man or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, where there are any, and where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforefaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Confequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by fuch Officer as may take fuch Seaman or Seamen for Our Service. And as an Encouragement to such Seamen who may have deserted from Our Ships to return to the Service, We do promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships or Vessels, by or before the Tenth Day of February next; and also to all such who have deserted, but are now belonging to some one of Our Ships (in which they are hereby permitted to continue.) And We do hereby further Declare, That such Deserters shall be intitled to receive all Wages that were due to them in the Ships from which they have deserted, at the Time of such Deser-And We do hereby further Declare, That such Seamen who have absented themselves from any of Our Ships, and shall render themfelves on Board the same, or any other of Our Ships of War, by or before the Time abovementioned, shall not be prosecuted for such their Defertion; but that all fuch Deserters who shall not, on or before the said Tenth Day of February next, render themselves on Board some of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, without Leave from the Commanding Officer, shall be tried at a Court Martial; and, being found guilty of deferting at this Time, when their Country so much wants their Service, they shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer Death according to Law. And we do hereby Require and Command all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bailiffs, and Magistrates, of the several Shires, Counties, Cities, Towns Corporate, and all other Places within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, to give the Arictest Orders and Directions to the Constables, and other inferior Civil Officers, to take up all Straggling Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall be of Realth and Ability fit for Our Service; and that they do exert themselves in the Service, and take Care that the inferior Civil Officers be diligent in the Difcharge of their Duty herein; and that the faid Magistrates do cause all Seamen so taken up, and ht for Our Service, to be conducted by such

Constables, or inferior Civil Officers, or other proper Persons, to the Clerk of the Cheque of any of Our Yards, or to a Regulating Captain in London, or any other Place, or to any Port, or Place, where any of Our Ships or Veffels may be, or to any Officer of Our Navy employed in raising Men; and that the Persons who shall be intrusted with the conducting such Straggling Seamen, be paid a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, received from them for Our Service, over and above Six Pence a Mile for every Mile they shall travel with such Seaman or Seamen, not exceeding Twenty Miles; which respective Rewards are to be paid by the Clerks of the Cheque of Our Yards, where any of the said Men shall be delivered to them; or if delivered to a Regulating Captain in London, that the faid Rewards be then paid by the Commisfioners of Our Navy; or if delivered to any of the Officers of Our Navy employed in raifing Men, that then the faid Rewards be paid by the Collector of Our Customs residing at or near-est to the Place where such Men shall be brought, upon producing a Certificate from the Officer of Our Navy, to whom such Men shall be delivered, of the Names and Number of Men received by him; and the faid Collector of Our Customs is to take a Receipt on the Back of the faid Certificate for the Sum he pays; which Sum the Commissioners of Our Navy are required to reimburfe to the faid Collector of Our Customs, upon his transmitting such Certificate and Receipt to them.
