HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Rowlands, of Parthlongdu, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Anglesey.

Madrid, Feb. 7. The last Letters from Cadiz, of the 2d Instant, advise, that the Departure of the Flota was deferred on Account of the bad Weather, which appeared till then not likely to alter for the better. On the 23d past died here, in the 75th Year of his Age, his Excellency the Marquess de Monte-Alegre, Chamberlain to his Catholick Majesty, who has conferred this Dignity on the Conde de Onante, now Marquess de Monte-Alegre, Son to the late Marquess.
