P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Hereas the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 13th of October laft, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaftwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April .--- And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the fame foould be continued for fome longer Time-His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, That no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever, (except the Mafter-General of the Ordnance for His Majefty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th of this Inftant April, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coaftwife, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or thip or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts Levond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permiffion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy-Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the respective Forseitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to im-" power His Majely to prchibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for im-" powering His Majefry to prohibit the Ex-٤٢ portation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms 66 and Ammunition; and also to impower "His Majefty to refirain the carrying Coaft-"wife of Saltpette, Gunpowder, or any Sort " of Arms or Ammunition." ---- And the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treafury, The Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, The Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, The Mafter General of the Ordnance, and His Majefty's Secretary at War, are to give the necef-fary Directions herein, as to them may refpectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council, of the First of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein menti-

oned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and alfo to all Able-bodied Landmen, who fhould voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who fhould conceal themfelves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this Inftant April : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifiy, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and cf Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seaman and Landman refpectively, who fhall, on or before the Twelfth Day of May next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January laft : And likewife, That the Revvards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who shall, on or before the faid Twelfth Day of May next, difcover any Seaman or Seamen who fhall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majefty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

Rome, March 26. A Notification has been put up at the ufual Places in this City, to invite People to undertake the digging of the Canal of Porto d'Anzio, upon the Conditions therein proposed, agreeable to the Flan formed some Time ago by M. Marechal, a French Enginier. On the 15th Instant died, of the Gout in his Stomach, M. Lercari, Secretary de Propaganda Fide,

Fide, in which Poft M. Antonelli fucceeds him. A Palace is preparing here, by Order of the Cardinal Archbishop of Sens, who defigns to take a Journey into Italy, and to pass fome Time in this City. On the 20th died, after a lingering Illness, Gardinal Lercari, aged 81 He has appointed M. Lercari his Heir, Years. after whofe Decease the Inheritance devolves to the Propaganda Fide. By the last Dispatches from Vienna, the Secretary of State received Notice of the Decease of Cardinal Trauthfon, by whofe Death there is a Vacancy of ten Hats in the College of Cardinals, which the Pope thews no Inclination to difpose of.

Turin, March 30. Friday haf, the 25th Infant, being the Anniverfary of the Birth of her Royal Highness Madame Louise, the same was observed at Court as usual. M. Corfini, whose great Uncle was the late Pope Clement the Twelfth, is now here in his Return from Portugal, where he went to carry a Red Cap to the Cardinal Saldanha, who was raifed to that Dignity in the last Promotion.

Drefden, April 10. The Countefs of Bruhl fet out on Tuesday last for Warfaw, with the greatest Part of her Retinue. On Wednesday a Regiment of Pruffian Milicians entered this Town, but marched off next Morning for Pirna. On Friday the Regiment of Fufiliers of General Reht arrived here, whereupon the Regiment of Manteuffel marched off Yefterday | fatisfy and pay the Sums due from the respective Defaul-Morning; and in the Afternoon the Regiment of Gend-arms also arrived here. The Suitzers, who guarded the Queen of Poland's Palace, are fent home, and the Pruffians now alone guard it. Last Night several more Prussian Regiments, as well Horfe as Foot, arrived here, fo that this Town is now entirely filled with Soldiers. Notwithstanding the numerous Prussian Garrifon, that have been quartered here the whole Winter, and the continual Marching to and fro of different Regiments, the Pruffian Difcipline has been fo ftrie, that no Burglary or other confiderable Theft has been heard of. On the contrary, even the Roman Catholicks, fearing leaft the Auftrians should foon become Masters of this City, begin ferioufly to think of fecuring their moft valuable Effects.

Bruffels, April 15. The French Corps that liave marched through this Place fince laft Tuefday, are the two remaining Batallions of the Grenadiers de France, and four Squadrons of the Regiment of Dragoons of Orleans.

Hereas the Post Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping to the Office Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelifk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Effex, by a fingle. Highwayman on Horfeback, who prefented a Picel to the Poll-Boy, at the fame Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwife he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Poft-Boy to unftrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horfe, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Swaffham, Attl. borough, Windbam, Thetford, Lynn, Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, News Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Biftop Stortford, Sawbridgeworth, Downbam, Etping, Ongar and Ely.

The Man who committed this Robbery is defcribed to be a middle fized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat-He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horfe, with a fwifh Tail.

General Post-Office, December 20, 1756. 7Hereas the Polt Boy carrying the Welcefter Mail from hence to Southall, was, on Sunday Morning the 12th inflant, between the Hours of Four and Five of the Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road near Shepherds Bush, by a Footpad, who laid hold of the Bridle of the Post Boy's Horse, and bid him difmount, and afterwards led the faid Horse into a Lane near the great Road, and from thence into a Field adjoining, and there near to a Hay Rick took off the Mail from the Horfe, opened it, and afterwards the Letters contained in the following Bags, viz. Campden, Chipping-Norton, Ever/ham, Burford, Whitney, Woodflock, Oxford, Ludlow, Bromyard, Wor-cefter, Thame, Soutball, Gerrard's Crofs, Uxbridge, High Wickham, and Baconsfield.

Note, The following Bags in the faid Mail were unopened, viz. Shipfton, Enflon, and Teabury ; and the faid Foot-pad, after detaining the Post Boy upwards of two Hours, mounted the fail Poil Boy's Horfe, and rode off with the fame towards Acton, which Horfe was found the fame Morning about Eight o'Clock near the Turnpike at Hyde Park Corner.

The Perfon who committed this Robbery has fince put off feveral of the Bank Notes, and indorted the Name of James Willon thereon, to feveral Innkeepers on the Road to Caxton, by travelling Poft in Post-Chaifes with four Horfes, by the Way of Barnet, Hatfield, Stevenage, and Bugden, and returning from Caxion by Way of Roytlon, Ware, and Enfield to London, where he was fet down at Gray's Inn Gate in Gray's Inn Lane, about Twelve o'Clock at Noon, on Tuesday the 14th instant. This Person is defcribed to be rather above the Middle-fize, of a brown Complexion, very thin Vifage and Body, with an effeminate Voice; he had on a Silver-laced Hat with a Cockade, blue Surtout Coat with Brafs Buttons, a dark brown close-bodied Coat underneath, a Pair of Breeches with Silver Gartering at the Knees, his Wig or Hair, or both mixed was a dark brown, and tied behind with a Ribbon.
