AT the Court at St. James's the 9th Day of April, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 13th of October last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April.--- And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the same should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy-Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, The Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, The Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, The Master General of the Ordnance, and His Ma-

jefty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the First of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this Instant April: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seaman and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of May next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Turin, March 23. Friday the 19th Instant being Madame Felicité's Birth-day, her Royal Highness was pleased to receive the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and of the Nobility upon that Occasion.

Dresden, March 30. On Thursday last the King of Prussia set out for Lockowitz, an Estate belonging to the Widow Rackenitz, about a German Mile from hence. As his Majesty was followed by all his Retinue, as also by the whole Regiment of Guards, and as the Time for the Opening of the Campaign approaches, and all the Regiments in this City and its Neighbourhood are kept in Readiness for marching on the first Notice, 'tis thought he will not return here again before the Campaign opens. Last Monday Baron Kessel, Governor of the Princes Albert and Clement, was arrested in his Apartment, as was likewise the Day after the Countess of Ogilvi, her Polish Majesty's first Lady of Honour, but the next Day she was set at Liberty. 'Tis said they carried on an illicit Correspondence with the Austrians in Bohemia. Since that Time two Huntsmen, in the Service of the Princes Xaverius and Charles, who had been at Warsaw, and afterwards in Bohemia with the Princes their Masters, and who attempted to slip into this City without being examined, have been secured and sent to Spandau; whither 60 Saxon Malefactors, condemned formerly to work at the Fortifications here, are also transported.

Copenhagen, April 2. On the 31st past the Anniversary of the King of Denmark's Birth-day, who then entered upon the 35th Year of his Age, was celebrated with great Demonstrations of Joy and Magnificence; but, on Account of the Lent-Season, there was only an elegant Dinner and Supper, at several Tables, but no Ball at Court. And although this Festivity has been usually the Occasion of Promotions, yet none were made by His Danish Majesty this Year. However, a Silver Medal, which had been struck upon the Erection of the Academy for Painting, Sculpture, and Architecture, in the Year 1754, (bearing the King's Bust on one Side, and a Female Figure on the other, with a Laurel Wreath in her Hand, and several Instruments about her, and with the Words *alio artes* over her Head) was presented to all Persons of Distinction, who had the Honour of dining at Court.

Dresden, April 3. His Prussian Majesty continues still at Lockowitz, with his Regiment of Guards quartered in the neighbouring Villages. On Wednesday forty Pontons were carried from hence to Pirna. All the Prussian Regiments are filing off one after another, and 'tis reported they take the Road towards Freyberg.

As several Soldiers belonging to the Saxon Regiment of Light Horse of Rutowsky, to the Number of 150, have joined in one Body and deserted, having obliged the Major that commanded them to lead them into Bohemia; and as almost the same has happened with Part of the Saxon Regiment of Infantry of Prince Maximilian, his Prussian Majesty has caused all the Saxon Regiments to be broke, and the Soldiers incorporated with the other Prussian Regiments. When the Saxons desert from hence and go into Bohemia, they are not inrolled, but are sent to some remote Places in Bohemia and Austria, where they are kept together. When her Majesty the Queen of Poland was informed of these Desertions, she expressed her Disapprobation thereof in the strongest Terms, as she foresaw that the Country would be obliged to furnish other Recruits. And accordingly Orders are already issued, requiring the Magistrates to deliver upwards of 4000 more Recruits with all Speed. On Thursday last, the Countess of Bruhl, Wife to the Prime Minister, was arrested at her Palace, and is guarded by an Officer, two subaltern Officers, and Twenty-five Soldiers.

Brussels, April 5. On Saturday arrived here the two remaining Battalions of Picardie, which were followed on Sunday by about 300 Men of La Motte's Battalion of Artillery, but without any Part of the Train, which, they say, consists of 50 Pieces of Cannon, and will follow very soon, with the Remainder of that Battalion. Yesterday the Regiment of Cavalry of Saluces, consisting of two Squadrons, arrived also at this Place, and proceeded again this Morning for Louvain. The Van Guard of the second Division, consisting of two Battalions of the Grenadiers Royaux is expected here on Saturday next.

Liege, April 6. The Regency having agreed that the French Troops intended for the Army on the Lower Rhine, should pass through this Principality, and be supplied with Provisions, &c. the two first Battalions of the first Division of that Army, arrived here accordingly on Friday last, and have been successively followed by two Battalions or two Squadrons every Day, who, after resting 24 Hours, continue their March towards Ruremond. Notwithstanding the Whole of the first Division will not have left this Place before Sunday next, yet Part of the second Division arrived to Day; and it appears by the General Route of this Army, that the last two Squadrons thereof will not pass through this City till the 25th Instant.

Whitehall, March 26, 1757.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on the 27th Day of June, in the Year 1755, George Bright, an Officer to the then Sheriff of His Majesty's County of Cornwall, being, in the Execution of his Office, levying a Sum of Money on the Goods and Chattels of John Cock, of Endellion, in the said County, Esq; by Virtue of the said Sheriff's Warrant, on a Writ of Fieri Facias, issued out of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas, at Westminster, at the Suit of Arundell Cock, Gent. was barbarously murdered by a Shot, received from a Gun, fired at him by the said John Cock; and that a Bill of Indictment was found against the said John Cock, for the said Murder, at the then next Assizes held at Bodmin in and for the said County of Cornwall; but that, notwithstanding legal Processes have been issued on the said Indictment, and all possible Endeavours used, for apprehending and bringing to Justice the said John Cock, he has been, and continues still to be, so invironed and protected by a Set of desperate Persons, that, the same have, hitherto, proved inefficual.—His Majesty, for the better and more speedy apprehending and bringing to Justice him the said John Cock, is hereby pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall so apprehend and secure him, that he may be brought to a legal Trial for the said Murder; the said Reward of

One Hundred Pounds to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon his, the said John Cock's, Conviction for the said Crime.

Several Persons having been prosecuted, by the Order of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, (of which Order Notice was given in the London Gazette of Saturday the 23d of October last) for selling several Tickets, called Irish Tickets, to be determined by the drawing of the last State Lottery, in Defiance of the Laws made against such Practices, two of which Persons, viz. Mr. John M'Carrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, were, on Tuesday the Eighth of March Instant, convicted of the said Offence, before the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, and Sir Robert Ladbroke, Knight, one of the Aldermen of the City of London, on the Statute made in the Eighth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2. Sect. 36. which inflicts a Penalty of 500 l. and one Year's Imprisonment in the County Goal, without Bail or Mainprize, on every Person so convicted.

For the preventing other Persons being guilty of the like Offences, Notice is hereby given, that all Persons, offending against the said Act, will be prosecuted forthwith, the Solicitor of His Majesty's Treasury having received Orders for that Purpose.

WHEREAS the Post-Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman on Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unstrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Sawffham, Aisleborough, Windham, Ibsford, Lynn, Soke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sawbridgeworth, Downham, Epping, Ongar and Ely.

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swift Tail.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

General Post-Office, December 20, 1756.

WHEREAS the Post Boy carrying the Worcester Mail from hence to Southall, was, on Sunday Morning the 12th instant, between the Hours of Four and Five of the Clock, attacked and robbed on the

Road near Shepherds Bush, by a Footpad, who laid hold of the Bridle of the Post Boy's Horse, and bid him dismount, and afterwards led the said Horse into a Lane near the great Road, and from thence into a Field adjoining, and there near to a Hay Rick took off the Mail from the Horse, opened it, and afterwards the Letters contained in the following Bags, viz. Campden, Chipping-Norton, Eversham, Burford, Whitney, Woodstock, Oxford, Ludlow, Bromyard, Worcester, Thame, Southall, Gerrard's Cross, Uxbridge, High Wickham, and Baconfield.

Note, The following Bags in the said Mail were unopened, viz. Shipston, Enston, and Tenbury; and the said Foot-pad, after detaining the Post-Boy upwards of two Hours, mounted the said Post-Boy's Horse, and rode off with the same towards Acton, which Horse was found the same Morning about Eight o'Clock near the Turnpike at Hyde Park Corner.

The Person who committed this Robbery has since put off several of the Bank Notes, and indorsed the Name of James Wilson thereon, to several Innkeepers on the Road to Caxton, by travelling Post in Post-Chaises with four Horses, by the Way of Barnet, Hatfield, Stevenage, and Bugden, and returning from Caxton by Way of Royston, Ware, and Enfield to London, where he was set down at Gray's Inn Gate in Gray's Inn Lane, about Twelve o'Clock at Noon, on Tuesday the 14th instant. This Person is described to be rather above the Middle-size, of a brown Complexion, very thin Visage and Body, with an effeminate Voice; he had on a Silver-laced Hat with a Cockade, blue Surtout Coat with Brass Buttons, a dark brown close-bodied Coat underneath, a Pair of Breeches with Silver Gartering at the Knees, his Wig or Hair, or both mixed was a dark brown, and tied behind with a Ribbon.
