IT is this Day Ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Embargo upon all Ships and Vessels, going from any of the Ports of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, laden with Beef and Pork, be taken off, and that his Grace the Duke of Bedford, Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's said Kingdom of Ireland, do give the necessary Directions for that Purpose.

AT the Court at St. James's the 9th Day of April, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the First of March last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of this Instant April: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seaman and Landman respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards

of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of May next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Venice, April 8. Some Days ago Procurator Marco Foscarini was appointed Ambassador Extraordinary from this Republick to the Pope.

Hamburg, April 15. The Day before Yesterday his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived in the River Elbe on board His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Fowey, with three more Men of War as Convoy; and Yesterday Morning his Royal Highness landed about Ten o'Clock, in perfect Health, accompanied by the Earl of Albemarle, Lord George Lenox, Lord Frederick Cavendish, Colonels Keppel and West, and Capt. Carlton.

Dresden, April 17. The Prussian Army is now every where in Motion. A few Days ago the Prince of Prussia, the Duke of Bevern, and Marshal Keith, went from Upper Lusatia into Bohemia, in order to view the Country, and advanced as far as Hanspach and Neusfat. Yesterday Morning the two Regiments of Infantry, Bevern and Itzenplitz, marched out of this Town towards Stolpen, with a Design to join the Army in Upper Lusatia. Prince Maurice of Anhalt is already cantoned with Part of the Army upon the Frontiers of Bohemia, near the Fortrefs of Eger: But his Prussian Majesty continues still at Lockewitz.

Hanover, April 19. On the 16th Instant his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here in perfect Health.

Brussels, April 19. The Letters from Lower Germany contain nothing material relating to the Progress of the French Army. The Troops, which have passed through here since last Friday, are the Regiment du Roi of four Battalions, and the two Regiments of Cavalry of Lenoncourt and Dauphin of two Squadrons each. Some considerable Drovers of Oxen have likewise begun to pass through this Place, coming from the Limoufin, and other Parts of France, for the Use of their Army.

Brussels, April 22. Marechal d'Etrées is to set out this Day from Paris, and is expected here

on Sunday; the next Day he proceeds, without any Delay, for the Army. The Time of the Duke of Orleans's Departure from Paris is not yet fixed. We are informed from Wezel, that Comte Maillebois is marched at the Head of between three and four Thousand French and Austrians, to dislodge a Party of Prussians who have taken Possession of Count Kaunitz's Castle at Rittberg. Since last Post, the French Regiments of Dauphin Etranger Cavalry, of two Squadrons, and Colonel General Dragons, of four Squadrons; have passed through this Place. According to our Advices from Brest, the French Squadron, under M. d'Apcher, was still there on the 10th Instant, as were likewise the East India Company's Ships at Port l'Orient.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman on Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unstrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. *Norwich, Swaffham, Littleborough, Windham, Thetford, Lynn, Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sawbridge-worth, Downham, Epping, Onger and Ely.*

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swish Tail.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of *Two Hundred Pounds*, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of *Two Hundred Pounds*, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

General Post-Office, December 20, 1756.

Whereas the Post Boy carrying the Worcester Mail from hence to Southall, was, on Sunday Morning the 12th instant, between the Hours of Four and Five of the Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road near Shepherd's Bush, by a Footpad, who laid hold of the Bridle of the Post Boy's Horse, and bid him dismount, and afterwards led the said Horse into a Lane near the great Road, and from thence into a Field adjoining, and there near to a Hay Rick took off the Mail from the Horse, opened it, and afterwards the Letters contained in the following Bags, viz. *Campden, Chipping-Norton, Eversham, Burford, Whitney, Woodstock, Oxford, Ludlow, Bromyard, Worcester, Thame, Southall, Gerard's Cross, Uxbridge, High Wickham, and Beaconsfield.*

Note, The following Bags in the said Mail were unopened, viz. *Shipston, Enston, and Tebury*; and the said Foot-pad, after detaining the Post-Boy upwards of two Hours, mounted the said Post-Boy's Horse, and rode off with the same towards Acton, which Horse was found the same Morning about Eight o'Clock near the Turnpike at Hyde Park Corner.

The Person who committed this Robbery has since put off several of the Bank Notes, and indorsed the Name of James Wilson thereon, to several Innkeepers on the Road to Caxton, by travelling Post in Post-Chaises with four Horses, by the Way of Barnet, Hatfield, Stevenage, and Bugden, and returning from Caxton by Way of Royston, Ware, and Enfield to London, where he was set down at Gray's Inn Gate in Gray's Inn Lane, about Twelve o'Clock at Noon, on Tuesday the 14th instant. This Person is described to be rather above the Middle-size, of a brown Complexion, very thin Visage and Body, with an effeminate Voice; he had on a Silver-laced Hat with a Cockade, blue Surtout Coat with Brafs Buttons, a dark brown close-bodied Coat underneath, a Pair of Breeches with Silver Gartering at the Knees, his Wig or Hair, or both mixed was a dark brown, and tied behind with a Ribbon.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of *Two Hundred Pounds*, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of *Two Hundred Pounds*, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
