

Fide, in which Post M. Antonelli succeeds him. A Palace is preparing here, by Order of the Cardinal Archbishop of Sens, who designs to take a Journey into Italy, and to pass some Time in this City. On the 20th died, after a lingering Illness, Cardinal Lercari, aged 81 Years. He has appointed M. Lercari his Heir, after whose Decease the Inheritance devolves to the Propaganda Fide. By the last Dispatches from Vienna, the Secretary of State received Notice of the Decease of Cardinal Trauthson, by whose Death there is a Vacancy of ten Hats in the College of Cardinals, which the Pope shews no Inclination to dispose of.

Turin, March 30. Friday last, the 25th Instant, being the Anniversary of the Birth of her Royal Highness Madams Louise, the same was observed at Court as usual. M. Corsini, whose great Uncle was the late Pope Clement the Twelfth, is now here in his Return from Portugal, where he went to carry a Red Cap to the Cardinal Saldanha, who was raised to that Dignity in the last Promotion.

Dresden, April 10. The Countess of Bruhl set out on Tuesday last for Warsaw, with the greatest Part of her Retinue. On Wednesday a Regiment of Prussian Militians entered this Town, but marched off next Morning for Pirna. On Friday the Regiment of Fusiliers of General Reht arrived here, whereupon the Regiment of Manteuffel marched off Yesterday Morning; and in the Afternoon the Regiment of Gend-arms also arrived here. The Suitsers, who guarded the Queen of Poland's Palace, are sent home, and the Prussians now alone guard it. Last Night several more Prussian Regiments, as well Horse as Foot, arrived here, so that this Town is now entirely filled with Soldiers. Notwithstanding the numerous Prussian Garrison, that have been quartered here the whole Winter, and the continual Marching to and fro of different Regiments, the Prussian Discipline has been so strict, that no Burglary or other considerable Theft has been heard of. On the contrary, even the Roman Catholics, fearing least the Austrians should soon become Masters of this City, begin seriously to think of securing their most valuable Effects.

Brussels, April 15. The French Corps that have marched through this Place since last Tuesday, are the two remaining Battalions of the Grenadiers de France, and four Squadrons of the Regiment of Dragoons of Orleans.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable William Earl of Home, to be His Majesty's Lieutenant in the Shire of Berwick in North Britain.

Treasury Chambers, March 15, 1757.

Several Persons having been prosecuted, by the Order of the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, (of which Order Notice was given in the London Gazette of Saturday the 23d of October last) for selling several Tickets, called Irish Tickets, to be determined by the drawing of the last State Lottery, in Defiance of the Laws made against such Practices, two of which Persons, viz. Mr. John McCarrick and Mr. Henry Luna, were, on Tuesday the Eighth of March Instant, convicted of the said Offence, before the Right

Honourable the Lord Mayor, and Sir Robert Ladbroke, Knight, one of the Aldermen of the City of London, on the Statute made in the Eighth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Chap. 2. Sect. 36. which inflicts a Penalty of 500 l. and one Year's Imprisonment in the County Goal, without Bail or Mainprize, on every Person so convicted.

For the preventing other Persons being guilty of the like Offences, Notice is hereby given, that all Persons, offending against the said Act, will be prosecuted forthwith, the Solicitor of His Majesty's Treasury having received Orders for that Purpose.

General Post-Office, March 21, 1757.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman on Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unstrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Swaffham, Attleborough, Windham, Thetford, Lynn, Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sawbridgeworth, Downham, Epping, Ongar and Ely.

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swift Tail.
