FHereas the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 13th of October laft, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaffwife, Gunpowder, Seltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Inftant April .--- And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefiy's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the fame fhould be continued for fome long, r Time-His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby orde, require, prohibit and command, That to Perfon or Perfons whatfoever, (except the Matter-General of the Ordnance for His Majefty's Ser vice) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th of this Inftant April, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coaft wife, any Gunpo vder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or thip or lade any Gunpowder, Saltgetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy-Council, upon Pain of incurving and fuffering the refpective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act paffed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His Majefty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to im-" power His Majefty to prohibit the Exportation " of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for im-" powering His Majefty to prohibit the Fre " powering His Majefty to prohibit the Ex-" portation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms " and Ammunition; and alfo to impower " His Majefty to reftrain the carrying Coaft-" wife of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort " of Arms or Ammunition." -- And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Trea-fury, The Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, The Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, The Mafter General of the Ordnance, and His Ma-

> **THEREAS** the Time limited by His Majedy's Order in Council, of the First of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein menti-

ened, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and alfo to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who fhould conceal themfelves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this Inftant April: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Land-man, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seaman and Landman refpectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Froclamation of the Fourth Day of January laft : And likewife, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who fail, on or before the faid Twelfth Day of May next, difcover any Seaman or Seamen who fhall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Scamen be taken for His Majefty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

Turin, March 23. Friday the 19th Instant being Malame Felicité's Birth-day, her Royal Highness was pleafed to receive the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and of the Nobility upon that Occasion.

Drefden, March 30. On Thursday last the King of Pruffia fet out for Lockowitz, an Estate belonging to the Widow Rackenitz, about a German Mile from hence. As his Majefty was followed by all his Retinue, as also by the whole Regiment of Guards, and as the Time for the Opening of the Campaign approaches, and all the Regiments in this City and its Neighbourhood are kept in Readinefs for marching on the first Notice, "is shought he will not return here again before the Campaign opens. Last Monday Baron Kessel, Governor of the Princes Albert and Clement, was arrefted in his Apartment, as was likewife the Day after the Countefs of Ogilvi, her Polifh Majesty's first Lady of Honour, but the next Day she was fet at Liberty. 'Tis said they carried on an illicit Correspondence with the Austrians in Bohemia. Since that Time two Huntimen, in the Service of the Princes Xaverius and Charles, who had been at Warlaw, and afterwards in Bohemia with the Princes their Mafters, and who attempted to flip into this City without being examined, have been secured and sent to Spandau ; whither 60 Saxon Malefactors, condemned formerly to work at the Fortifications here, are also transported.

Copenbagen, April 2. On the 31% pair the Anniverlary of the King of Denmark's Birthday, who then entered upon the 35th Year of his Age, was celebrated with great Demonsfrations of Joy and Magnificence; but, on Account of the Lent-Season, there was only an elegant Dinner and Supper, at several Tables, but no Ball at Court. And although this Feftivity has been usually the Occasion of Promotions, yet none were made by His Danish Majesty this Year. However, a Silver Medal, which had been struck upon the Erection of the Academy for Painting, Sculpture, and Architecture, in the Year 1754, (bearing the King's Bust on one Side, and a Female Figure on the other, with a Laurel Wreath in her Hand, and several Instruments about her, and with the Words alit artes over her Head) was prefented to all Performs of Diffunction, who had the Honour of dining at Court.

Drefden, April 3. His Pruffian Majefly continues flill at Lockowitz, with his Regiment of Guards quartered in the neighbouring Villages. On Wednefday forty Pontons were carried from hence to Pirna. All the Pruffian Regiments are filing off one after another, and 'tis reported they take the Road towards Freyberg.

As feveral Soldiers belonging to the Saxon Regiment of Light Horse of Rutowsky, to the Number of 150, have joined in one Body and deferted, having obliged the Major that commanded them to lead them into Bohemia ; and as almost the fime has happened with Part of the Saxon Regiment of Infantry of Prince Maximilian, his Pruflian Majefty has caufed all the Saxom Regiments to be broke, and the Soldiers incorporated with the other Pruffian Regiments. When the Saxons defert from hence and go into Bohemia, they are not inrolled, but are fent to some remote Places in Bohemia and Auftria, where they are kept to-gether. When her Majefly the Queen of Po-land was informed of these Desertions, the expreffed her Difapprobation thereof in the ftrongest Terms, as the forefaw that the Country would be obliged to furnish other Recruits, And accordingly Orders are already iffued, requiring the Magistrates to deliver upwards of 4000 more Recruits with all Speed. On Thurs-day last, the Counters of Bruhl, Wife to the Prime Minister, was arrested at her Palace, and is guarded by an Officer, two fubaltern Officers, and Twenty-five Soldiers.

Bruffels, April 5. On Saturday arrived here the two remaining Batallions of Picardie, which were followed on Sunday by about 300 Men of La Motthe's Batallion of Artillery, but without any Part of the Train, which, they fay, confifts of 50 Pieces of Gannon, and will follow very foon, with the Remainder of that Batallion. Yefterday the Regiment of Cavalry of Saluces, confifting of two Squadrons, arrived alfo at this Place, and proceeded again this Morning for Louvain. The Van Guard of the fecond Divifion, confifting of two Batallions of the Grenadiers Royaux is expected here on Saturday next.

Liege, April 6. The Regency having agreed that the French Troops intended for the Army on the Lower Rhine, thould pais through this Principality, and be supplied with Provisions, Scc. the two first Batallions of the first Division of that Army, arrived here accordingly on Friday last, and have been successively followed by two Batallions or two Squadrons every Day, who, after refting 24 Hours, continue their March towards Ruremond. Notwithstanding the Whole of the first Division will not have left this Place before Sunday next, yet Part of the second Division arrived to Day; and it appears by the General Route of this Army, that the last two Squadrons thereof will not pais through this City till the 25th Infants.

Norwich, Savaffbam, Attleborough, Wind-bam, Thetford, Lyan, Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bifhop Stortford, Sawbridgeworth, Downhem, Epping, Ongar and Ely. The Man who committed this Robbery is defcrib-

ed to be a middle fized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat-He rode a brown or dark coloured little Florfe, with a fwith Tail.

Road near Shepherds Bufh, by a Footpad, who laid hold of the Bridle of the Poft Boy's Horfe, and bid him difmount, and afterwards led the faid Horfe into a Lane near the great Road, and from thence into a Field adjoining, and there near to a Hay Rick took off the Mail from the Horfe, opened it, and afterwards the Letters contained in the following Bags, viz. Campden, Chipping-Norton, Eversham, Bueford, Whitney, Woodstock, Oxford, Ludlow, Bromyard, Wor-cester, Thame, Southall, Gerrard's Cross, Uxbridge, Higb Wickham, and Baconsfield.

Note, The following Bags in the faid Mail were unopened, viz. Shipflon, Enflon, and Tenbury; and the faid Foot-pad, after detaining the Poft-Boy upwards of two Hours, mounted the faid Poft Boy's Horfe, and rode off with the fame towards Acton, which Horfe was found the fame Morning about Eight o'Clock near the Turnpike at Hyde Park Corner.

The Perfon who committed this Robbery has fince put off feveral of the Bank Notes, and indorfed the Name of James Willon thereon, to feveral Innkeepers on the Road to Caxton, by travelling Poff in Poft-Chailes with four Horles, by the Way of Barnet, Hatheld, Stevenage, and Bugden, and returning from Caxton by Way of Royfton, Ware, and Enfield to London, where he was fet down at Gray's Inn Gate in Gray's Inn Lane, about Twelve o'Clock at Noon, on Tuesday the 14th instant. This Person is defcribed to be rather above the Middle-fize, of a brown Complexion, very thin Vifage and Body, with an effeminate Voice; he had on a Silver-laced Has with a Cockade, blue Surtout Coat with Brafs Buttons, a dark brown close-bodied Coat underneath, a Pair of Breeches with Silver Gartering at the Knees, his Wig or Hair, or both mixed was a dark brown, and tied behind with a Ribbon.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever thall apprehend and convice, or cause to be appre-hended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two.
