AT the Court at *St. James's* the 4th Day of February, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by His Majesty's Proclamation, bearing Date the Fourth Day of January last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and "Able-bodied Landmen, to enter themselves "on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; For "granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; For pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and "shall return into the Service; And also for "taking up all Stragglng Seamen"—His Majesty was pleased to promise and declare, amongst other Things, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and also that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Tenth Day of this Instant, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by the said Proclamation; As likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Tenth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman or Seamen who should secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service:— And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring, and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly Ordered, That the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the Bounties and Rewards aforementioned be prolonged and extended from the said Tenth Day of this Instant February, to the Tenth Day of March next inclusive; and that the said respective Bounties, and Rewards, be continued to be paid by the Persons, and at the Times directed by His Majesty's aforesaid Proclamation.

Copenhagen, Jan. 22. The Marriage lately concluded between the Duke of Saxe Hildbourghausen, and the Princess of Culmbach, was celebrated on the 20th Instant; in the Apartments of the Queen Dowager; by whom this accomplished Princess, her Majesty's Niece, has been bred up almost from her Infancy. And the

Marriage lately concluded between Count Schack and the Countess Moltke, one of the Queen's Maids of Honour, and second Daughter to the Grand Marshal, was celebrated, a few Days ago, in the Presence of the Royal Family. After having supped with their Danish Majesties, as it is the Custom on such Occasions, the Bridegroom and the Bride were conducted in the State Coach to the new built Palace belonging to Count Schack, where they are to reside. Last Week a Fire broke out at the House of a Sugar Baker in this City, which burnt with such Violence, that all the Efforts made to stop its Progress proved ineffectual, and the whole new Building, which was very large, was entirely reduced to Ashes.

Vienna, Jan. 22. The Physicians attending the Archduke Joseph, have represented to their Imperial Majesties, that the Small Pox, with which that young Prince was seized a few Days ago, proves to be a favourable Sort, and that they apprehend him to be already out of Danger. The Frost has been very severe in this Country for some Time past, but it seems now going off; and our Letters to Day from Lower Austria assure us, that great Damage has been done to the Bridge built over the Danube near Crems, by the breaking of the Ice.

Hambourg, Jan. 25. On the 16th Instant, a publick Collection was made by the English Company of Merchant Adventurers established here, for the immediate Relief of the most necessitous Poor, who, from the very severe Winter, and the high Price of Corn, &c. have been reduced to the utmost Misery, when their Chaplain, the Rev. Mr. Murray, preached an excellent Sermon upon the Occasion. After which, a very considerable Sum was collected, at which the Senate expressed great Satisfaction.

Cogné, Jan. 31. Yesterday Prince Charles of Lorraine passed under the Ramparts of this City, on his Way from the Low Countries to Vienna; but as he travels incognito, our Magistrates were excused from paying his Royal Highness the Honours due to his Rank.

Brussels, Feb. 4. Several of the Members of the Parliament of Paris who had thrown up their Employments, having refused to apply to the Chancellor, according to the French King's Orders, to be reinstated, sixteen of the most considerable of them have been exiled, by Lettres de Cachet, to different Parts of the Kingdom.

Hague, Feb. 5. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has been pleased to appoint M. Brouwer, Counsellor of the Regency of the City of Middlebourg, to be Receiver General of all the publick Duties and Taxes paid by the District of Middlebourg. They write from Amsterdam, that the Admiralty of that City have lately put five Men of War into Commission.
