that a Jealouly has arole between the Auftrian Field Marshals Prince Lichtenstein and Count Brown; for which Reafon 'tis faid Prince Charles of Lorrain is to take upon himfelf the Command of the Army in Bohemia.
