AT the Court at *St. James's* the 1st Day of *March*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council,

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Fourth of February last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Tenth Day of this Instant March: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seaman and Landman respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of April next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of April next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Turin, March 2.* Monday the 28th of February, Madame de Savoye, who entered into the Thirtieth Year of her Age, received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and of the Nobility, on that Occasion; but the Court did not go out of Mourning. The Chevalier of Mombancel, a General of Foot, Governor of Alexandria, and Knight of the Order of Anunciation, died lately in an advanced Age.

*Vienna, March 2.* Every Thing is getting ready for Count Brown's Departure for the Army. An Express is arrived at Court with Advice that the Troops, furnished by the Elector of Mentz, are arrived in Bohemia; and an Account is also expected of the Arrival of those of the Prince Bishop of Wurtzbourg, who have been for several Days past on their March for that Kingdom. Cardinal Trautson, Archbishop of this City, continues dangerously ill.

*Dresden, March 6.* On the 20th of last Month, a Body of 6000 Austrians surrounded the little Town of Hirschfeld in Upper Lusatia, which is garrisoned by a Battalion of Prussian Foot. The first Attack was made at Four o'Clock in the Morning, on the two Redoubts without the Gates, on each of which was placed two Field Pieces; and though the Austrians were several Times repulsed, they at last made themselves Masters of one of the Redoubts, and carried off the two Pieces of Cannon. In their Retreat, they were followed by the Prussians, who fell upon their Rear, killed some of them, and took many Prisoners. By the Austrians own Accounts, they lost 500 Men in their different Attacks. The Places appointed for the Residence of the Saxon Officers, who are ordered to leave this City by the 11th Instant, are, Lauban in Lower Lusatia, Wittenberg, and Eisleben.

*Amsterdam, March 9.* We have received an Account by our last Letters from Cadiz, that one of our Men of War, named the *Veere*, commanded by Captain vander Kamp, arrived at Mallaga on the 15th of last Month, with the Merchantmen under her Convoy. The same



same Letters say, that the Spanish Flota, bound for Vera Cruz, failed on the 12th of that Month.

*Brussels, March 15.* According to the last Accounts from Brest, the Fleet, intended for the East Indies, under the Command of M. d'Apcher, was still there on the 3d Instant.

*Treasury Chambers, March 15, 1757.*

Several Persons having been prosecuted, by the Order of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, (of which Order Notice was given in the London Gazette of Saturday the 23d of October last) for selling several Tickets, called Irish Tickets, to be determined by the drawing of the last State Lottery, in Defiance of the Laws made against such Practices, some of which Persons, viz. Mr. John M'Carrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, were, on Tuesday the Eighth of March Instant, convicted of the said Offence, before the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, and Sir Robert Ladbroke, Knight, one of the Aldermen of the City of London, on the Statute made in the Eighth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2. Sect. 36. which inflicts a Penalty of 500 l. and one Year's Imprisonment in the County Goal, without Bail or Mainprize, on every Person so convicted.

For the preventing other Persons being guilty of the like Offences, Notice is hereby given, that all Persons, offending against the said Act, will be prosecuted forthwith, the Solicitor of His Majesty's Treasury having received Orders for that Purpose.
