Stockholme, Jan. 27.

Yesterday parted hence the *Sieur Brandt*, Envoye from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, it is said, that the Ministers of this Court were desirous he should have continued here some time longer, in order to his labouring with them, to find out, if possible, some expedient for the accommodating the misunderstandings between their respective Matters, but it seems his Orders called him home. Great preparations are making here for War, and a Train of Artillery, with several Troops of Horse is ordered to march towards *Gottenburg*.

Copenhagen, Feb. 6. On Thursday last arrived here the Duke of *Ploen*, and at the same time an Envoye from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to desire his Majesties assistance, in case his Electoral Highness is attacked by the Swedes. The Ambassador of *Sweden* hath had several Conferences with the Commissioners appointed to Treat with him; The chief Points of his Negotiation are, 1. To assure his Majesty of the unalterable friendship of the Crown of *Sweden*; 2. To satisfy his Majesty of the just Merives it has to move its Arms against the Elector of *Brandenburg*; 3. To desire his Majesty to enter into the Mediation, and 4. To perfect the Alliance begun at *Stockholme*, to which the Commissioners have hitherto answered in general terms only, though with great expressions of thanks for his Majesties affection to the King their Master. It is said here, that our King is received into the Mediation, and that the *Sieur Klingenberg* is gone on this subject, Ambassador to the States General of the *United Provinces*. This day arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from *Vienna*, but we know not on what errand; we are told, that his Imperial Majesty is sending an Envoye hither.

Hambrough, Feb. 12. The Swedish Troops, except those that continue in the *Uckermark*, are now marched into the hinder *Pomeran*; General *Wrangel* was according to our last advices, at *Stetin*, from whence he intended in few days to remove to *Stargard*, where is appointed the General Quarter. Our Letters from *Sweden* in the mean time inform us, of great preparations that are making there for War, and that besides the Levies which are made in that Kingdom, Commissions have been given out to five Colonels, to raise as many Regiments in *Germany*: Our Letters add, that it hath been resolved to have a Fleet of 40 Men of War at Sea this Summer. The Duke of *Hanouer* does not yet declare himself, though the general opinion is, that he will employ his Arms in favor of the Swedes, in case there should be occasion for it. On the other side, the Emperor assembles a Body of an Army together in *Silesia*, which will be Commanded by General *Cops*.

Strasburg, Feb. 18. The Garrisons of *Philipsburg* and *Brisack*, exact vast Contributions of all the neighboring Countreys, without meeting with the least opposition from the Confederates. The tenth instant the French had assembled about 2500 Men near *Landau*, who the next day marched towards *Philipsburg*; it is

fear'd their intention is to attack *Newstadt*, or some other Town of Note in the *Palatinate*. The *Brandenburg* Troops composing in all, about 24 Regiments of Horse and Foot, are now actually in their Quarters in *Franconia*, the Head Quarter being at *Sweinfurt*, where the Elector himself is said to be at present; The *Lunenburg* Troops are quartered in *Suabia*, and the Imperial and *Lorrain* in *Brigovia*. The Marquis of *Baden Dourlach* is gone with the Troops that were designed for the Guard of our Bridge towards *Essingen* on the *Neckar*, where their Quarters are appointed. The Duke of *Lorrain* is still here, but not at all satisfied with the Conduct of affairs. The Marquis *de Vaubrun* is at present at *Brisack*, which place he fortifies. From *Vienna* they write, of the departure of the Swedish Ambassador from thence, and that General *Montecuculi* would very suddenly begin his journey towards the Army.

Cologne, Feb. 22. The Imperial Troops that were quartered in the Bishoprick of *Paderborne*, are removed from thence into the Diocess of *Hildesheim*, to make room for the *Munster* Troops, which are coming down the *Rhine*. Monsieur *Fischer*, who lately returned from *Munster*, seems little satisfied with the disposition he found that Bishop in, who it seems, instead of the 10000 Men which by the late Treaty concluded between the Emperor and him, he is obliged to raise for the Emperors service, now declares, he cannot bring on foot more then 5000, and those not till *August* next. Our Elector has at last referred the difference between him and the States General, to the Arbitrage of the Emperor and the King of *Spain*, who are Guaranties of the Treaty between them. The Duke of *Neuburg* has obtained, as we are told, from the most Christian King, that the Duchy of *Fuliers* may be exempted from paying Contributions, demanded by the Governor of *Maeffricht*. From *Strasburg* they write, that the Swiss Cantons are endeavouring all they can to open a free Trade on the *Rhine*; and that the French continue to make great Magazines at *Colmar*, *Saverne*, and *Hagenaw*. Our Letters from *Vienna* tell us, that it had been signified to the Swedish Ambassador, a little before his departure from *Vienna*, that his Imperial Majesty would leave it to the most Christian King, to make choice of the place of Congress; 2. Desired the Ambassadors might meet about the middle of *April*; 3. Consented to a Cessation of Arms; 4. That his Imperial Majesty would at the instance of the Crown of *Sweden*, and other Princes, pardon the Prince of *Furstenberg*, yet so, as that he should continue prisoner till the conclusion of the Peace.

Liege, Feb. 23. The French are bringing a Body of 8000 Men together, between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, the Imperialists apprehend their designe is to attack *Dinant* or *Huy*, and therefore have reinforced the Garrison that is in this latter place, with 600 Men, and even many people here are not without their fears.

Brussels, Feb. 19. On Saturday night his Excellency the Duke of *Villa Hermosa* removed to the Palace, wher

the next day he gave publick Audiencies, as he continues to do; his Excellency has, as we are told, resolved to raise forthwith five Regiments of Walloons, the Colonels are not yet named, but will be in few days. To-morrow the Marquis of *Burgemene* parts hence by his Excellencies order for *Vienna*, whither he goes to see in what readines the new Levies are that are making in the Hereditary Countreys, for the service of these Provinces, and to hasten them all he can; as also to adjust some matters with the Ministers of that Court, concerning the next Campagne. On Thursday last Don *Francisco Marcos de Velasco*, Lieutenant General of the Cavalry, went hence for *Ostend*, where he embarks for *England*, being sent by his Excellency, to make his Compliment to his Majesty, upon his Excellencies coming to the Government of these Countreys, The French make great preparations on all their Frontiers, and from *Paris* they write, that the King resolves to Command his Army in Person this Campagne, and that his Household is ordered to be ready to march against the 10 of the next month.

Ditto, Feb. 22. This day the States of the Province of *Hennaut* were with his Excellency, to represent to him the miserable condition of that Countrey, totally wasted and destroyed by the last years Campagne; and yet farther impoverished by the Taxes they pay the State, and the Contributions the French exact from them, which hath reduced the Inhabitants to that condition, that they are not longer able to pay the one or the other. His Excellency, as we told you, is about raising of five new Regiments, which are to consist each in 20 Companies, and each Company in 30 Men, but as yet, none of the Colonels are appointed, except the Marquis of *Deynse*, who has made an agreement with his Excellency, to raise one Regiment, and will very suddenly begin his Levies. We are told from the French Conquests, that Monsieur de *Cregui* has been some days at *Charleroy*, having a Body of 8 or 9000 Men together about *Philipville*, with which it is thought, he intends to fall upon the Imperialists in their Quarters, in the Countrey of *Liege*; and that at *Charleroy*, a great Convoy is preparing for *Mastricht* and *Masseyck*. Don *Emanuel de Lyra* is returned to the *Hague*, and Don *Pedro de Ronquillos*, being pretty well recovered of his indisposition, is preparing to begin his journey for *England*, where he goes to reside on the part of the Crown of *Spain*.

Ditto, Feb. 26. This morning by an Extraordinary Courier, his Excellency received advice from *Spain*, of her Majesties having bestowed the Command of General of the Horse in these Countreys, upon the Duke of *Montalto*, and of her Majesties having at the same time, made the Prince of *Vaudemont*, General of the Foreign Cavalry here.

Hague, Feb. 26 His Highness the Prince of *Orange* having seized the Magistracy, and other Matters of *Gelderland*, parted from *Aornheim* the 22 instant for *Swoll*, taking his way by *Dieren*; It is generally believed his Highness will not go into *Friesland*, but that from *Swoll* he will return hither, however, it is uncertain. The States General have lately received a Letter from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, in which it is said, his Elector's Highness assures them of his firmness in the Alliance he has with them, and prays them to make good on their part, the obligations of it, which though the States profess themselves most ready to do, and that in favor of the Elector, they have already resolved to make War against the Crown of *Sweden*, yet we do not see as yet any preparations made here for the carrying on of that War; neither is there at present, so much discourse as formerly, of having a Fleet this Summer in the *Baltick*, which makes many

Men think, that Matters are not yet so far gone between the King of *Sweden* and the Elector of *Brandenburg*, but that they may admit of an accommodation; of which, time must inform us. We have advice of the arrival of Count *Waldack*, the 10 instant at *Vienna*, and that the next day he was appointed to have an Audience of the Emperor; It is said, he has Orders to propose to the Emperor; that the Imperial Army may joyn this next Campagne with the Troops of the several Circles, and act in the Empire, while the Forces of *Brandenburg* and of *Lunenborg*, joyn with those Commanded by the Prince of *Orange*; and it is added, that on this subject, it is likely there will be a Conference between the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Prince of *Orange* at *Cleves*. We do not hear that the States have as yet given an answer to the Memorial of the *English* Ambassador, by which his Excellency pressed in the name of the King his Master, that *Nimgen* might be the place of Congress.

Paris, Feb. 26. We have at present but little to write from hence, except to tell you of the great preparations that are making against the approaching Campagne, and that they are so forward, that it is generally said, our Armies will take the Field the beginning of *April*. Monsieur de *Cregui* assembles several Troops between the *Sambre* and the *Musele*, in order to force the Imperialists out of their Quarters in *Liege*. We have Letters from *Masseles* which speak of a Barque arrived there just at the coming away of the said Letters from *Messina*, the Patron of which reported, that *Talleyrn* and *Trapani* had followed the example of the *Messinens* and had revolted, to which we cannot give any entire credit, till we hear farther.

Rye, Feb. 17. Yesterday lay at Ankor off of *Dungeness*, five French Men of War, one of which being mounted with 45 Guns (by what accident we as yet know not took Fire, and the Men to save themselves, run her ashore, where she was burnt.
