Rome, January 1.

CIRCULAR Orders from the Magistrate of Health have been directed to the respective Ports of the Ecclesiastical State, intimating to them the Reduction of the Quarantine to a Fortnight, on Notice that the Pestilential Sickness was ceased in the Levant. The Pope's Health is so much mended within these few Days, that it is now thought he may live some Time. On the 30th, he admitted some People to an Audience; and the same Day Cardinal Guadagni sent printed Notifications to the Churches of this City, directing them to suspend the Form of Prayers entitl'd *Pro pontifice infirmo*, and instead of them to use that *Pro gratiarum actione* for his Recovery.

Brussels, Jan. 21 The Letters from Paris continue to give the most favourable Accounts of the French King's Health, and say, that his Majesty had even already dined in Publick. An Ordonnance has been lately published in France, for augmenting to 705 Men each, the six Regiments of Foot belonging to the Irish Brigade, and the two Scotch Regiments of Ogilvy and Royal Scotch. By another Ordonnance 1200 Men are to be added to the Corps d'Artilterie; which is now to consist of 96 Companies of 50 Men each, divided into six Battalions of 16 Companies each, whereof two of Sappers, nine of Gunners, and two of Bombardiers. There are likewise to be raised a new Company of Miners, and one of Workmen to be added to the ten which already belong to the Corps d'Artilterie.

Brussels, Jan. 25. The Day of Prince Charles of Lorraine's Departure for Vienna is not yet known; but his Royal Highness will certainly set out some Time this Week. The Princess his Sister, who was here to take Leave of him, returned to Mons Yesterday. A few Days before her Royal Highness left this Place, she received an Express with the News, that on the 18th Instant she was elected Coadjatrix of the Abbey and Principality of Essen. The Letters from France advise, that the Villain who made an Attempt upon the French King's Life, has been removed to Paris, and confined in the Prison of the Conciergerie; and that Letters Patent have been passed, by which the whole Cognizance of this Affair, and the Trial of the Prisoner, are committed to the Grand Chambre of the Parliament.
