ARROCLAMATION,

For the better Supply of Mariners and Seamen to ferve on Board Merchant Ships, and other Trading Ships, and Privateers.

GEORGE R.

THEREAS by an Act of Parliament paffed in the Thirteenth Year of Our Reign, intituled, An Act for the better Supply of Mariners and Seamen to serve in His Majesty's Ships of War, and on Board Merchant Ships, and other trading Ships, and Privateers, We are authorized and enabled, when War is declared against any foreign Power, to publish Our Royal Proclamation, if We should judge it requisite, to permit all Merchant Ships, and other trading Vessels, and Privateers, to be manned with Foreign Mariners and Seamen, during fuch War, in the Manner as by the faid Act is provided.—And whereas War hath been declared against the French King, but the iffuing of fuch Proclamation hath been hitherto rendered unnecessary, by Reason of an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the better Supply of Mariners and Seamen to serve in His Majesty's Ships of War, and on Board Merchant Ships, and other trading Ships and Veffels; the Provisions of which last mentioned Act are near expiring-We do therefore now judge it necesfary to permit, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, iffue this Our Royal Pro clamation, hereby permitting and allowing, that during the Continuance of this present War, and no longer (except in Respect to such Merchant Ships, and other trading Ships or Vessels, and Privateers, which shall be on their Voyage, before the Determination of the War, who shall be, and are hereby allowed the Liberty and Benefit of returning home navigated in the Manner as is herein after provided) it shall be lawful for any Merchant Ship, or other Trading Ship or Vessel, or Privateer, to be navigated by Foreign Seamen or Mariners, not being Natives of Great Britain, or of any of the Colonies or Plantations thereto belonging, or Our natural, or naturalized Subjects, so as the Number of such Foreign Seamen or Mariners do not exceed three Fourths of the Mariners at any one Time employed to navigate such Merchant Ship, or other Trading Ship or Vessel, or Pri-vateer; and that one Fourth at least of the Mariners or Seamen fo employed, be at all Times Natives, or Our naturalized Subjects of Great Britain, (sudden Death, and a Hazard and Cafualties of War and the Seas, faved and

excepted) one Act of Parliament made in the twelfth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled, An Act for the Encouraging and Increasing of Shipping and Navigation, or any other Statute or Law to the contrary notwithstanding.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-fifth Day of March 1757, in the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

AT the Court at St. James's the 9th Day of April, 1757,

PRESENT,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in
Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the First of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and alto to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this Inftant April: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seaman and Landman respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelsth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the faid Twelfth Day of May next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Brussels, April 1. Marechal d'Estrées was mominated in Form last Week at Versailles, to command the French Army upon the Lower Rhine. The Troops, intended for that Army, that have passed thro' Brussels since last Post, are the Regiments of Aquitaine and Provence of two Batallions each, and two Batallions of Picardie. This Day the Regiments of Perigord and Foix, each of one Batallion, are come to Town. The Field Artillery, which marches with them, consists of one four Pounder with every Batallion. Damiens was executed on Monday last at Paris; but hitherto it does not appear that there were any Accomplices engaged with him in this horrid Attempt. His Sentence and Punishment were the same as Ravaillac's.
